27th Feby. '01. From the Hon. Mr. J. Morris, M. P. stating that he has spoken to Lord Stanley M. P. Financial Secretary to the War Office, over the case of the wife and children of John Monaghan of the Comnaught Rangers, at present serving in South Africa, and the Guardians' claim for maintenance of this family in the Union Hospital. Enclosing a reply received from Lord Stanley from which it can be gathered that the Separation Allowance is a personal
one

one and issuable only to the authorised recipient, the War Office having no power over its allocation or use.

27th Feb. '01. From Col. J. P. Nolan, M. P., acknowledging the receipt of Guardians' resolution of the 25th Feb. in which they very properly protest against the disgraceful Declaration put by Lord Salisbury into the mouth of the King on the opening of Parliament. Stating that he can bear witness, as one present, that His Majesty stumbled or whispered the Declaration as he (Col. Nolan) could not hear one word, while the King's voice was most clear and distinct when he read the speech from the Throne. That he has moved for a return on the subject, and placed an amendment on the Address drawing attention to the revolting insult of which the Guardians complain.

It was proposed by Mr. C. J. Lee, seconded by Mr. J. W. French, and unanimously Resolved - That we request the Chairman of the Galway Urban Council to summon a Public Meeting at the earliest convenient date in Galway, to protest against the gross insult offered to Catholics in the Succession and Coronation Oaths.

4th March '01. From Messrs. Mathias and James Malley, offering to take over the contract for the supply of milk to the Workhouse held by their mother till her decease recently, offering as sureties.

Messrs. Michael O'Halloran of Abbeygate St. and Darby Tarry of Rahoon, both of Galway.

6th March '01. From Honor Duggan, tendering her resignation as Wardsmaid in the Workhouse in a month from date.

at regular intervals, the Commissioners are of opinion that the necessary steps should be taken to have the ships medically examined before entering the Harbour of Galway, as vessels from Glasgow are expected here at an early date the Commissioners trust the Board will take immediate action in this matter.

12th March. } Informing the Guardians that they have received the report of their Inspector, Major Pattledge-Tair, on the Union Workhouse which he inspected on the 4th inst. and found generally to be in a satisfactory and creditable condition, Financial condition of the Union.

There will probably be a slight deficit at the termination of the present financial year, and a considerable portion of this deficit is due to the increased amount chargeable for Out-door Relief purposes. During the last two years the Out-door Relief has increased from £404 in the half-year ended March, 1899, to £529 in half-year ended in September, 1900. It is to be regretted that the expenditure under this heading even still shows a decided increasing.

increasing tendency,
 Workhouse improvements, &c.
 Additional lavatory accommodation would be desirable in the Infirmary Wards. It would be desirable to provide an additional force pump in the men's yard similar to that recently created on the female side so that flushing of the closets and the water supply generally in the Male Infirmary would be always sufficient. As regards the sanitary accommodation for the aged and infirm inmates it would be desirable to provide water closets for the use of the infirm patients with small lavatories attached. Additional accommodation for the isolation and treatment of consumptive patients is much required. There appear to be no separate wards available, and the Inspector ascertained that a large and constantly increasing number of patients suffering from consumption in all stages are constantly treated in the wards with other patients. Additional accommodation might be obtained by rebuilding and enlarging the building known as the "Black Shed" on the female side, and a small extension at right angles along the farm wall which together with the existing wards on the male side would provide the accommodation required. A loan could be obtained by the Guardians from the Board of Works to defray the necessary expenses. The land of the Workhouse farm appears to be somewhat worn out by constant cropping. The Guardians would do well to appoint a small committee of practical

Guardians to consider the matter. The windows of the Infirmary Wards and in some of the dormitories of the healthy class are wearing away and the Guardians would do well to take steps to gradually replace the old iron frames and sashes by more modern windows. If 20 windows were so replaced every half year the expenses would be very slight. The Visiting Committee are reported to have met only about 6 times in the half year, and the Board call the attention of the Guardians to the requirements of Article 57 of the Workhouse Rules on the subject. The Inspector draws attention to the fact that the upper infirmary wards are too cold in winter and in summer the heat is often excessive owing to these wards not being ceiled. The Guardians might have an estimate prepared to enable them to judge what would be the cost of carrying out this most desirable improvement by means of a light timber ceiling. Several of the stone staircases leading to the upper wards should be roughened. At present they are very slippery and dangerous for old persons.

Outdoor Relief.

The Guardians beg to observe that the lists of persons in receipt of outdoor relief are carefully revised every month.

Wards for Consumptive Patients.

The Guardians beg to suggest the desirability of building a special Hospital on the grounds of the County Hospital, Prospect Hill, Galway, wherein

in the County could be treated.

Workhouse Farm.

The Guardians have directed that a portion of the
land be laid down in grass for a couple of years.
