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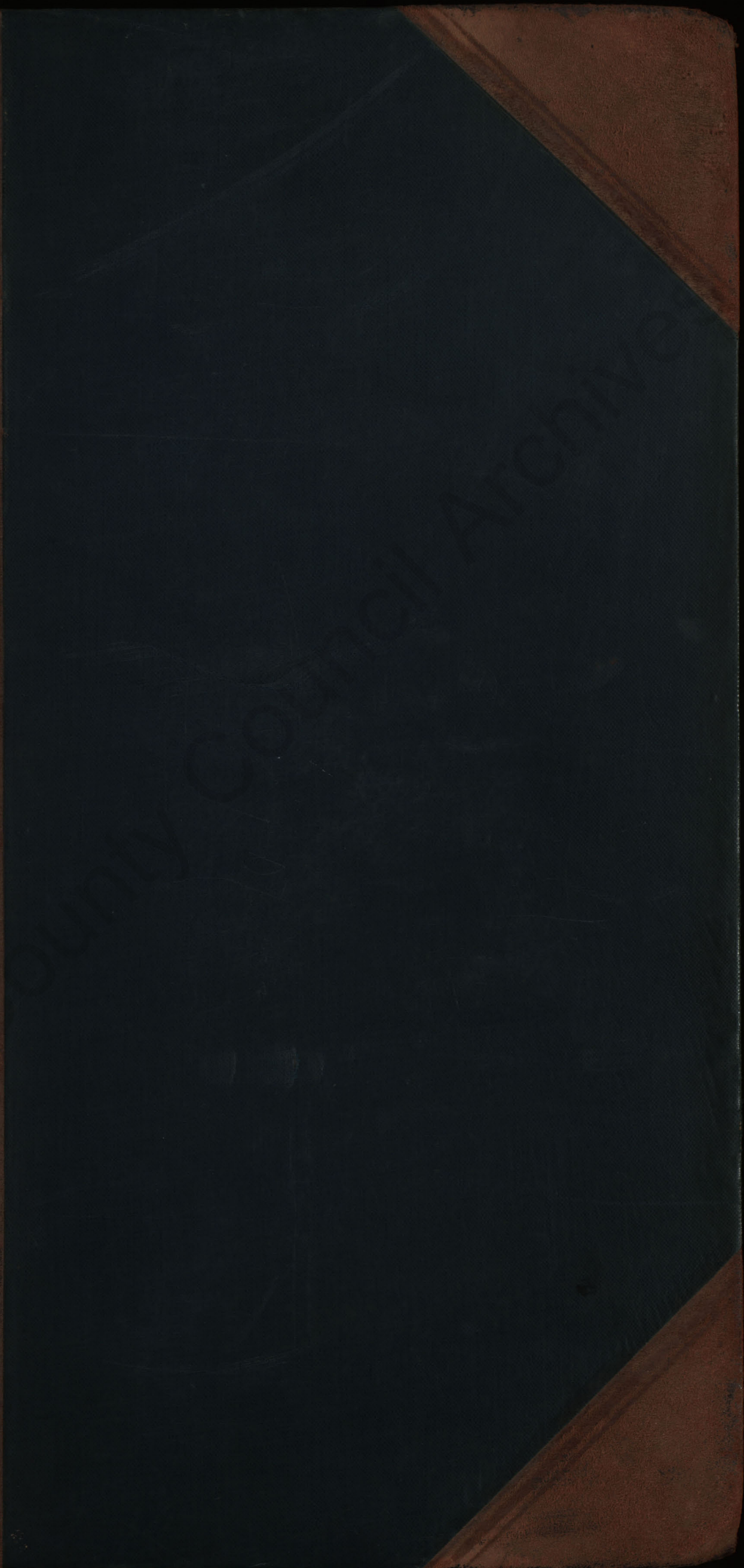

he has examined the water closet at the rear of the Dispensary Residence at Dranmore; that it is of a common dill pattern and is in a very bad state. Suggesting the advisability of erecting a new wood lead lined cistern to hold 100 gallons, to be supplied from the river with  $1\frac{1}{4}$  inch lead suction pipe. A lift pump will be required.

*16167/1902.* Requesting to be furnished with a form of queries *8<sup>th</sup> April* duly filled up and signed respecting the person who has been appointed midwife of the Galway (*No. 142*) Dispensary District.

*No midwife appointed for this District, No. 3 District must have been meant.*

*The form of queries had to be sent to the Nurse, and afterwards to the Medical Officer to be signed.*

*Received from the latter today and it was forwarded to the Board.*

*2<sup>nd</sup> April '02.* From *D. Coually*, Medical Officer of the Moycullen Dispensary District, stating that the caretaker of the Dispensary refuses to pack ointments.

*7<sup>th</sup> April '02.* From *Mrs. Cullinan*, owner of the Moycullen Dispensary, stating in reply to a letter received from the Clerk on the subject, that she always attends on *D. Coually*, but she declines to pack ointments.

*Order - To be asked to employ a person to pack the ointments.*

*under the direction of the Medical Officer, and to convey them to the Railway Station, as the contractors allow a small fee for such services.*

*8<sup>th</sup> April '02.* From *D. J. Waters*, Acting Medical Officer of the Galway (*No. 2*) Dispensary District, stating that he had to obtain the services of *D. W. W. Brereton* in a very difficult midwifery case, enclosing a claim from *D. Brereton* for a fee of *£1-1-0* for his services in this case.

*Payment ordered.*

*8<sup>th</sup> April '02.* From *D. Kirwan*, Medical Officer of the Oranmore Dispensary District, explaining that the delay in sending samples of drugs for analysis was caused by the non-receipt of the invoice till long after the goods were received; that he had no phials for the samples till he purchased some in Galway; when eventually he sent them for transmission to Dublin, he placed an ordinary adhesive label on the bottles with ingredients written on each, name of Dispensary and date, also one on box; the reason he did not use the labels supplied was he had no gum in the Dispensary; the box was sent back to him to put on the labels supplied, which necessitated the purchase of gum; in all there were four weeks of wasted time; it was merely an unfortunate occurrence, and he trusts the Guardians will be satisfied with the explanation.

*He has not yet returned to the contractors the drug, found deficient as it is in a gallon glass jar and up to the present he has been unable to find a box to pack it in, but shall*
