LOCAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE (LCDC)

LOCAL ECONOMIC AND COMMUNITY PLAN

Submissions on the Local Economic and Community Plan are currently being sought from the Municipal Districts and Regional Assembly. Following this, an LCDC meeting will take place on the 3rd December to discuss the draft LECP Implementation Plan before it is presented to Plenary Council at the December meeting.

LOCAL ENHANCEMENT PROGRAMME

Minister for Rural and Community Development Heather Humphreys and Minister of State with responsibility for Community Development and Charities Joe O'Brien recently announced €7 million in funding under the "Department of Rural and Community Development Local Enhancement Programme 2025".

This funding will consist of €6 million in capital supports essential for the many small community groups and organisations, particularly those who serve disadvantaged communities in rural and urban areas. A further €1 million in current funding is available for Community Groups, including Men's Sheds and Women's Sheds, to assist with their energy and running costs, to help them continue their important work within the community.

Galway County Council is being allocated €183,086 in capital funding and €30,514 in current funding. It is intended that the Local Enhancement Programme will be advertised in January 2025, with funding recommendations to be returned to the Department of Rural and Community Development by end March 2025, with formal announcements thereafter by the Department.

The scheme is designed to ensure local priorities are identified and met, so as to improve and enhance community facilities for all. All funding will be available to a diverse range of community groups including but not limited to Men's and Women's sheds/groups, community centres, parish halls and other local voluntary groups.

HEALTHY IRELAND

The Healthy Islands initiative continued its Health & Wellbeing events throughout October, culminating in final events being rolled out on Inis Oírr and Inis Bofin. Each island hosted a schedule of talks, attracting both the community and local school children. Attendees were pleased to receive merchandise and healthy foods and refreshments on the day to model



what Healthy Eating entails and to receive advice from the many agencies who attended with their information stands. Healthy Ireland Galway looks forward to returning to the offshore islands to offer future targeted Health & Wellbeing events for men and women within the community.















Our Health & Wellbeing event hosted in Leitir Mealláin for Mental Health Day was a tremendous success! We had a fantastic turnout from the local community, who attended our information talks beginning with Padraig Fahey representing Parkrun to host the first

talk on the benefits of Physical Activity for Mental and Physical Wellbeing. Anita Murphy impressed the audience with a talk on Women's Health and Menopause; Thrive Conamara gave a talk on Mental Health and the purpose of 'Thrive Conamara' in supporting mental health in the community. To finish there was a brief outline of how Mindfulness can be incorporated into our daily lives followed by a mindfulness practice by Caitriona Ni Ghiollaphádraig. The health



checks conducted by Croí and Foot Health Podiatry, Baile Chláir, were a big success, and



there was an abundance of valuable information shared on Health & Wellbeing throughout the event.







To conclude Mental Health Month, we hosted a '5 Ways to Wellbeing' event coordinated by Healthy Galway City and County in partnership with the Integration Teams for Galway City and County. This was a great opportunity to celebrate Mental Health Month with the migrant and refugee populations of Galway and raise further awareness of positive mental health and wellbeing. The theme of this event was 'Five Ways to Wellbeing'; which alludes to simple actions to practice each day to maintain or improve everyday mental health and wellbeing through connection, learning, being active, awareness and the practice of

giving. The event was well-attended, drawing participants from across Galway with a diverse mix of cultural backgrounds, including Ukrainian, Muslim, Somali, and other nationalities.

The day featured a variety of activities such as cooking demonstrations, barber cuts, hand massages, face painting, and balloon animals. Additionally, Galway



Community Circus participated with two trainers to support guests and facilitate activities. The event also included live music, Afro-Brazilian dance workshops, and guided walks in Merlin Woods. Refreshments and healthy snacks were provided to further enrich the event and encourage healthy eating.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND SOCIAL INCLUSION

PRIDE OF PLACE AWARDS

County Galway has continued its track record of success in the IPB Pride of Place
Competition with Kinvara and Williamstown both named Runners-Up at the All-Island Pride
of Place Awards Ceremony in Monaghan on 2nd November. Each year, the local authority
selects 2 communities to represent County Galway in these "Oscars of the Community
Sector" to showcase and celebrate their achievements. The Kinvara and Williamstown
communities were visited by IPB Pride of Place judges in September when their group
representatives made formal presentations before bringing the judges on a tour of their
locality highlighting the elements of their voluntary efforts of which they are most proud.

Kinvara Tidy Towns were nominated in the "Climate Action & Biodiversity" category and showcased their collaborative efforts including the development of a Biodiversity Action Plan; planting of more than 9,000 native trees of local families, landowners, schools & community groups; and collaborative projects with Kinvara Hockey, Kinvara GAA and residents to develop habitat mapping, a biodiversity trail, and a series of wildlife and biodiversity citizen science exploration projects with local schools and ecologists.

Williamstown were nominated in the "0-300 population" category and showcased their continued restoration and development of Williamstown Mill and Millers Cottage, the delivery of a 3.3km walkway with biodiversity signage and boards on the Bog Road, and a safe walkway linking the primary schools to the GAA Grounds, in addition to other

collaborative Tidy Towns projects with local schools.

TIDY TOWNS

The results of the National Tidy Towns Competition 2024 were announced on 1st November, with Galway communities doing the County proud. In announcing Ballincollig as the National Winner, Minister Heather Humphries acknowledged the role of Tidy Towns Volunteers saying, "You are truly an inspiration, and the embodiment of everything that is good in our communities". Galway County is fortunate to have 45 towns and villages who enter the Tidy Towns Competition and invest huge time and effort to organise clean-ups, biodiversity and sustainability initiatives, environmental awareness workshops, and general improvement projects in town and village centres, housing estates, local amenities, and approach roads. Overall, our Groups were successful in achieving 10 Special Awards and Medals as follows:



- Milltown successful retained their Gold Medal and 1st place in the County.
- ➤ Huge congratulations to the community of Abbey who have become the second area in the County to achieve a Gold Medal and retained second place in the County.
- Huge congratulations also to the community of Tuam who become the first town in County Galway to achieve medal status, being awarded a Bronze Medal in 2024.
- An Spidéal have consolidated their excellent progress over the last number of years and retained 3rd place in the County.
- For the second year in a row, Tullycross Village has received the Endeavour Award, which is awarded to the group who have achieved the highest increase in marks since the previous year's competition. In the process, Tullycross have increased their marks in the competition by an unbelievable 69 points!
- Cuan Beo Environmental Group Kinvara were one of 4 National Winners of the Waters and Communities Award
- Oranmore Tidy Towns were the Regional Winner of the Pollinator Award for Large Towns.
- ➤ Kinvara Tidy Towns were one of 2 areas in the country who were Highly Commended under the EPA Circular Economy Award.
- Abbey Tidy Towns were the national winner of the Circular Economy Award.
- Abbeyknockmoy Parish Society were the national winner of the Gum Litter Task Force Award Village/Small Town Category and also won the overall award in this category.

NATIONAL AGE FRIENDLY RECOGNITION AND ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS

Galway County Council was honoured as a National Award Winner at an Awards Ceremony on 7th November to celebrate age friendly initiatives across the World Health Organisation Age Friendly Themes.

The Council's innovative project, the Cnoc (Indreabhán) and Casla Bus Shelters, won the overall national award under the Age Friendly Transport Award category, sponsored by the Department of Transport. The Age Friendly Transport Award category celebrates initiatives that enhance mobility for older adults, supporting them in reaching their desired destinations safely and conveniently. The Award Category recognises that access to high-quality and reliable transport options significantly improves the quality of life for older adults, helping them maintain their independence and active engagement with the community.

Having been nominated by the Roads & Transportation Unit, the competition Judges visited the project in September, receiving a presentation on the project and meeting local residents who have been impacted positively by these vital infrastructural projects. The project was recognised for its thoughtful planning and design of the bus shelters, which specifically accommodate the needs of local people with disabilities and older adults. This was done by re-orienting the shelters to protect the users from the prevailing westerly winds and the judges praised the Council's inclusive approach and its meaningful impact on



the local community which was demonstrated through the personal stories of local users. The Council also worked closely with local residents and Elected Members, collaborating on elements such as land dedications to ensure the bus shelters were convenient to all local amenities and services.


Other activities by Galway County Age Friendly Programme during the month were:

BUILDING CAPACITY:



The PPN Workers disseminated information on multiple PPN Members Training being provided online by and for PPN's in the North-West Regional PPN Network.

The PPN Winter Plenary Event is taking place on Tuesday 19th November 2024, in the Conamara Cost Hotel, from 6:00 – 8:30 pm. The Plenary (all member groups) is the key decision maker of the PPN on operational issues and local policy focus for the PPN, meeting at least twice a year. Their role is to direct the operation of the PPN, setting overall PPN policy and processes, for example agreeing the annual Workplan, the Budget and so on. Decisions made between Plenary meetings must be presented for ratification (that is, approval) to the following meeting. The Winter Plenary will include

exhibition stands on a variety of topics in addition to presentations on the workplan and budget 2024, ratification of PPN representatives from recent nomination & election processes, and a presentation on the Community Support Schemes 2025.

The PPN has recently filled 10 of the 11 PPN Representative posts on the newly formed Strategic Policy Committees (SPC's), and a PPN election is underway to fill the remaining seat.

ARTS OFFICE

PUBLIC ART COMMISSION CRAUGHWELL - TURLOUGH WALK

Galway County Council and the OPW - Office of Public Works have been collaborating on " A River Runs through it", a Per Cent for Art Commission for Craughwell, Co. Galway.

Following the Stone Carving Festival held on Craughwell bridge in May, the stone sculpture by commissioned artist Stephen Burke is well underway. The artwork will be forming a sculptural stone seating with carved details





inspired by the Dunkellin river and Rahasane Turlough on the Bridge in Craughwell.

As part of the Artist's engagement with Craughwell, we hosted a Turlough walk on Saturday morning 2nd November at 11 a.m. led by the sculptor Stephen Burke, environmental scientist Gordon D'Arcy and Turlough shareholder Maura Lyons., for an informal walk on the Rahasane



Turlough. The morning featured a talk on the inspiration behind the sculptures from the artists and wildlife and local history from Gordon and Maura.

