Replies to queries.

1. The Guardians are not in favour of amal-
-gamation of Unions for the reason that they
do not consider it would lead to any re-
-duction in the rates, and that poor persons
seeking admission to the Workhouse would
be compelled to travel long distances.
2. They do not consider an Auxiliary Lamentic
Asylum is required in this County.
3. They recommend the Boarding-out of
children only.
4. They recommend the removal of some restric-
-tions in the administration of Out-door
relief - such as the occupation of over $\frac{1}{4}$ acre
land where no use is being made of the
land; the bar to a widow being relieved
out of the Workhouse unless she has two or
more legitimate children.
They approve of the chargeability of relief
being Divisional instead of Union-at-large.
5. They do not consider additional accom-
-modation for the proper treatment of the

sick poor in the County is required, except in the case of consumptives. They recommend the provision of a Hospital in a central place, say Athlery, where consumptives from all the Unions in the County could be treated.

6. They do not suggest any changes.
7. They recommend that persons able to do so should be compelled to contribute the cost of the treatment of the sick and insane in Hospitals or other Institutions.

The sum collected in the Galway Union for repayment of relief by way of loan amounts to about £200 annually.

8. Assign work to be done by the able bodied tramps before they get breakfast - or be allowed to leave the Workhouse. This arrangement works well in Galway Workhouse.

Names of witnesses appointed to give evidence furnished.

15th July '04. From Miss S. Galbraith, Hon. Sec. Galway Girls' Home, stating that acting on the advice of their Solicitor, they adhere to the position that they are not liable for the expense incurred in the treatment in the Fever Hospital of the child Kitty Charles.

18th July '04. From Mr. Baker, stating that owing to measles in his family since the 10th inst. the girl Margaret Corneely hired out to him cannot be sent to School for some time. That he
