By order of Mr. Colahan, Workhouse Medical Officer, I employed Honor Molloy as temporary Wardsmaid in the Fever Hospital on the 17<sup>th</sup> inst. at a remuneration at the rate of 5/- per week with rations.

Nurse Corless resumed duty after vacation on the 19<sup>th</sup> inst. and her substitute, Nurse Bowles, left same day.

The Steambarber Attendant was admitted a patient to Hospital on the 19<sup>th</sup> inst. I employed a man named James Walsh as substitute, at remuneration at the rate of £1 per week.

Mr. Michael Lydon reports that the Steam Boiler is urgently in need of a grate, and that it also requires to be cleaned out.

James Gordon who was acting as temporary Schoolmaster, left on the 19<sup>th</sup> inst. having got permanent employment. It would be well to advertise for a temporary substitute.

A Division being challenged, 6 votes were recorded for, and 8 against.

The Motion was therefore declared lost.