GALWAY COMMUNITY YOUTH CIRCUS TUAM

After a very successful pilot programme of circus classes in Tuam in 2022, Galway Community Circus is continuing to run Youth Circus classes in Tuam with the support of



Galway County Council Arts Office. In 2024 the Circus is committed to taking a further step towards a permanent second space for Galway Community Circus in Tuam. They continue to offer limited classes while they work on a suitable space for our members.

Flea Circus in Tuam: The Flea Circus introduces children aged 5 to 7 years to circus arts through a variety of fun games

and activities. At this young age, the principles of teamwork, self-belief and understanding can have their foundations, paving the way for further development as they grow older.

Junior Circus in Tuam: The Junior Circus classes are designed for young people aged 8 to 11 years. We engage in the various disciplines of circus, including aerial, manipulation, balance, acrobatics, clowning, as well as stage presence.

Classes are held at The Family Centre (TUSLA Building) Sports Hall, Dublin Road, Tuam, Co. Galway H54 AH75 and subsidised places are offered with the support of the Arts Office.

SPARKCATCHERS TINY MUTINY

The young Artists who were successful in their applications for the 'Tiny Mutiny Project Awards' are about to embark on a journey with their mentors working towards a public showcase of new work from across the arts in the spring of 2025. The selected young artists and mentors are being guided throughout the project by Tuam based Sparkcatchers Jojo Hynes and Midie Corcoran.

CREATIVE IRELAND

DRAWDOWN

November is Drawdown month for Creative Ireland, which means that we have a lot of projects across the county coming to a close. It has been wonderful to see all the reports coming in and to see what a difference this funding makes to our communities all over Galway County.

CREATIVE IRELAND BURSARIES

The Creative Ireland Bursary Scheme gives community groups the opportunity to engage with a creative practitioner and get involved in a creative project. This year's bursaries were extremely popular. We had an over ask of €300,000. Sadly, we cannot fund everyone, but the ones who were successful really showed their value and proved to us that the panel made the right choice. The following are a few examples of the 2024 Creative Ireland Bursary Awardees.



BRÚ BHRÍDE - ENGAGE CIRCUS PROJECT

This was Brú Bhríde's second year being awarded Creative Ireland funding for this project. Each week, between 30 and 50 children attended the classes where they learned circus

skills, built confidence, and made new friends. Both participants and parents reported being thrilled to have such an exciting project taking place in the town. The ages ranged from very small children up to older teens. The project was also one of the longer running ones, taking place from May until mid-October. Projects of this type are important as they give the children and young people a great opportunity to



engage with creativity in a meaningful way while also allowing shyer children the time needed to warm up to a new environment and come out of their shells.

COIS CLADAIGH - AISTEAR AN TSAOIL

Cois Cladaigh are a Brothers of Charity Arts Group based in Casla, in Conamara. They carry out all of their workshops through Irish. In 2023 they ran a Creative Ireland funded project which saw the participants create self-portraits. Many of the pieces utilised found objects from the seashore. This year's continuation of this project involved a deeper dive into the participants' connection to the sea as



members of a community that was traditionally built on fishing. Using this as inspiration, the participants created beautiful ceramic boats as an expression of their identity as members of a coastal community. They also created collages on boat sails. These pieces were exhibited as part of the Clifden Arts Festival. They are currently on exhibit in Ionad Cultúrtha an Phiarsaigh, Rosmuc. This exhibition was launched by Éamon Ó Cuív who spoke very highly of the contribution of Galway County Council to this important and impactful body of work. Attendees were also treated to piece of trad music which the group had written with their teachers, and there was even some impromptu dancing!



GALWAY TRAVELLER MOVEMENT – RECLAIMING CULTURAL SPACES

For 2024, Galway Traveller Movement ran a large-scale programme of cultural events as part of the Ballinasloe Horse Fair and the Misleór Festival. Reports on the day were that they were the best part of the festival. GTM showcased local talent and got great participation from the Traveller community on the day. They presented a display of Beady Pockets and the artwork of the young people who engage with the Ballinasloe Traveller Women's Group. Over 500 people were engaged throughout the day. Tom McDonnell gave a live demonstration of tin smithing and Margaret Carr and Francis Ward entertained the crowds with their music. Show Time Media also showcased 10 short films promoting Traveller and nomadic cultures.

GORT ARTS GROUP - FITE FUAITE 2: EXPLORING CREATIVITY IN GORT



Gort Arts Groups are truly going from strength to strength in their creative programming. Over the course of 2024, they held workshops in Print Making, Lantern Making, and Eco Art. They also held workshops in specific locations to target harder to reach groups. These were a Movement and Expression workshop with the Brothers of Charity, Painting for Wellbeing

with the Gort Cancer Support Centre, and Live Music at Rosemount Nursing Home. In total almost 100 people engaged with these free to attend workshops. The variety of areas covered and commitment to ensuring that Creativity is accessible for everyone is a true testament to the ethos of the Creative Communities programme and one that we are proud to support.

LIMELIGHT CREATIVE ARTS - SENSORYSCAPE

Last, but by no means least, we have Limelight Creative Arts. This is a Brothers of Charity Arts Centre based in Oranmore. The service users of Limelight are no strangers to creativity. In recent years they have produced a stop motion animation film, exhibitions of paintings, and even an original piece of theatre. This year, with funding from Creative Ireland and Galway County Council, the 20 service users at Limelight attended a series of 24 pottery workshops. During these sessions they had the opportunity to experiment with several different ceramic techniques, including surface design, glazing, printing, and firing in the kiln. The then installed a large metal plate in the sensory room. The students attached magnets to the objects they created so that they can arrange them into a decorative mandala on the metal sheet. We have been informed by Limelight that the participants showed such an interest in the medium that they will be continuing the project over the



next year adding to the sculpture and allowing them to rotate the design through the seasons.

LOOKING FORWARD

As the 2024 Season of Creative Ireland funding draws to a close, we are looking forward at our 2025 programme. Planning has already begun on how to utilise this stream of funding to its fullest potential. The 2025 Creative Ireland Bursary Programme will be opening for applications in mid-December 2024 with a view to allowing awardees to begin their projects as early as February 2025. As this programme continues to grow, it is incredibly exciting to see the creativity of our communities shine through in such a wide variety of ways. We are looking forward to seeing what creative ideas the people of County Galway come up with for 2025.

GALWAY SPORTS PARTNERSHIP

COUCH TO 5K

Galway Sports Partnership through HSE Funding is running Couch to 5k programmes in Clifden, Loughrea and Westside.

These 6-week programmes are suitable for beginners/ walkers and those new to running at three locations in November: Loughrea, Westside and Clifden.

The couch to 5km programme starts with a series of run-walk intervals to get participants moving gradually with a progressive six-week plan that brings participants from walking to jogging and running. This highly popular programme works as it gives participants an element of accountability, support and confidence, under the supervision of an experienced coach.





INCLUSIVE SWIMMING PROGRAMME

Galway Sports Partnership through Ballinasloe Community Sports Hub in partnership with

Coral Leisure Ballinasloe started an Inclusive Swim Programme for Children with additional needs. The programme had 8 participants with an age range of 5-14 year of age and all were supported throughout the programme by a parent/guardian to help build the confidence of both the participant in the water and also the parent/guardian. This programme was available free of charge through Dormant Account and HSE Funding. Due to demand another programme is scheduled for early 2025 and it is also hoped to extend this programme to more areas in 2025.



SCHOOLS WATER SAFETY

Galway Sports Partnership worked in collaboration with Water Safety Ireland's Rosie Reid under the Ballinasloe Community Sports Hub initiative to deliver a practical Water Safety programme to 154 first year's students of Garbally College and Ard Scoil Mhuire in support

of the Junior Cycle Physical Education aim to meeting the Junior Cycle PE Curriculum strand 2 learning outcome 2.9.

Demonstrate an understanding of personal survival and water safety considerations. The students had a great time learning in a practical fun environment with lots of physical activity incorporated.



PRIMARY SCHOOLS BASKETBALL PROGRAMME

Ballinasloe Community Sports Hub initiative in partnership with Basketball Ireland commenced an 8-week programme in Ballinasloe's four primary schools - Scoil an Chroi Naofa, Scoil Uí Cheithearnaigh, Creagh N.S. and Newtown N.S. The programme supplied the schools with 102 basketballs and a professional Basketball player from the United States who is playing with University of Galway and working with Basketball Ireland coaching. 501 students will get the opportunity to learn the skills of basketball with improving their fundamental movement skills concurrently.











BALLINASLOE MID TERM ATHLETIC CAMP

split between the two days. The improvement in fundamental movement skills over the 4 hours was outstanding proving the effectiveness of this programme.

WOMEN IN SPORT

A new HER Moves campaign was launched by Sport Ireland to focused on teenage girls with the launch of their new film on October 11th, the International Day of the Girl. It aims to amplify girl's voices and spark discussion around the complex issues they say contribute to them dropping out of sport.





Galway Sports Partnership was successful under a Dormant Accounts application through Sport Ireland for a specific HER Moves initiative which will be starting in 2025.

TEENAGE GIRLS IN PHYSICAL ACTIVITY – MYTHS, STRENGTH TRAINING & NUTRITION

Orna Murray will return for her second online workshop on Thursday 14th November at 7pm, this time covering topics that were chosen with the feedback from our last webinar in May 2024. Orna is co-founder of Move2B, a



platform that aims to provide information and evidence-based solutions to prevent teenage girls from disengaging or dropping out from sport and physical activity. These workshops are extremely insightful and are a great avenue for people working with teenage girls to learn how they can better cater for this cohort.

SPORT IRELAND COACHING TEENAGE GIRLS WORKSHOP

Galway Sports Partnership will deliver Sport Ireland Coaching "Teenage Girls Workshop" for the first time in Galway on December 11th at 6.30-9.30pm. The workshop aims to support and educate coaches to specificities of teenage girls and sport. It will be co-delivered by Galway Sports Partnership staff who are trained tutors.

