To this statement I give an emphatic denial, I am aware that the Nuns of the Order of Mercy, Galway, advised the Nuns to Dublin because they so informed me, and requested me to see her safe on the train and to ask the Guard to look after her on the journey. The ticket had been purchased by a woman, the Nuns' messenger, before I reached the station. I had nothing whatsoever to do with sending Ellen Smith to Dublin further than to supply with the Nuns' request to ask the Guard to look after her, &c.

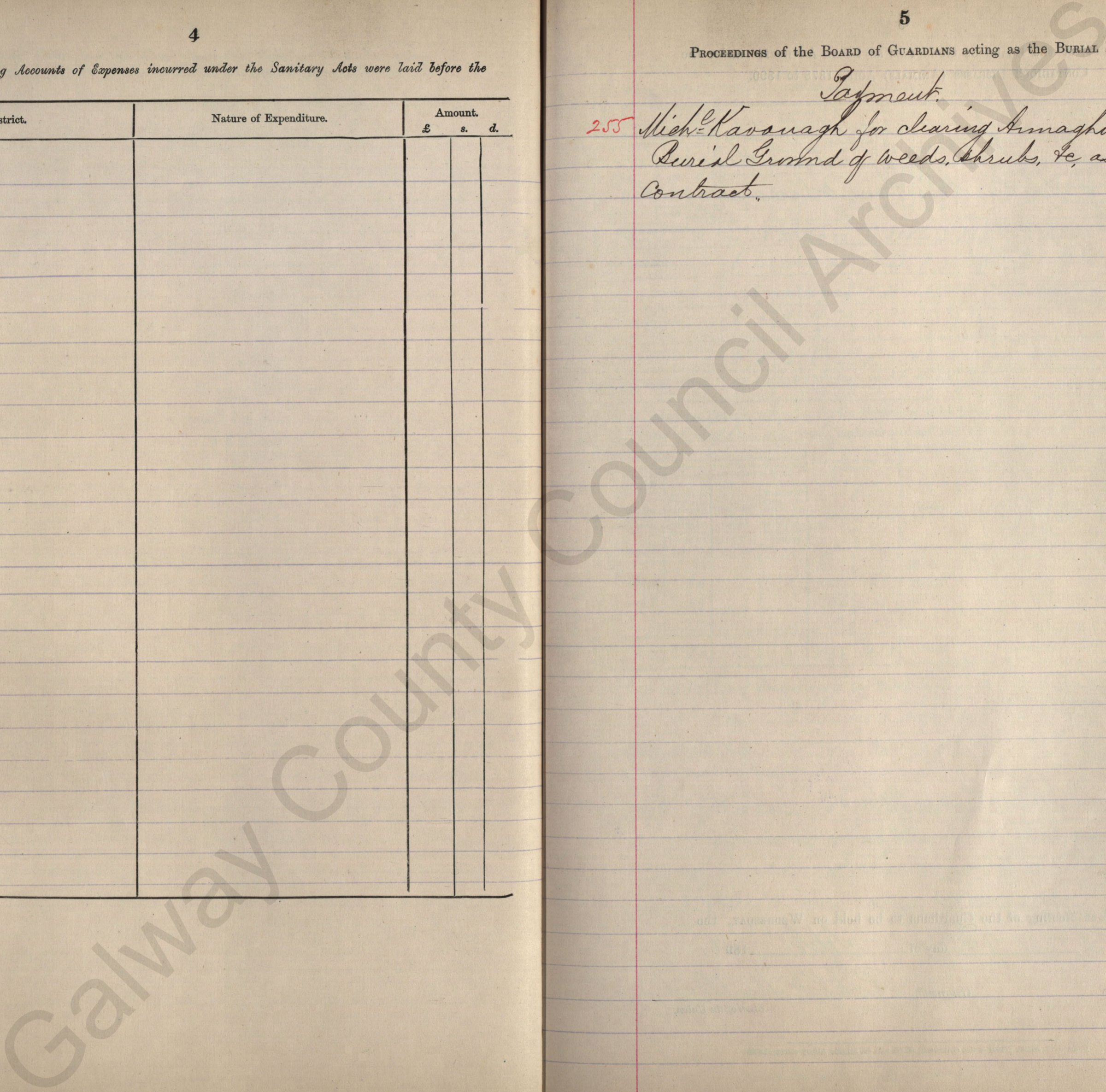
