12th Feby. '98. From Sir Thomas F. Brady, acknowledging the receipt of Clerk's letter asking him to use his influence with the Manchester Relief Committee to obtain a supply of seed for the poor con-acre tenants on the Aran Islands, and stating that he will with pleasure bring the letter under the consideration of the Committee. As far as he can see the fund at present available is wholly inadequate to meet anything like the most pressing claims at present before the Committee without at all embracing the purchase of seed for any district which is a question of great magnitude. The extent of the distress on the Western Coast and the importance of so relieving it, without delay, for the future benefit of the people, before the Spring work commences, do not appear to him to be sufficiently realized by the general public as to induce them to come forward with liberal contributions to aid the Committee in their exertions to carry out the wishes of those Manchester friends who have acted so generously in trying to alleviate the distress which exists. This is a matter he regrets very much and which he hopes may be quickly remedied by a Charitable Irish Public.

The insertion of this letter in full on the Minutes was ordered.

In pursuance of notice given for this day Mr. J. Morris moved - that in accordance with the provisions of the Technical Instruction Acts, 1889 and 1891, we, acting in our capacity of Rural Sanitary Authority, will levy a rate of one penny in the £ as our "arrangement" for Technical Instruction in Galway during the years 1898 and '99.

The motion was seconded by Mr. J. S. Kirwan.

A ~~negative~~ amendment was moved by Mr. R. French, and seconded by Mr. J. Ruane, that the rate be levied over Galway B. D. only.

On a division the amendment was declared lost, 3 Guardians voting for, and 16 against it.

The original motion was then put and declared carried.

In the absence of Mr. M. McDonough the motion standing in his name for this day, namely - that the resolution passed at Guardians' meeting on the 15th of December last, declining to apply for a loan for the purchase of seed, be rescinded, and that we apply for a loan for that purpose, amount £1848. 9. 9, as per estimate Form I, which accompanies Minutes, was proposed by Mr. M. Cunningham, seconded by Mr. C. O'Connor, and carried unanimously.

in arrear for last seed issued, be not supplied with seed this year.

Resolved - that arrangements similar to those adopted in 1895, be now adopted, viz; notice to be given to Guardians of arrival of seed and the time fixed for inspection; each Rate Collector and Relieving Officer to be called upon to attend distribution of seed to persons from his district; the arrangements for the distribution to be entrusted to the Clerk of Union.