2024/2025 ORIS (OUTDOOR RECREATION INFRASTRUCTURE SCHEME)

Applications are currently invited for the 2024/2025 ORIS (Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme) which has been launched by the Department of Rural and Community Development. The Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme (ORIS) supports the development of new outdoor recreational infrastructure and the necessary repair, enhancement, or promotion of existing outdoor recreation infrastructure in countryside areas across Ireland. The Scheme is funded under "Our Rural Future" which specifically prioritises the growing outdoor activity tourism sector as part of a long-term vision for a vibrant and sustainable rural Ireland. In line with Embracing Ireland's Outdoors, outdoor recreation is defined as activities that take place in the natural environment, such as walking, canoeing, mountain biking, orienteering and wild swimming. It does not include activities that take place outdoors on confined courses or pitches (such as golf, football, and showjumping) or motorised activities (such as quads/scramblers). Consequently, such activities are not eligible for funding under ORIS.

Projects must be shovel-ready with Planning Permission in place (except Project Development Measure). All landowner consents must be in place. It is a requirement for all ORIS measures that planning permission (if required) must be obtained in advance of submitting the application. If the project has not yet secured planning permission, the submission of an application should be postponed. Funding available under the 2024/2025 scheme and deadlines are outlined below:





The focus is now on preparing full applications, with a submission deadline of 13th January 2025. Projects that require planning permission must have it in place before the application submission.

BURIAL GROUNDS

Part 8 submissions for the extension of burial grounds in Leitir Moir and Kilconieron were submitted in October.

VETERINARY DEPARTMENT

Galway County Council continued to provide interim emergency veterinary services assistance to Mayo County Council. The primary duty being antemortem and postmortem inspections in 5 abattoirs approved by Mayo County Council. This assistance was provided for in a Section 86 agreement between both local authorities which runs from 1st September 2024 to 31st October 2024.

So far in 2024: 943 bovines, 5,912 ovines and 92 poultry have been processed through local abattoirs.

DOG CONTROL

On October 1st, 2024, regulations came into force prohibiting the importing, breeding, selling and re-homing of XL Bullies.

A new system of certification for existing owners of XL Bully dogs is now in place and over the period 1st October 2024 to 1st February 2025 all existing XL Bully owners will have to apply for a Certificate of Exemption.

Certificates of Exemption will be issued subject to strict criteria, including a requirement for licensing, microchipping and neutering.

After 1st February 2025, any owner not compliant with the new regulations will have their dog seized and euthanized.

Three applications for certificates of exemption have been received by Galway County Council to date.

Galway County Council dog warden and veterinary personnel attended a further training programme on the identification of XL Bully Type Dogs which was held in Dublin on the 20th of October. An initial training programme was also completed by the service in September.

The Department of Rural and Community Development has committed funding under the Dog Control Support Initiative to the local authorities again in October 2024 with Galway County Council receiving an allocation of €67,967 in capital funding. This amount was also received in 2023.

It is proposed to use a substantial part of the funding allocated to carry out upgrade works to the shelter which will help future proof the service in respect of the health and wellbeing of the dogs in our care as well as assisting in improving health and safety for the dog wardens, shelter keeper and veterinary personnel on site.



851 dog licenses were purchased for the month of September, 306 of which were purchased online with the balance purchased through the local post office.

5 fixed penalty notices were issued to dog owners during the months of July and August for offences under the Control of Dogs Act 1986.

2 sheep attacks were reported to the service during October 2024, in the Kilasolan and Kilconnell areas of the County.

Galway County Council have partnered with MADRA regarding rolling out a pilot programme, MADRA'S Talking Dog Workshops, to schools in the county. This program had been trialed initially in Galway City. These are educational and fun dog-focused workshops and will be provided to 3rd and 4th class students. This programme will commence in December 2024.

WATER QUALITY AND ENFORCEMENT

AGRICULTURE

A meeting was held with LAWPRO in relation to planning Agricultural inspections in November and December 2024. A number of waterbodies have been chosen in at risk areas and in protected areas. Inspections will be carried out in the following waterbody areas:

- Kilcolgan_020
- Owenriff (Corrib) 010
- Glennamucka 010

The council received a red dot notification from the EPA in relation to an EPA monitoring point near Gurteen village in east Galway. A red dot notification is where a monitoring point has dropped 2 or more classes since the previous time it was sampled. It dropped from satisfactory in 2021 to poor in 2024. This monitoring point is in the Glennamucka_010 waterbody. Water sampling has been carried out recently by environment staff in this

waterbody, upstream of the EPA monitoring point. Testing included checks for presence of pesticides and herbicides. This testing reported satisfactory results. 16 farms have been inspected with high GAP compliance rates recorded. 3 more farms have yet to be inspected.

Environment section staff presented to two different groups of farmers on the 21^{st of} October in the Ard Ri hotel in Tuam. The main part of the presentation was on water quality protection and farming. The talk outlined the planned increase in farm inspections that will be carried out by Galway County Council.


Galway County Council is required to carry out 38 planned inspections in 2024, with this doubling to 76 in 2025. There was also a presentation on septic tanks and the national inspection plan. The talk presented the downward trend of water quality across the country and that agriculture has the greatest impact on a number of water bodies and these areas are where the inspections will be focused, i.e. poorly draining soils, etc.

NATIONAL INSPECTION PROGRAMME

Septic tank inspections for 2024 were completed in October with a total of 235 for the year. This is a very large increase compared with 2023. Staff are busy at present issuing certs of



compliance or advisory notices and following up on previous advisory notices issued.

LOCATIONS OF FAILED 2024 SEPTIC TANK INSPECTIONS

TRAINING

Training took place in Castlebar on dealing with Aggressive Behaviour. Administration and technical staff often must deal with this kind of behaviour from members of the public and so this training is important for health and safety and gaining positive outcomes to problems encountered.



Oil Pollution incident command training also took place in Limerick. Two members of water quality team attended.

Environment Inspection Skills training took place in Castlebar. A solicitor with 30 years' experience in this area presented. Valuable information was gathered here on various aspects of taking enforcement cases, such as keeping contemporaneous notes, interviewing, gathering evidence and statutory time frames for taking cases for different legislation. Five members of the water quality team attended.

PLANNING

Staff attended a number of Large Residential Development pre-planning meetings, most of which were proposed housing developments. There was also a meeting in relation to Sceirde Rocks Off-shore wind farm. This was the last meeting with Galway County Council presubmission of planning application.

WASTE/AIR MANAGEMENT AND ENFORCEMENT

12 litter fines were issued by the Community Warden service during the month of October.



We had several cases before the District Count in October all of which were adjourned.

One case to note is a prosecution under the Waste Management Act against an individual who is responsible for an unauthorised scrap yard. This individual is renting his yard to third parties who are breaking cars and exporting containers of car parts to Africa. As part of our investigations a multi-agency inspection was carried out with the TFS. As a result of this, 3 containers were stopped from leaving the country as they



contained waste car parts and engines that were not depolluted. The TFS is taking separate legal action against the owner and operators of the site.

WASTE MANAGEMENT NOTICES ISSUED

4 warning letters, 3 Section 18 Notices and 2 Section 55 Notices were issued under the Waste Management Act in October.

7 files were sent to the Law Agents for prosecution.

AIR POLLUTION / SOLID FUEL REGS

A meeting was held between Galway County Council, Galway City Council and the Revenue Commissioners relating to ongoing investigations into fuel suppliers that are placing unauthorised coal on the market. Following this meeting GCC staff carried out some surveillance on some of the alleged offenders.

Staff will attend the annual EPA clean air conference in November. Following on from this we hope to have more guidance as to how best to approach these investigations.

WERLA

Management attended the CUWERLA Steering Group meeting, and the Operations Team meeting. Members of the waste enforcement team attended the quarterly Waste Enforcement Officers WERLA meeting at their offices in Carrick on Shannon

A meeting was facilitated between CUWERLA and Barna Recycling relating to the roll out of Brown Bins/ food bins to the entire County. Both Barna Recycling and Panda will not meet the deadline of end of year for complete roll out of food bins to all their customers. These are the 2 biggest collectors in the Connaught region, therefore if they are not meeting targets the entire region is falling short. WERLA have indicated that they intend to take legal action in the new year in relation to this matter.

ANTI-DUMPING INITIATIVE 2024

A Bulky Goods collection was carried out in Loughrea in October, approximately 10 tonnes of bulky items were collected.





Additionally, the Committee supports the Internal Audit Unit and maintains a strong emphasis on value for money across the organisation. The meeting was facilitated by the Ms. Eileen Ruane Director for Corporate Services, along with the committee's secretary Ms. Eibhlín Curran, Head of Internal Audit. The members had a productive meeting setting out their approach and objectives for the forthcoming term.

Classes for Councillors will commence in January post the General Election period. The staff classes commencing this month had 64 employees registered alone for this new term.





LIBRARY SERVICES & ARCHIVES

Galway Public Libraries provide an extensive array of services to the community and fulfil the key actions set out in national policy on the provision of an inclusive library service.

Key elements include extensive lending services to adults and children, PC access, printing, scanning, national book request service, study spaces, newspapers, and magazines.

It provides activity and event spaces for community groups, schools, local NGO's, arts and creative groups and various County Council departments. It works in collaboration with various organisations to deliver workshops and programmes to upskill and better inform communities about issues that are relevant to them.



It also provides a selection of online resources that are available free to registered library members. These online resources allow 24/7 access to a virtual library along with software and educational supports for those with additional needs. These include: Borrowbox for online eBooks and eAudiobooks, Comics Plus, Universal class for courses, Transparent Language online, LOTE for kids, Medici TV, TTRS and Nessy for online learning support.



COMMUNITY OUTREACH AND MOBILE SERVICES

Outreach events provide an opportunity for Galway Public Libraries to promote our services and engage with people across the county. We provide a vital role in supporting rural and isolated communities. Some of our patrons may be impacted by mobility, visual or auditory challenges or have limited access to transport. Outreach can play a significant role in helping overcome these barriers.

Our outreach team looks to support people, build connections, and develop relationships with people in their communities. We do this by working with partners and groups across the community, voluntary and statutory sectors, to talk about the services we offer and showcase our work. In September and October, we attended several events where we brought along a pop-up library, signed up members, demonstrated our digital resources and engaged with many diverse community groups.

