the attention of the Board has been drawn to the fact that Contractors for the supply of Medicines and Medical and Surgical Appliances are occasionally in doubt as to the exact amounts which should appear in their Invoices, in view of the fact that calculations at the prescribed prices sometimes involve fractions of a penny. The Board do not wish fractions of a penny to appear in Col. 6 of the Invoices. In future, therefore, all fractions less than a half penny should be discarded, and a half penny and any fractions of a penny greater than a half penny, should be reckoned as a penny.

The Guardians beg to remind the L. S. Board that Miss Gore was appointed assistant nurse only, in the Fever Hospital, under a duly "qualified" nurse. As Nurse Gore was strongly recommended by Dr. Colahan, Medical Officer of the Workhouse, who was pleased with the manner in which she discharged her duties while acting as temporary nurse in this Fever Hospital in the year 1897, the Guardians request the L. S. Board to reconsider their decision, and, <sup>in the</sup> circumstances, the Board will see their way to sanction her appointment.

18<sup>th</sup> June 05. From Mr. John Feeney of Laraghmore, stating that in the published list of persons to whom seed

potatoes were sold by the Guardians, he is charged with the cost of 4 cwt. of seed potatoes; that he neither applied for nor got any seed potatoes; that he received by post an order from the Clerk of the Union an order for 4 cwt. seed potatoes; that Mr. Patrick Murray, Guardian for his Division wrote stating that he was requested by the Clerk of the Union to get the order as it was a mistake, it was intended for John Feeney; that, as requested, he sent the order to Mr. Murray; that he holds Mr. Murray's letter in proof of this statement.

Mr. Murray, P. L. S. who was in attendance, stated that this man's name was on the list of applicants for seed potatoes, and when he received the order for 4 cwt. he refused to take them; that he, Mr. Murray, took charge of the potatoes and otherwise disposed of them.

The Clerk informed the Guardians that Mr. John Feeney was listed for 4 cwt. of seed potatoes; that a delivery order for that quantity was duly posted to him; that the order was presented at the store by Mr. Murray, P. L. S. who stated, <sup>that</sup> Feeney was unable to attend in person, and, being a poor man, much in need of the seed, he, Mr. Murray, signed for the seed on behalf of Feeney and undertook to deliver the seed to him; that he (the Clerk) had not requested Mr. Murray to take up the delivery order from Feeney.

The Guardians expressed themselves satisfied with Mr. Murray's guarantee to account for the 4 cwt. seed potatoes in question.

The Clerk read a copy of a notice posted to each Guardian that at today's meeting a suggestion

to import direct a cargo of coal and slack to meet the requirements of the Workhouse for the ensuing year.

Mr. M. Ryan proposed that arrangement be made for the importation direct of a cargo of coal and slack. The motion was not seconded.

Orders, The Engineer to be asked to state when the contract for repairs and painting of the Fever Hospital will likely be completed. To direct that no work be carried on so long as there are patients in bed in the Hospital.
