7th May '97. Circular from the Hon. Secs. to the Pecess Committee on the Agriculture and Industries (Ireland) Bill.

Requesting that resolutions from Irish public bodies strongly expressing the general feeling that a Department of Government for Ireland, similar to those ^{with} which Ireland's foreign competitors are furnished, for bringing to our hard pressed agriculture and ~~and~~ decaying industries the machinery of state aid, and for establishing a system of Technical Education connected therewith, should be forwarded to the Government.

On the motion of Mr. P. Hamon, seconded by Mr. A. G. Scott, it was unanimously Resolved

Resolved. That we strongly recommend that the provision for Technical Instruction related to Industries as well as Agriculture, promised by the Chief Secretary, should be added to the Agricultural and Industries (Ireland) Bill, instead of waiting for a second Bill.

8th May '97. Circular from the Clerk of Rathdown Union, enclosing a copy of a report of a Committee of the Guardians of that Union on the provisions of the Poor Relief (Ireland) Bill, now before Parliament.

Resolved. That we respectfully direct the attention of the Government to the consideration of saving expense by making provision in the Poor Relief (Ireland) Bill for increasing the accommodation in the existing Lunatic Asylums, where Governors and a staff already exists, instead of increasing the number of these Asylums.

That we wish to express a hope that no additional burthens of expense, in connection with appointments or proceedings of the Commissioners or otherwise, will be placed on the already over-taxed body of Ratepayers, and that provisions may accordingly be introduced into this Bill to effect these necessary amendments, and that substantial aid will be afforded by Parliament to cover the additional expenditure that may become necessary in carrying out the provisions of the Bill.

12th May '97 From Mr. W. N. Riems, B.E., stating that he considers that a gas heated Disinfecting Chamber, as manufactured by Messrs. Maguire & Son of Dublin, and patented by Dr. Scott, would be most suitable for the Guardians to adopt. That these Chambers have been adopted by several Unions in Ireland, among others by Athlone, where, I understand, the cost of erection amounted to about £170, exclusive of the cost of laying gas connecting main and meter. That Dr. Colahan, Workhouse Medical Officer, agreed with him that a gas heated disinfecting Chamber would be most suitable.