On the evening of Monday 2nd September, we travelled to Mountbellew to deliver a talk to Mountbellew Active Retirement Group. We talked about the general library services, digital services, Healthy Ireland at Your Library and our local history and archive collections. The talk was attended by 40 people. Nine people who were not already members signed up at the end of the evening.

On Thursday the 5th September we attended the Make the Link Roadshow in Loughrea. The main event was hosted by Galway Rural Development and as a participant in the full day event, we brought along our pop-up library and showcased our library services. Twelve people signed up to the library on the day.

The Monivea Agricultural Show took place on Sunday the 8th September and the outreach team attended. We showcased our library services and the services provided by Ballinasloe Library and Europe Direct. We also had a children's storytime in the library tent and distributed Little Library Book Bags to the children who attended. Fourteen people signed up to the library on the day.

On Tuesday the 10th September we attended the Make the Link Roadshow in Gort. The main event was hosted by Galway Rural Development and as a participant in the full day event, we brought along our pop-up library and showcased our library services. Fourteen people signed up to the library on the day.





The Glenamaddy Agricultural Show took place on the 29th September. Our outreach team attended to bring information on the library and its services to people living in rural north Galway. Information on Europe Direct services from Ballinasloe Library was also showcased. Sixty Little Library Book Bags were distributed.

On the 2nd October we attended the Positive Ageing event in Loughrea as part of Positive Ageing Week. Again, we brought along a pop-up library, signed up members and showcased our resources and Healthy Ireland at Your Library. Six people signed up on the day.

We attended a Menopause Symposium hosted by the HSE on Thursday the 17th October. This was an event for health care professionals and was a great opportunity to showcase our general library services to health care workers, particularly our Healthy Ireland at Your Library Resources.

On October 25th, a library staff member hosted a stand to showcase library services, particularly Healthy Ireland at Your Library, at Galway Rural Development's Health and Wellbeing event. The event took place in Athenry and provided an ideal opportunity to reach a large audience. Several people signed up for library membership.

RIGHT TO READ

'Right to Read' is a national programme to promote literacy and reading development for people of all ages and backgrounds. It currently includes four national programmes that are designed to promote children's reading and literacy. This season's programme is the Children's Book Festival.

The 'Book it!' Festival is a strategic partnership between the County Arts Office under their funding programme and is co-funded by the Arts Council along with support from the city services.

The aims of the programme are to encourage children to enjoy the experience of reading and support their reading development along with the promotion of children's books, stories and to increase engagement with families and schools.

BOOK IT! CHILDREN'S BOOK FESTIVAL 2024

Book It! is Galway's very own annual Children's Book Festival that runs every October. It is a great opportunity for young people, parents, teachers, and libraries to celebrate books and reading.



As a central tenet of the Right to Read initiative, the festival aims to encourage children and young people to enjoy the experience of reading and support their reader development through activities and events in collaboration with writers, artists, and storytellers.

This festival endeavours to encourage and share the joy of reading with as many children as possible in County Galway. This festival also fosters the promotion of literacy and education; community engagement; cultural enrichment as well as inspiring creativity and highlighting local talent.

The 2024 festival saw activities in 17 branches with over 500 children participating

in the County. Branches that hosted events were Loughrea, Oranmore, Ballygar, Gort, Dunmore, Killimor, Portumna, Ballinasloe, Woodford, Tuam, Oughterard, Leenane, Leabharlann an Spidéil agus Leabharlann na Ceathrún Rua.

The over-riding aim of this festival is to foster a love for reading and learning while strengthening community bonds.

Programming for this year's festival showcased local authors such as Serena Molloy, Julie Anne de Brún and Maebh McDonnell as well as workshops on book creation with Kids' Own publishing, superhero development with the Learning Garden and visits from author and illustrator Wayne O'Connor bringing the stories of Roald Dahl to life. Mary Murphy delivered two wonderful sessions on book development, the printing process and showed children how to use perspective in their illustrations. The festival also included talks and



presentations by Michael Smith on the Irish seaman and Antarctic Explorer Tom Crean, discussions with authors on story creation and how they started their careers in writing along with visits from internationally renowned Irish storyteller Niall de Búrca.

The Learning Garden helped children in Woodford library design their own superhero, while in Killimor and Portumna they made Harry Potter wands and explored all aspects of their favourite Harry Potter books. In Loughrea and Ballinasloe they worked on paper folding, the art of calligraphy, crest and motto design.



The sharing of stories, improvisation and theatrics abounded with storytellers Niall de Búrca in Tuam library and Sarah Sparkles in Ballygar library.





Wayne O'Connor brought the stories of Roald Dahl to life in Gort Library, for a younger audience, while the older children got to explore the fantastical world of mythical beings and old Irish legends.





Irish seaman and Antarctic Explorer Tom Crean was the subject of talks and presentations hosted by former award-winning journalist with *The Guardian* and *The Observer*, Michael Smith. Michael met with local schools who visited Loughrea library for these very

informative sessions and visited Kilnadeema National School.

In Oranmore and Portumna, author Eve McDonnell talked about her new children's novel *The Last Boy* and introduced its main character, Brewster – a chimney sweep. With help from the audience, they sang the Sweep-O song as they demonstrated climbing through a chimney-sized prop.



Children's author, Mary Murphy undertook a tour of the county, stopping off in Dunmore, Leenane and Oughterard libraries, reading from her books and creating wonderful pieces of art with the children.







HEALTHY IRELAND AT YOUR LIBRARY

Healthy Ireland, a government-led initiative, is the national strategy to improve health and wellbeing, placing a focus on prevention, individual awareness and keeping people healthy for longer. Public libraries are currently delivering the nationwide Healthy Ireland at Your Library programme and this is a valuable resource within the community for health information.

The resource includes a comprehensive collection of books on health and wellbeing, extensive online resources incorporating eBooks, eAudiobooks and eMagazines. In addition to this remit there is an extensive calendar of events, workshops and talks with a focus on physical health, mental health, and health literacy.

Galway public library service organizes a series of Healthy Ireland events annually. A full programme of events was held during the first six months of the year and more recently the following talks were scheduled.


<u>www.galway.ie/archives/collections</u> The transition from Adlib to Axiell has been a long and complex process. The Archives wishes to acknowledge and thank its IT colleagues for their assistance throughout the process.

The online catalogue provides public information on Galway County Council's wonderful

archival holdings, comprised of a fascinating array of collections, dating from the early 1600s to the present day. Access to the Archives is by appointment in the Reading Room in Island House (email archivist@galwaycoco.ie).

As part of celebrations to mark 125 years of local government and Galway County Council, the <u>Archives</u> section produced a double-sided exhibition panel with a small section of images spanning the decades.

This was displayed in Áras an Chontae in October together with the exhibition produced by the Department of Housing,



Planning and Local Government in association with Local Government Archivists and Records Managers in 2019, to mark 120 years of local government.



The publication, 125 Years of Local Government, featuring contributions from Galway County Council Archives, together with a slightly updated online version of the 2019 exhibition was <u>launched</u> by the Department in October.







LOCAL STUDIES

The Local Studies department at the County Library HQ specializes in providing information on a variety of topics, with a focus on local history, genealogy, and general reference queries. It serves as the primary repository for the library's local history materials, which include books, newspapers, and maps.

The department plays a crucial role in preserving and providing access to information about the locality. Key functions include historical research, genealogy, community information, preservation, educational support, and digital access.



AUTHOR AND HISTORIAN VISIT

New Zealand Historian and Author, Mr. Rod Smith, visited the Local Studies Section of Galway Public Libraries on October 18th to present the library with a copy of his new book, "Clancarty, the high times and humble of a noble Irish Family". This book is a product of years of research by Rod on the history of the Trench Family, Earls of Clancarty, and spans nine generations and 220 years, from their life at Garbally House, to their eventual retreat to England. It is a very valuable addition to the library. It traces the family lineage from Frederic De La Tranche, a Huguenot exile in the late 1500's, and includes biographies of all the various



Earls, down to the present time. Rod's wife Glennis is a direct descendant of Rear Admiral William Le Poer Trench, a son of the first Earl, William Power Keating Trench. Another son of the first Earl was the last Anglican Archbishop of Tuam, Power Le Poer Trench, (1770-1839).





A delightful early guidebook held by the Local Studies section of Galway Public Libraries is "Connaught" by Stephen Gwynn, published in 1912, and illustrated with beautiful paintings, by the artist Alexander Williams, R.H.A. An interesting feature of this copy is that it is signed

by Alexander Williams, a notable Irish Artist, whose paintings are currently in the National Gallery of Ireland, and the Hugh Lane Gallery, amongst others. Reading the book gives a vivid glimpse into Connaught as it was in 1912, and a way of life that has since disappeared. One example is Tuam, described as having a "long street of thatched houses, its marketplace crowded with Irish speaking men and women, all in



characteristic western dress". Galway town is described as "Depressing beyond words, but also more picturesque than any town in Ireland".

BALLYBANE LIBRARY

EASTSIDE ARTS FESTIVAL

The library was one of the strategic partners in the foundation of a new community Arts festival in Galway City. Ballybane Library partnered with the Cumasú Centre in Doughiska, the Ballybane Resource Centre and Creative Ireland Galway City Council, with the aim of



enriching the lives of local residents and giving them pride of place and community through a display of the richness of creative talent in their areas.

The development and delivery of this festival utilized a human centred design approach with extensive public engagement and community outreach by the steering committee. Many events were hosted in the library with staff attending all events over the two days.

The team also looked to the artists of the wider community of Galway to showcase the

The team also looked to the artists of the wider community of Galway to showcase the wealth of creativity that can be aspired to and indeed to inspire.

The success of the festival was noticed through the positivity that has come through the library doors and extensive community connections will allow the library to further embed itself in the community.





STORY TELLING

Galway County Libraries supported the festival by having story sessions in the six primary schools on the east side of the city.

Niall de Búrca the renowned storyteller, entertained in 4 schools whilst the Ballybane library staff covered the other two schools.

On Saturday morning Friends of Merlin Woods led a festival parade with pop up dramatics in the local woods.



