This has occurred in numerous instances, in fact is constantly occurring and no record has been kept of such cases, but if the Guardians should deem it necessary I shall be happy for the future to keep a record and get black tickets issued either by the Relieving Officer or one of the local Guardians. With regard to the particular items mentioned by the L.G. Board, Santonine Lozenges are in constant request, as a great many of the children in the District suffer from worms. With reference to the other items mentioned, I may say that I had none in stock and considered it necessary to order them.
