

cut from the quarters of beef supplied and at a less cost than was specially contracted for.

5<sup>th</sup> Oct 05. From the District Inspector of R. D. Galway, reporting that on the 2<sup>nd</sup> inst. the body of a boy who had died from a dangerous infectious disease in the Galway Fever Hospital was forcibly taken by six men (names mentioned) from the Workhouse men who were in charge of it, and was carried on their shoulders around some of the principal streets of Galway to Fart-hill Cemetery. A very serious offence against the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, appears to have been committed.

The Guardians decided upon taking no action on this occasion as such a long interval has elapsed since the occurrence, but every precaution will be taken to prevent a recurrence in the future.

9<sup>th</sup> Oct 05. Notice of removal of Timothy Cook from the Parish of Liverpool to Galway Workhouse.

The queries duly answered were forwarded to the L. S. Board on the 13<sup>th</sup> inst.

11<sup>th</sup> Oct 05. From Dr W. A. Sandys, agreeing to act as temporary substitute for Dr M. McDonogh, Medical Officer of the Workhouse and Galway No 2 Dispensary District while on vacation at a remuneration at the rate of £4 4 0 a week.

11<sup>th</sup> Oct 05. From Miss L. Cahill, Workhouse Hospital Nurse,

stating that she is unwell, and requesting that the Guardians will allow her a couple of weeks' leave of absence, she providing a substitute at her own expense.

16<sup>th</sup> Oct 05. From same, explaining that as the Guardians adjourned their meeting on the 11<sup>th</sup> inst. she applied to Dr McDonogh who said she might put any trained nurse as substitute. She procured the services of Nurse Griffith and arranged to pay her.

Mr. Binns, B. E. reported that he has not yet completed his examination of the Workhouse drains; that he found two gratings not trapped and as this is a serious thing a remedy should be applied at once.