Library staff and Creative Ireland, Galway City Partnership and Cumasú staff were on hand to help.

ONGOING EVENTS

Over the months of September and October, the Ballybane library hosted its usual monthly book clubs for adults, children and teenagers. The two adult book clubs catered for 22 adults who come from estates on the east side of the city. The adults who attend are delighted to have somewhere to go where they have company and are welcomed.

The teen book club caters to a diverse group. All are delighted to have found a welcoming refuge in Ballybane library. The two children's book clubs are relatively new and host approx. 20 children. These book clubs bring accompanying adults and siblings into the library on a Saturday afternoon.

Our lively parent and toddler mornings in conjunction with Music Generation Galway continue to draw a large group of local young parents who are delighted to find a welcoming safe space to relax and meet other young parents.

In cooperation with the HSE, on the first three Tuesdays of each month, in our Maker Space, new mothers and their babies meet with local Public Health Nurses who discuss issues that may affect new mothers and how to cope with them.

In conjunction with the GRETB we continue with our basic computer and smart phone classes attended by approx. 25 adults each week, led by Ruth Kelly.

Each Thursday morning the Maker Space hosts lively classes for parents of pupils attending the DEIS schools on the east side of the city. The funding of tutors is organized by the HSCL teachers at each school.

Our Saturday morning Storytime and Feed the Fish is attended by on average 10 local families each week, the theme of the most recent story time was Self Esteem.





The Ballybane library craft group is attended by 12 local women from diverse communities and their present project involves each person knitting a figurine for our Christmas crib.

Their last project culminated in a beautiful patchwork quilt which is used by the new mothers and babies at their meetings.

BALLINASLOE LIBRARY

During Positive Ageing Week, Ballinasloe Library launched their new accessible keyboard.







The keyboard features clear and large font keys, making it ideal for seniors or individuals with visual impairments who may have difficulty reading small print.

This was funded by the Dormant Accounts Fund and is part of a suite of accessible equipment and furniture that is being distributed throughout the libraries to address issues of mobility and access.

FÁILTE ISTEACH ENGLISH CONVERSATION CLASSES

Every Tuesday at Ballinasloe Library, local volunteers provide group conversation classes to Ukrainian, Polish, Malaysian, Brazilian and Arabic communities living in or near Ballinasloe. READ, PLAY, CREATE

Sensory Art Workshops were held on 9th and 16th October. Read, Play and Create! was an exciting and unique collaboration between the artist and educator Kate Kelly of Art Room 109 and Ballinasloe Library. The 'Read, Play and Create' programme was especially designed to help parents and caretakers to connect with their local community, engage with their children, and to incorporate bookish play in a creative way.

The workshops were targeted at parents and

walking toddlers aged

between 1 and 5 years, with a focus on the importance of creativity and play in the development of children. 




BOOK LAUNCH


Ballinasloe Library Staff held a Halloween Arts & Crafts session on October 31. Ballinasloe

Galway City Library staff ran Family Storytime as part of Children's Book Festival month, for three Saturdays in a row.












WILLOW WEAVING

CPO ACTIVATION PROGRAMME

GALWAY COUNTY COUNCIL TARGETS VACANT AND DERELICT PROPERTIES

Galway County Council has identified 40 derelict buildings in County Galway for inclusion in the first phase of a nationwide programme to address vacancy and underutilisation of residential properties to help contribute to the supply of housing.

The registered owners of the properties have been directed to bring them back into use within a set timeframe or risk having the buildings compulsorily acquired by the Local Authority.

Located in Tuam (9), Loughrea (7), Ballinasloe (7), Conamara (9) and Oranmore/Athenry (8), the properties have been targeted as part of the CPO Activation Programme through which local authorities are required to adopt a proactive, planned and systematic approach to the identification and activation of vacant and derelict properties.

In a GeoDirectory Vacancy Data Survey undertaken by Galway County Council, 817 properties were deemed vacant and/or derelict, of which 773 were deemed to be

vacant and 44 properties were deemed to be vacant and derelict. In a written communication issued this week, Galway County Council has requested the registered owners of 40 derelict properties to outline how they intend to bring the buildings back into use.

Councillor Albert Dolan, Cathaoirleach of the County of Galway commented, "The CPO Activation Programme will be welcomed by those who want to access home ownership and wish to be given the opportunity to access those properties lying vacant in their communities."



"This initial activation will give owners opportunities to revitalise their own properties within a defined timeframe with access to various funding support schemes being provided, but, importantly, also gives Galway County Council the authority to compulsorily acquire properties in order to bring them back into use," added Councillor Dolan.

Liam Conneally, Chief Executive of Galway County Council described the CPO Activation Programme as "a dynamic programme and an opportunity to drive change and progression in the development of town and village centres."

He continued, "Advice and support schemes are available to those owners who are willing and able to bring their properties back in to use but Galway County Council is equally keen to tackle the issue of properties lying idle in our county."

According to **Michael Owens, Director of Services for Housing**, "The Vacant Homes Team is available to advise and assist in bringing these properties back in to use which has been successfully exhibited through the use of the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant. The CPO Activation Programme supports Galway County Council's aim for every household that has a need to be able to access quality and affordable homes. Bringing vacant homes back in to use will assist in achieving this objective either by supporting owners or the acquiring of properties through legislative means."

Meanwhile, Galway County Council confirmed that significant interest has been received throughout the county in relation to the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grants (Croí Cónaithe) Scheme, which facilitates the transformation of unsightly and vacant properties into dwelling houses over a reasonably short period of time.

465 applications have been received to date of which 283 have subsequently been approved to enter the Vacancy/Dereliction Activation Programme. The 283 applications that have received initial approval to date are located in Athenry / Oranmore (31), Ballinasloe (60), Conamara (61), Loughrea (71) and Tuam (60), and have been approved for €15,836,250.62 to carry out refurbishment works to their vacant and derelict properties.

SOCIAL WORK [HOUSING]

IRISH ASSOCIATION OF SOCIAL WORKERS (IASW) CONFERENCE

The conference was very informative and beneficial for local authority social workers to be up to speed on good practice in other sectors.

CHILD PROTECTION

The Child Protection Officer role for the organisation is held by Kieran Keon, Senior Social Worker. This involves ensuring the organisations is adhering to Children's First legislation, responding to referrals, liaison with Tusla on behalf of Galway County Council and responding to and supporting staff regarding concerns for child welfare. Should staff, public representative have any queries, they can contact the Social Work team in Galway County Council. If they witness any incidents, they can also liaise with us, but they will need to make their report directly to Tusla.

SEX OFFENDER ACCOMMODATION NETWORK

The CCMA are establishing a Sex Offender Accommodation Network to provide a forum for collaboration, information sharing, and feedback contribution to the CCMA Housing Committee. The Network will likely be chaired by the CCMA/LGMA SORAM representative (Director of Service) from a local authority. Kieran Keon, Senior Social Worker, Galway County Council has contributed to the development of this network and terms of reference via the Local authority lead in the SORAM office. The development of the network is welcome in supporting the role of SOLO (Sexual Offences Liaison Officer), which is part of the Senior Social Worker's role in Galway County Council.

LOCAL AUTHORITY SOCIAL WORK CONFERENCE

The 30th Annual Social Work and Welfare Officer Conference 2024 takes place during November, hosted by Wexford County Council. The conference will deliver presentations and shared learning on many aspects of Social Work, both within the local authority setting



and learning from stakeholders. The National Review of LA Social Work which is not finalised yet will also be discussed.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

On October 24th, senior officials from Galway County Council and Galway City Council met with property developers, planners and key stakeholders to explore opportunities for delivering new affordable housing projects across Galway. The briefing at the Menlo Park Hotel highlighted the significance of incorporating affordable housing into the Galway City and Galway County Development Plans and the growing need to a find solutions-based approach to the housing crisis. The developers in attendance were encouraged to collaborate with the local authorities on future housing schemes and were informed about the latest regulatory frameworks and funding mechanisms supporting affordable housing initiatives.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING ONLINE APPLICATION PORTAL OPEN





Galway County Council invited prospective homeowners to apply for the new affordable houses at Garraí na Gaoithe, Baile Chláir, County Galway. There is a total of 17 affordable homes been offered in phase 1 of the development, consisting of 2 No. 2 bed, 9 No. 3 bed, and 6 No. 4 bed houses. Applications were accepted online on Galway County Council's website from 14th October 2024 to November 11th November 2024. A total of 165 applications were received for Phase 1.

Galway County Council are currently reviewing and assessing applications against Galway County Council's scheme of priority for Affordable Dwelling Purchase Arrangements.

ENERGY RETROFITS

Galway County Council continues to carry out the energy retrofit of Council houses to a minimum B2 Building Energy Rating (BER) standard. It is anticipated that we will have completed retrofitting on 73 properties in 2024, an addition to the 207 which were retrofitted between 2021 and 2023. The properties retrofitted are a mix of house types, in accordance with the requirements of the Programme.

CAPITAL BUILD PROGRAMME

PART 8 FOR RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT AT COSMONA, LOUGHREA

On 11th October, notice was given (under the Part 8 process) that Galway County Council proposes to carry out a housing development at Cosmona, Loughrea.

The residential development consisting of: 56 new housing units - 44 no. houses and 12 no. apartments comprises:

- 16 no. 2 bedroom houses
- 25 no. 3 bedroom houses
- 2 no. 4 bedroom houses
- 1 no. 5 bedroom house
- 6 no. 1 bedroom apartments
- 6 no. 2 bedroom apartments

The development includes varied boundary treatments and landscaping works; all ancillary site development works and site services necessary to facilitate the proposed development including an Irish Water pumping station and parking for the existing graveyard adjacent to the west of the site (adjacent to a Burial Ground which is a national monument NIAH GA105-066).

In accordance with the Habitats Directive, Appropriate Assessment Screening has been carried out on the project. An Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) screening determination has been made and concludes that there is no real likelihood of significant effects on the environment arising from the proposed development.

Plans & particulars of the proposed development are available for inspection. Submissions or observations in relation to the proposed development, dealing with the proper planning & sustainable development of the area in which the development would be situated, may be submitted no later than Monday the 2nd of December 2024.

