

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or orders made on them respectively, as follows):—

Read Letter from L.G. Board No. 23494, dated 11th June, 1902, stating that

the attention of the Board has been drawn to the very large expenditure on Medicines and Medical and Surgical Appliances in the Spiddal Dispensary District during the half-year ended the 31st March last. The amount was £33. 5. 10 (including £8. 14. 11 for Medical and Surgical Appliances), as compared with £39. 8. 11 for the 12 months ended 31st March, 1901. The Board have already called attention in their letter of 29th April last to the large expenditure on Emplast. Belladonnae (£13. 1. 0) and Opit. (£7. 10. 0) in the Galway (172) Dispensary District during the past year.

The Board now request that these Medical Officers may be directed to exercise more economy in future in requisitioning Drugs and Appliances, as otherwise the Board may be obliged to exercise their powers under Article 36 (VII) of their Order of 23rd March 1901 of refusing re-employment upon any portion of the expenditure which they may consider to be excessive.

Order. Extracts from this communication to be furnished to the Medical Officers concerned with a warning that they will be held responsible for any loss sustained by reason of the L.G. Board refusing re-employment of any portion of the expenditure considered excessive.

Committee Report
relative to Steam Boiler, cooking appliances,
and laundries at the Workhouse.

The boiler is being fired in a very expensive
manner and there is a considerable waste
of hot water in the Infirmary Laundry owing
to the rotten and leaky condition of the
Laundry troughs. The boiler was easily main-
tained at full pressure on last laundry day,
and this is when the demand for steam is
greatest. Steam is only required at certain
periods of the day during the week, and we
would recommend that a set of Rules be
drawn up for the guidance of the person in
charge of the boiler who should be held respons-
ible for their strict observance. The Rules should
be printed and hung up in the Boiler House,
Kitchens and laundries. From inquiries we
made we find that the hours that steam is
required in the various places are as follows:

General Kitchen	from 7.45 am.	to 8.15 am.	} daily,

By limiting the steam supply to these hours
and adopting our other suggestions we are

of opinion that a very substantial reduction
will be made in the cost of the system.
The trough accommodation in the General
Laundry is not sufficient for the work and
we would recommend the erection of a range
of enamelled ware troughs in order to facil-
itate the proper working of the laundry. We
further recommend the erection of enam-
elled ware troughs in the Hospital Laundry
which will rectify the serious waste of hot-
water from the defective troughs before
referred to and we consider a few extra
troughs are necessary for the proper working
of this Laundry.

We recommend that a person
thoroughly experienced in the working of a
Steam Boiler be employed for a period of
say two weeks to test the capacity of the Boiler,
the consumption of fuel, and to instruct Mr.
Toole, at present in charge of the Boiler, in
the working of it in the most economical
and efficient manner.
We further recommend that a trial be made
of burning slack in the Boiler which, if found
suitable, will entail a very large saving in
the cost of fuel.

We recommend two new cisterns be erected
in the Scullery.
