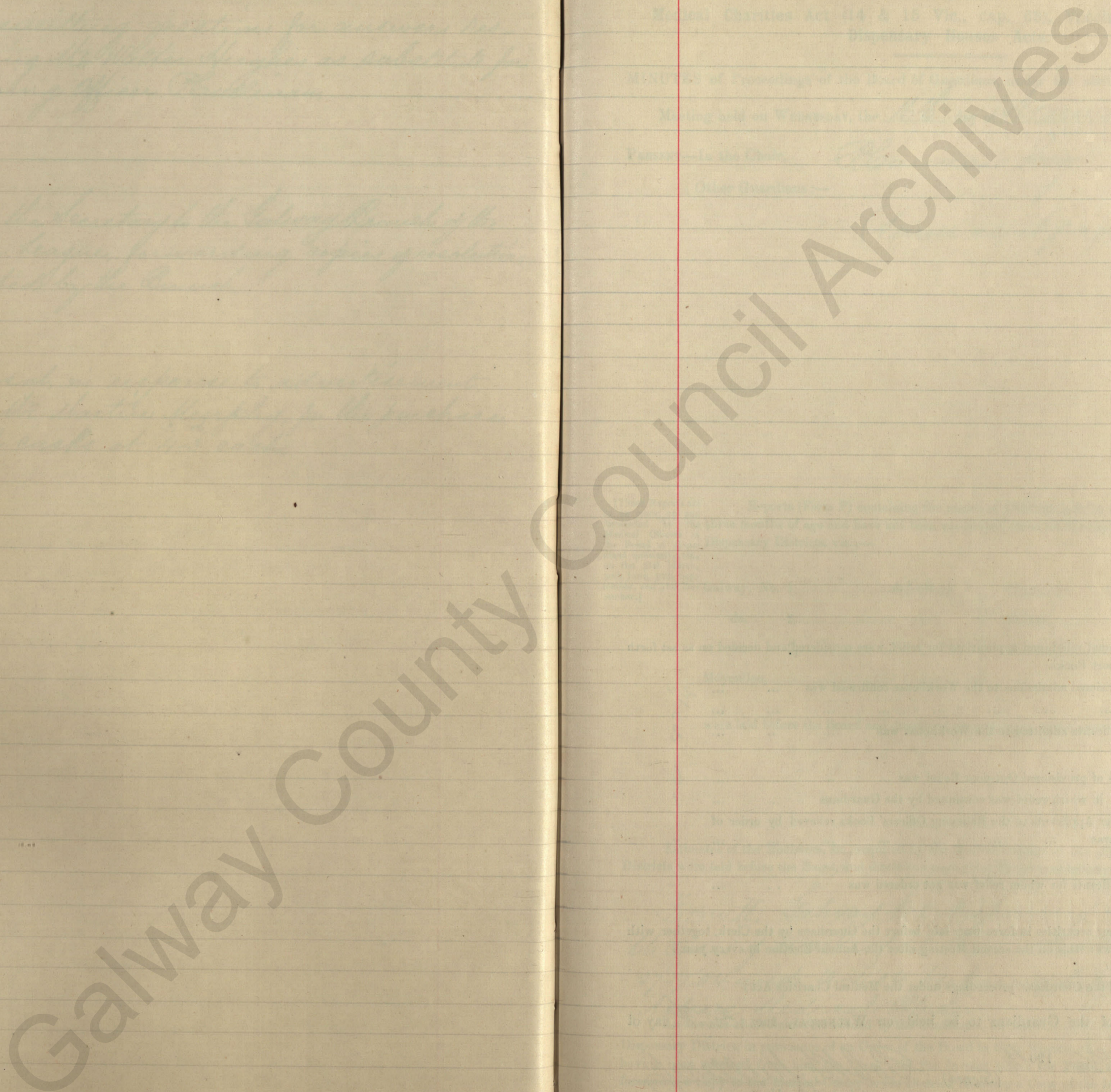

Read Letter from *L. G. B. No 62,857/04*, dated *11<sup>th</sup> Nov 1904*, stating that-

adverting to the Resolution of the Guardians on the 26<sup>th</sup> ult., and stating that the Board have sanctioned the increase of salary from £30 to £35 a year, to Miss Hedderman, Midwife of the Galway No 3 Dispensary District.

*10<sup>th</sup> Nov '04*, From Dr. Hickey, Medical Officer of the Spiddal Dispensary District, re delay in forwarding samples of drugs for analysis. Stating that he inadvertently inserted August instead of September as the month in which the drugs reached him.

*14<sup>th</sup> Nov '04*, From same, re scale of fees for extra professional assistance, and the late Midwifery case in which he called Professor Brereton in consultation. The case was altogether abnormal, so much so that Dr. Brereton stated he had never met one in all his experience. It was therefore an absolute necessity to requisition the services of a specialist, such as Dr. Brereton. In cases of not such extreme urgency, he will avail himself of the services of one of the gentlemen named as having accepted the fees fixed.

*Order.* To be cautioned, that in the event of requisitioning extra professional assistance from Medical Practitioners other than those who agreed to accept fees as per scale approved of, he shall do so at his own risk.

*13<sup>th</sup> Nov '04*, From Dr. Walsh, recently appointed as Medical Officer of the Oranmore Dispensary District, pointing out that the Dispensary Residence is sadly in need of painting and some repairs. If put in fair habitable order it will be long before he troubles the Guardians again on the subject. He would wish to take up residence as soon as possible. He took up duty on the 12<sup>th</sup> inst.

*Order.* The Engineer to be asked to examine the house at once, and report to the Guardians at next meeting as to the necessary repairs, &c.

*15<sup>th</sup> Nov '04*, From Dr. Lyden, Medical Officer of the Galway No 2 Dispensary District, and of the Workhouse, furnishing explanation called for, that he returned to duty on the 11<sup>th</sup> inst. That the cause of his apparent neglect of duties for some time past is: last Spring he was attacked with a severe illness which rendered the discharge of his duties almost an impossible task. Closely following occurred the deaths of his two brothers and a nephew, each of whom he watched during their illness both day and night. These sad events following so soon after his own illness rendered him utterly prostrate and unfit for the discharge of his professional duties. Were it not for the great kindness of the Guardians in granting him an extension of leave of absence, he should have been permanently disabled for work. That he regrets extremely the strictures which Sir A. Macsullagh found necessary to communicate to the Board. That he acknowledges with deep gratitude the great leniency with which the Board treated him during his long period of illness and family troubles. That

he is now quite restored to health, and will, as far as possible, make good past deficiencies and prevent similar complaints in future, *The Guardians accepted this explanation as satisfactory.*

15th Nov 04. From Mr. Sullivan, owner of the Dispensary at Moyvelin, stating that she declines to comply with the direction to provide sanitary conveniences for the use of the patients attending the Dispensary; that they are not needed as the patients seldom delay longer than 5 minutes. If the Guardians consider such necessary they must provide them at their own expense. *No order.*

In pursuance of notice given for this day, Sir J. O'Donohue moved that the Guardians take into consideration the claim of Dr. Kirwan, late Medical Officer of the Dracumore Dispensary District, for a retiring allowance. The motion was seconded by Mr. C. J. Burke. *After some discussion the motion was withdrawn.*

The Clerk submitted a return of the expenditure under the Medical Charities Act during the half year ended 30th Sept. last.