A mini competition was advertised on Galway County & City Design Build Consultants Framework for: Architect-led fully integrated design team services for the provision housing on a 1.58 Ha. site at St. Jospeh's Rd., Portumna, through the accelerated delivery programme for delivery by Design and Build, with a closing date of 23rd September 2024.

A Tender assessment was undertaken and the Most Economically Advantageous Tenderer (MEAT) was Simon J. Kelly & Partners, as Lead Architects, with an integrated design team



comprising: TC Estimating Services (Quantity Surveyors), Coyle Kennedy Limited (Civil & Structural Engineers), Varming Consulting (Mechanical & Electrical Engineers) and ORS Limited (PSDP).



A contract signing for engagement of this integrated design team took place on 5th November in the Council Chamber.

HOUSING LANDBANK

Housing Circular 33/2024: National Social Housing Data Map – Annual Assessment of Land Available for Housing Delivery, was issued on 15th October.

This Circular advised Local Authorities of the requirement to update relevant information on the G.I.S. Mapping Database known as the National Social Housing Data Map.

In addition to this requirement, Local Authorities are required to return two reports to the Housing Delivery Co-ordination office by 27th November - detailing the remaining landbank and Social & Affordable Approved sites.

Galway County Council Housing Capital section are currently compiling this information.

In conjunction with this exercise, a presentation on the housing landbank was prepared and given by Eithne Murphy, Senior Executive Engineer at the Housing SPC Meeting on 14th November.

HOUSING LANDBANK – SHORT TERM DEVELOPABLE LANDS

PART 8 FOR NO. 4 CLOONLYON CRESCENT, BALLYGAR

Further to a Part 8 process, a Chief Executive's Report was prepared recommending the development of a 4- bedroom house at no. 4 Cloonlyon Crescent.

This report was considered by elected members of Ballinalsoe M.D. at their October meeting on 16-10-2024 where it was decided that the development may proceed, as recommended.

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT, FIRE & EMERGENCY & CLIMATE CHANGE

STORM ASHLEY

On Friday 18th October, Galway County Council, together with other organisations, received a briefing from the National Directorate of Fire and Emergency Management (NDFEM). This included a comprehensive update from Met Eireann on the weekend weather warnings and potential implications of those warnings countrywide.

Galway County Council had already begun its' preparations for the storm with the above briefing further assisting in the targeting of preparations and communications to the coastal areas. The NDFEM held a further briefing on Saturday morning (19th October) indicating the storm would coincide with a period of very high tides; at 7am and 7pm on Sunday. This combination had the potential to cause significant impacts in Galway at both time periods.



Galway County Council operates an On-Call (Out of Hours) service to assist with dealing with Roads issues during evenings, at night and at weekends. Over the weekend there were 8 senior outdoor staff 'on call' together with attendant crews, plant and equipment. In anticipation of greater impacts on our coastal areas, the Council delivered sandbags to a



number of key locations along the coast; from Kinvara through to Clarinbridge, Oranmore and westwards to Roundstone. A team of senior management within the Council assisted with coordination and other supports for the outdoor staff.

During this event, as with all severe weather events, the Council maintained communications with the crews on the ground, the Fire Service, the Civil Defence and An Garda Siochana. The Council benefited from its' bespoke self-

developed management IT system for such events called 'SWEMS' (Severe Weather Emergency Management System). This enables us to map incidents and damage as we

become aware of same to facilitate a clear picture of storm impact and the targeting of our resources. Galway County Council also uses the MapAlerter system with specific messages issued to targeted coastal areas. Key public safety messaging from the NDFEM was repeated on social media throughout, together with messaging tailored for Galway County.



Galway County experienced impacts as

early as Friday evening with high tide flooding a number of coastal roads. The weather picked up again on Saturday evening, peaking during the high tide on Sunday morning and again on Sunday evening. Coastal areas experienced wave-overtopping, seaweed deposition and some flooding of roads but the impacts there were less severe than originally expected. The orange wind warning, however, did take its' toll across the breadth of the county with fallen trees, damage to powerlines, phonelines and damage to traffic signals. On call crews worked from Sunday morning late into Sunday night removing trees and debris and keeping routes open. The cleanup continued into the following days and is generally now fully complete.



GALWAY COUNTY COUNCIL PARKING CONCESSIONS CHRISTMAS 2024

FIRE & EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

OPERATIONS

The information below is based on October data from West Regional Control Centre (WRCC). Galway Fire and Rescue Service (GFRS) had 143 turnouts to 127 Incidents. That is a decrease of just 1 incident on 128 the previous month. 57 were fire incidents, 69 were special service incidents (road traffic collision (RTC), Automatic Fire Alarms (AFA's), flooding, storm damage, etc.) and 1 was standby either in station or at a central location. Of those incidents, 47.11% were attended by Fire Service resources within 10 minutes of alert, 35.54% were attended between 10 and 20 minutes and 17.36% were attended in over 20 minutes. The average turnout time for the Full-time station in Galway City was 2.01 minutes and for county retained stations was 5.54 minutes.

CAPITAL PROJECTS

ATHENRY FIRE STATION

Construction of the New Fire Station in Athenry is complete and operations were transferred to the new fire station on the 25th October 2024. The station was officially opened by An Cathaoirleach, Albert Dolan and Anne Rabbitte, Minister of State on the 15th November 2024.

LOUGHREA FIRE STATION

Following Senior Management Team approval, the revised application under Part 8 of the Planning and Development Regulations for the proposed Loughrea Fire Station has been submitted for publication on the 11th October 2024. The public consultation process ends on the 22nd November 2024. It is hoped that the Chief Executive's report will be submitted to the Loughrea Municipal District meeting in December for members consideration. Briefings for MD members were held on the 08th and 15th July 2024 and further meetings are planned prior to the December Municipal District meeting.



PROPOSED NEW FIRE STATION LOUGHREA

PREVENTION

The information in the following is based on the October figures. The Fire Authority received 18 Fire Safety Certificate applications and issued decisions on 12 applications. 5 Disability Access Certificate applications were received, and decisions made on 10 applications. A total of 9 new licenses were issued and 56 inspections were conducted.

TRAINING

Manual Handling refresher training was delivered to all county retained fire stations during August and September 2024.

Four Breathing Apparatus refresher training courses were delivered in October. The location of the training was Sligo fire station.

A firefighter from Loughrea fire station attended a Rope Rescue Supervisor course which was held in Portlaoise, Co. Laois. The duration of the course was five days in total.

Two new recruit firefighters commenced their initial training Firefighting Skills course which took place in Lanesboro fire station, Co. Longford. The training was completed on the 8th November. This will bring the total number of new recruits who have completed their initial training thus far in 2024 to 19 which already significantly exceeds the average total annual intake of recruit firefighters. The newly trained recruits will be stationed at Mountbellew (x1) and Gort (x1) fire stations.

1 no. fulltime firefighter and 1 no. retained firefighter attended the NDFEM "Fire Station Trainer" course which took place in Newbridge Fire Station. The aim of the course is to assist



fire authorities in developing and updating their ability to deliver efficient and effective fire and rescue services. The course provided our trainees with the skills and knowledge necessary to facilitate them to effectively deliver fire service training, including fire service drills, facts and skills lessons at station level.

Four personnel attended a workshop in the area of urban search and rescue. The aim of this 2-day workshop was to develop our personnel's knowledge in the area of Urban Search and Rescue and to familiarise them with and consider the current project relating to the building of a national USAR response capacity and framework in Ireland.

The Chief Fire Officer Association's Technical Seminar took place in Tullamore. This one-day event was attended by one senior fire officer.

A water rescue instructor assessment took place in October. It was attended by 3 no. retained, 4 no. fulltime personnel and 1 no. senior officer.

The emergency first responder refresher programme commenced on the 5th of November. A total of 2 no. three day refresher courses are taking place in November with a further two courses to take place in December.

2 no. Single Rope Technique, Initial / Recertification training courses commenced on the 5th and 11th November respectfully.

1 no. firefighter will be attending an Emergency Services Driving Standard (ESDS) instructor course. This is a 12-day course whose primary aim is to enhance the training capability of fire authorities in the area of ESDS. The course is designed to provide existing ESDS drivers with the necessary skills and knowledge to deliver blue light driver training at county, regional or national level. GFRS will be providing 1 no. ESDS instructor to the NDFEM for the delivery of this training.

A Breathing Apparatus initial wearers course commenced on 11th November. This is being conducted by GFRS on behalf of the Local Authority Services National Training Group and is accredited by QQI. There will be thirteen GFRS trainees on the course with four GFRS instructors and one Sligo FRS instructor.

One senior fire officer is scheduled to attend a media skills course for senior officers which is being conducted by the NDFEM. The aim of this media skills course is to enhance the capabilities of fire authorities to manage and prepare for media interactions, including press briefing, the preparation of media statements and interviews with the print media, radio and television.

2 Water Rescue Initial and Refresher courses were held on the 05th– 08^{th} November 2024 and the 11th– 14th November 2024 at Galway Airport. 8 New Water Rescue Instructors qualified on a Water Rescue Instructors course and assessment course held on the 09^{th} – 13th September 2024 and the 21^{st} – 25^{th} November 2024 respectively. A new Rope Rescue Supervisor qualified at a course in Portlaoise Fire Station in October 2024

A number of senior fire officers are scheduled to attend the one-day NDFEM Senior Officer Seminar scheduled to take place in Tullamore. The aim of the seminar is to enhance the capability of fire authorities to provide effective and efficient fire and emergency services, through the provision of development opportunities for senior fire officers.



MAJOR EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

COLAS (CBE WEST) ORANMORE

A multi-Principal Response Agency review commenced of the Upper Tier COMAH (Control of Major Accident Hazards) Site at Colas in Oranmore, with a Principal Response Agency & relevant stakeholder meeting early in April. The required statutory exercise was conducted on the 23 May 2024 in Oranmore and led by Galway FRS. The updated External Emergency Plan for the site was advertised for Public Consultation on the 11th October 2024 and the latest date for submissions was the 15th November 2024. A further blind mobilisation test




CIRCLE K FUEL TERMINAL - GALWAY PORT

ISLAND RESPONSE PLAN

Galway County Council with MEM West Regional Working Group are to conduct a combined Conamara Airport and Island Response Plan Exercise in late November 2024. The exercise will be both tabletop and practical, testing the coordination and response of the Principle Response Agencies, Principle Emergency Services, Coast Guard, RNLI, Airport Authority and other relevant stakeholders to simultaneous incidents at the onshore airport and an offshore island.




CHEMICAL BIOLOGICAL RADIOLOGICAL NUCLEAR EXERCISE

Galway County Council with MEM West Regional Working Group will conduct a Chemical Biological Radiological Nuclear (CBRN) exercise in December 2024 with An Garda Síochána and the HSE. The exercise is both tabletop and practical, testing inter-operability and coordination of the Fire Service HAZMAT and An Garda Síochána CBRN capabilities.

NUROP AND SEVERE WEATHER EVENT MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

Work continues on the NUROP (National Unified Risk Operating Platform) and SWEMS (Severe Weather Event Management System). A new NUROP Manager Application has been released which includes risk scores for every domestic and non-domestic building in the county. SWEMS has recently been extended to Galway City Council and a multi-county exercise involving Donegal, Westmeath, Wicklow, Galway City and CARO is planned for early November 2024. SWEMS was successfully used in Galway County Council for the recent storm



CIVIL DEFENCE

Ongoing Induction training of new volunteers is continuing. 22 new members have engaged in training currently.

Galway Civil Defence have been selected as one of seven counties to pilot a new advanced Missing Person Search resource. This Cloud based service will allow Search Managers to operate and monitor Missing Person Searches with more real time data available.

Galway Civil Defence were selected to participate in a joint Civil Defence Exercise with Clare and Limerick Civil Defence in Ennis, Co. Clare. 12 members will work through various scenarios throughout this exercise.

All Civil Defence First Aid Instructors have completed recertification in PHECC (Pre-Hospital Emergency Care), Cardiac First Response (CFR), First Aid Response (FAR) and Emergency First Response (EFR). This certification will be for a 2-year period as per PHECC guidelines. One new instructor has completed a Search Field Skills Instructor Course. This course involved 6 days attendance at training and practical exercises in order to complete the course. Units are actively training at their relevant bases and helping at Community Events in their respective areas.

CLIMATE CHANGE

CLIMATE ACTION COURSE FOR THE OVER 60'S



There have been great turnouts in Oranmore for the over 60's Climate Action course which is taking place over a 6-week period. Forty-five people attended the training on the 18^{th of} October to avail of presentations and one-to-one sessions with SEAI and the Galway County Council Housing Section. The presentation by the Housing Section covered Housing Aid for Older People and for People with a Disability and the presentation from the SEAI mentor included details on Home Energy Grants.

DECARBONISATION ZONE - OILEÁIN ÁRANN

DIVERGENTLY TOGETHER WORKSHOP

The Climate Unit took part in a GCC supported workshop, titled Divergently Together, as part of an immersive artwork project 'Augmented Body Altered Mind' on Inis Oírr on the 28th of September. Co-created in real time by the public, this interactive artwork explores the intersections between variations in the human brain, cognition, individual agency and



the climate crisis.
The aim of the
workshop was to
discuss ecoableism (where
actions/policies



unintentionally harm/exclude disabled people by promoting environmental solutions that don't consider the needs or limitations of disabled individuals). Suggested solutions included the use of Plain English, Easy Reads and Social Stories (support documents for neurodivergent persons) in GCC plans and documentation.

INIS OIRR ENERGY EVENT



The Climate Unit took part in another event on Inis Oirr on the 9th of October. At this public Energy Information Event our Climate Action Officer was one of four speakers and she highlighted the role and benefits of being part of the Oileáin Árann decarbonization zone.



ODEON EU LIVING LABS

The Climate Unit participated in an in-person Living Lab as part of the ODEON project on the 17th of October. ODEON is an EU funded, Horizon Europe research and innovation project aiming to develop the first European ecosystem for the digital energy transition to empower citizens and local energy communities to accelerate decarbonisation.

The Oileáin Árann energy community is one of five dedicated European demonstration locations within ODEON. Living Labs provide a feedback loop to the project where participants provide expert perspective on opportunities, barriers, and solutions.

KEY PLANNING UPDATES

LARGE SCALE RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT

Galway County Council granted planning permission for its first LRD development which comprises of 220 residential units, including 24 Senior Living units adjoining Gort Town centre. A key element of the development is a new direct pedestrian access from the site to the proposed railway station. The development will also deliver a new commercial area which will include an activity centre, co—working offices, 4 retail units, a café and creche facility. The junction at Georges Street (R458) and the Loughrea road (R380) will also benefit from upgrades as a result of the proposed development which will also benefit the wider population of the town.

KPMG/Future Analytics are the consultants appointed to deliver the JRS. A stakeholder engagement event will take place on Wednesday 27th November 2024 for the elected members. It is anticipated that the drop in engagement will be from 10am-2pm in the county council office. More details to follow.

LOUGHREA LOCAL AREA PLAN

Draft ministerial direction received with respect to MA 35. Closing date for submissions was 12th September. CE report on the Draft Ministerial Direction was submitted to the Minister, OPR and the elected members on the 9th October 2024. We will await communication from the Minister and inform the Loughrea MD members if we receive any correspondence.

Meeting has been sought with the NTA with respect to the car park design at Oranmore and we are awaiting confirmation of that date.





ATHENRY

TOWN CENTRE FIRST (TCF)

The Athenry Town team have been working closely with the TRO and Consultants LUC in the initial stages of evidence gathering for the TCF plan. An online survey will be published next week seeking input from local residents, businesses and school children regarding their attitude and opinions of Athenry Town centre. In person workshops with the local community will be arranged for the coming weeks.

RRDF PROJECT

Following a detailed application by the Regeneration Team, Athenry was granted €6,075,518.40 Rural Regeneration Development Funding for the Athenry Public Realm



Enhancement Scheme Phase1 and the redevelopment of Somers House Burke's Lane to provide a Community and Enterprise Hub. The regeneration team has progressed the project with the appointment of consultants for the Public Realm project. Current programming currently forecasts construction to commence late-2025. As part of the contract a community liaison officer will be appointed to manage engagement with local stakeholders both prior to and during works. A tender has been prepared for the appointment of consultants to deliver the construction Phase of the Somers House redevelopment; this will be uploaded onto etenders by the end of November.

LOUGHREA

LOUGHREA TOWN HALL

The Regeneration team submitted a request for further funding to the Department of Rural and Community development on the 26th September. The Regeneration Team are delighted to announce that their request was granted in full. The team is now in a position to appoint the preferred contractors with a view to commencing construction on-site on Q2 2025.

LONG POINT

The Regeneration team are working with Consultants Helena McElmeel Architects to deliver the redesign of the Long Point swimming area in Loughrea Town. A Part 10 planning application has been lodged to An Bord Pleanála, and full details can be viewed on https://consult.galway.ie/en/consultation/loughrea-long-point-amenity-enhancement-project-part-10-planning-application The period of submissions is now closed, and we await further correspondence from An Bord Pleanála regarding the proposal.

OBFA architects Ltd are progressing with the development of the Town Trail Strategy. The Strategy document will include at a minimum the indicative design of the trail layout, identification of potential suitable forms of interventions and a public engagement process. The process will result in the creation of 4no. distinct design briefs to be used as a guide to selection of installations or other integrated design interventions within the town environs. This outdoor landscape art & design experience will link the Castle, Workhouse, Courthouse, Forest Park and Blueway Loop Walk through comprehensive wayfinding. A preliminary online survey will be published for input from the local community followed by 2 workshops in Q1 2025 to get local community input into the proposal.

PORTUMNA COURTHOUSE

Works are currently progressing ahead of programme at Portumna Courthouse to elements such as, first fix mechanical & electrical, internal rendering, first floor decking, and the foundations to the new café. The building will be open to the public in Q2 2025. An Expression of Interest for operators of the Café in the Courthouse was published mid-October. A formal public tendering process will follow before the end of 2024. Funding through the DRCD for the appointment of a 3-year temporary post of Business Development and Operations Manager for the facility during the operational stage, we hope to get this post filled by the new year. This post will also manage the Loughrea Town Hall and Tuam Town Hall once completed.

he Portumna Public realm enhancement scheme design is ready for the submission of a Part 8 planning application has been subject to pre-validation comments from the planning Department it will now be amended and lodged before the end of November.



GORT

The Gort Public Realm scheme is in its final stages of preparation for a Part 10 Planning application to An Bord Pleanála. It is expected the application will be submitted by quarter 4 2024.

TUAM

TOWN HALL

The Regeneration Team have published a tender for a design team to progress the construction phase of the refurbishment of Tuam Town hall. An open-day was offered to tenderers on the 11th November. The closing date for submission of tenders is the 6th December 2024.

STATION QUARTER THRIVE FUNDING

Galway County Council is working in partnership with larnród Éireann, CIE and in consultation with Action Tuam to deliver a transformational masterplan for the Tuam Station Quarter. Tuam THRIVE, has been through the tender process for the appointment of consultants to deliver the masterplan for the Station Quarter, these consultants will be appointed in the coming weeks. A separate Part 8 application will be progressed in-house by the regeneration team with a view to submitting in February/March 2025 once all the public and stakeholder consultation has been completed. There is the possibility of applying for capital funding for the renovation of the Tuam Station House in May 2025 thorough a final round of THRIVE funding subject to financial viability of the proposal.

BALLINASLOE

Following on from the successful funding application by the Regeneration team under THRIVE funding to the Northwest Regional Assembly to fund the delivery of a dedicated Town Centre First Plan focusing on the historic core and Fair Green identifying potential projects for future funding applications. The tendering process is now complete, and the Regeneration Team have appointed The Paul Hogarth Company (Ireland) limited to work with the Town Regeneration Officer, the Town Team and local community to progress the plan process. The Town team are meeting at the ned of the month with the TRO and appointed consultants to have a walk around the town and start the discussion regarding the town's future investment.

Regular updates will be provided to the MD meetings on the progress of the plan as well as presentations of draft proposals to Councillors for input.

URDF CALL 3 - VACANCY AND DERELICTION

Valuers have been appointed to the three qualifying towns of Ballinasloe, Tuam and Oranmore with 20 properties initially identified as candidate properties that are either vacant or derelict.

Ownership is being determined in many cases and engagement will be pursued with these owners to assist in having these properties re occupied.

AN CHEATHRÚ RUA TOWN CENTRE FIRST PLAN

The Regeneration team is working in collaboration with Údarás na Gaeltachta and the Town team and wider Local community to deliver a Town Centre First Plan for An Cheathrú Rua. A presentation was given to the MD on the 8th November where the project was formally launched. This is an exciting opportunity for the Town to identify key strategic funding opportunities for the town into the future.

TOWN CENTRE FIRST INIATITIVES- TOWN TEAMS

Galway County Council was granted funding of €30,000 for the establishment of town teams and the preparation of Town Centre health checks for Oranmore, An Cheathrú Rua and Headford. The Town Teams have been working with the appointed consultants in the distribution of the online surveys as well as on the ground survey works in the town centre. The final Town centre health Check reports will be ready for publication by Q4 2024.

HERITAGE OFFICE

GALWAY AUDIT OF ORAL HERITAGE COLLECTIONS: CONEMARA MUNICIPAL DISTRICT

The overall aim of this project was to conduct an audit of oral heritage recordings and/or collections related to topics, people or places within the Conamara Municipal District. In doing so, the project intended to provide a broad and coherent representation of oral heritage recordings, collected over many decades, relating to the oral tradition and folklore of Conamara. The audit proved itself tremendously positive and popular among communities and collections holders in Conamara.

Between June and November 2024, significant engagement was carried out by Mac Conamara Heritage Consulting on behalf of the Heritage Office of Galway County Council, primarily through direct correspondence and fieldwork with collection holders at local, regional, national and international levels. Through intensive fieldwork and research, a total of 3,193 recording items were identified, consisting of both long and short form interviews and recordings, within thirty-eight collections and over thirty holding institutions or Collection Holders.

A Project Database has been generated in addition to a detailed report where the findings of the audit have been broken down. In addition, a Collection Report has been created for each collection identified, providing information on collection content, description, metadata and access details. The project generated significant publicity, featuring on TG4, Radio na Gaeltachta, Galway Bay FM as well as multiple local radio and print media outlets.



The project has led to the identification of 3,193 recordings items within or related to Conamara. This is the first time such crucial data has been compiled. In addition, at least 50% of the collections identified had never been used or disseminated, most not even played. It therefore makes a huge contribution to our awareness of cultural heritage data in Conamara. Through persistent dialogue and co-operation, the audit team managed to

establish a relatively unified dataset, aggregating metadata standards where possible to bring about a cohesive view of Conamara's oral heritage materials, despite the wideranging conditions, formats, and documentation levels. This assists directly in the potential development of



Digital Heritage Resources and moves them much closer to availability and access.

Community collections of oral heritage, generated by localised groupings, account for 18.4% and 275 recording items. Ten of the collections identified (26%) were found within international collections like the Irish in Britain Organisation, University of Prince Edward Island, University of Montana or the Ellis Island Foundation, New York. The inclusion of these records, documented with Conamara natives overseas, is a vital recognition of the way memories migrate with people and identities endure. National Collections account of 13% of those identified. Predictably, the National Folklore Collection is responsible for the largest number of sound recordings related to Conamara, with approximately 1,500 files on record from the late 1920s through to early 21st century recordings.

By uncovering over 3,000 recording items, the Audit has further underlined the region's rich cultural heritage. While this richness has been recognised for many decades, this project has shown that there remains streams of memory and tradition which continue to be flowing and are often untapped.

THE HERITAGE OF CREGGS, COUNTY GALWAY: CONNECTING PAST AND PRESENT

This StoryMap was created as a result of the Creggs Heritage Audit which Creggs Rural Development Group commissioned in 2018 with support from the Heritage Council and Galway County Council. It is a comprehensive baseline report of the built, natural and cultural heritage monuments and sites in the Creggs area. It can be viewed. This StoryMap was compiled by Zena Hoctor, Impact GIS, Creggs Rural Development Group and Kilbegnet Historical Society with assistance from the Heritage Office and GIS Section of Galway County Council. The StoryMap contains 15 points of interest about Mount Mary, O Sullivan Beara Camp, the Giant Stone, crannógs, Abbey Grey monastic site, The King's grave, Millford Ringfort, the Presbyterian Church, RIC Barracks and Creggs RFC, Parnell Memorial Monument, St May's RC Church, Kilbegnet Graveyard, Carrownaglogh Mass Rock, Donamon



Church and Dunamon Castle. This StoryMap includes text, videos and podcasts.

HERITAGE AUDIT OF ABBEYKNOCKMOY

In 2023, members of Abbeyknockmoy Parish Society became interested in carrying out some heritage related projects and they set up a sub-group and named it Abbeyknockmoy Cultural Heritage. The Heritage Officer of Galway County Council recommended



that they would undertake a heritage audit in the first instance of the parish and district. Following a successful application to the Heritage Council under the Community Grants Scheme 2024 by Abbeyknockmoy Cultural Heritage, the Heritage Audit of Abbeyknockmoy commenced in June 2024.

The aim was to audit all built, natural and cultural heritage monuments and sites within a 6km radius of Abbeyknockmoy village in order to provide a framework for the future development of the local heritage resources by Abbeyknockmoy Cultural Heritage and their interpretation for both residents and visitors. Zena Hoctor Heritage Services were appointed in May 2024 by Abbeyknockmoy Cultural Heritage to complete the audit. The

LOCAL BIODIVERSITY ACTION FUND PROJECT UPDATES

THE HARE'S CORNER

The Hare's Corner is a biodiversity initiative of the Burren-based landscape charity Burrenbeo Trust, that was rolled out in 2024 to landowners in Co. Galway in partnership with Galway County Council's Biodiversity Office. The Hare's Corner project offered landowners 'hassle-free' support to carry out simple but impactful actions for biodiversity. These actions included the creation of a wildlife pond, a native mini-woodland, a heritage mini-orchard with apple trees from the Irish Seed Savers Association, bespoke 'plans for nature', 'plans for water' and 'peatland plans'. This support was offered in the form of materials (native trees and heritage apple trees), micro-funding (e.g., machinery costs for pond digging), professional services (such as a hydrologist's visit to help plan a pond i.e. 'plan for water', or an ecologist's visit to 'plan for nature' or prepare a 'peatland plan') and guidance.

The project was open to applications from landowners, including farmers, as well as schools and community groups. Applications were opened in April 2024. We received 222 applications from Co. Galway for a total of 571 biodiversity actions. The final participant profile was: 33 groups (community groups/schools), 7 farmers and 158 private landowners.

By December 2024 this project will have supported the creation of 312 biodiversity actions: 117 woodlands (with 49 native trees per woodland including Birch, Alder, Hawthorn, Hazel, Holly, Spindle, Oak and rarer species like Burren Pine, Wych Elm, Aspen, Black Poplar), 117 orchards (5 heritage apple trees per orchard), 15 ponds for wildlife, 24 Plans for Water and 23 Plans for Nature and 16 'Peatland Plans' - a wonderful investment in the natural infrastructure of the County.



The delivery of these actions was made possible through a combination of public and private partnership and through the funding awarded to Galway County Council through the Local Biodiversity Action Fund 2024.

The Hare's Corner monitors the success of all actions through an online survey and where possible, in-person site visits one year after actions are taken, to assess the effectiveness of the actions and to learn lessons on how the project can be strengthened.

BALLINASLOE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT UPDATE

Ballinasloe MD staff and contractors on its behalf completed remaining projects delivery of the 2024 roadworks programme throughout the MD during October, particularly the inlay SMA projects in Ballinasloe Town. The Restoration Improvement (RI) programme is now substantially complete, except for an overlay resurfacing project on the former national R446 between Ballinasloe and Aughrim, which will be completed in November. Ballinasloe MD technical staff are currently also preparing the Multi-Annual Restoration Improvement Programme 2025-2027, for submission to the Department of Transport.

Projects included under CIS, LIS, Climate Adaptation and Low-Cost Safety funding allocations are ongoing and being delivered successfully, with progress dependent on contractor availability and weather conditions.

October Fair 2024 in Ballinasloe was managed successfully again in terms of traffic and waste management, trading and general business uplift throughout Ballinasloe. It is planned to hold inter-agency de-brief meetings in November to pre-plan for the 2025 event.



Throughout the MD, Community Wardens continue to deal with illegal dumping, parking enforcement, and various inspections of ring buoys and playgrounds. Open space grass cutting is completed in Ballinasloe Town, with vegetation removal completed on the biodiversity areas.

CONAMARA MUNICIPAL DISTRICT UPDATE

- The Conamara MD is finalising a DRAFT 3-year roads programme.
- Outdoor crews were busy cleaning up and responding to issues that arose during a recent orange wind weather event Storm Ashley
- Focus is now on drainage works for outdoor crews and winter ready preparations.
- Restoration Improvement Works, Restoration Maintenance Works and Discretionary Grant works now complete.
- Climate Change Adaption & rehabilitation Works Complete.
- Department of Rural Community Development funding for works on Inis Mor are substantially complete.
- An allocation of €30,000 has been granted by the Department of Transport to progress a Strategic Infrastructure Scheme at Cuan na Loinge to address flooding of the main road into this area. Galway County Council has sought tenders for the provision of consultancy services necessary for the purposeful management and delivery of the TII Project Management Guidelines PE-PMG-02041 Phases 2, 3 and 4, and associated requirements and particulars of DPER's Infrastructure Guidelines (December 2023). Tender assessment is now complete a consultant has been appointed to this project.
- Safety Improvement Works allocation of €35,000 to refurbish the traffic signal heads and push button units in Maigh Cuilinn is now complete.
- Hedge and Verge Maintenance being undertaken by a subcontractor.



- Piers & Harbours- Direct labour projects ongoing under marine infrastructure scheme.
