The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and orders made thereon as follows:—

By direction of the Medical Officers I requisitioned two nurses for temporary duty in the Fever Hospital. Nurse Kelly took up duty on 2nd and Nurse Conlon on the 3rd inst. Nurse Cahill took up duty in the Workhouse on the night of the 5th inst. dispensing with the services of her substitute, Nurse Griffiths. Nurse Griffiths took ill that day, so I asked Nurse Cahill to take up duty, she refused until she found that the Medical Officers ordered me to requisition a nurse from Dublin.

The Schoolmaster took up duty on the evening of the 1st inst. and the Acting Schoolmaster, Thomas Tolau, left same date. On handing over stock to the Schoolmaster I found the following excesses and deficiencies in the stock of boys' clothing since Thomas Tolau took up duty, one boot and one pair of suspenders over, and two vests and four pair of trousers missing.

Two patients have been transferred to the Calvary Hospital for treatment, Colman Tolau on the 4th and Margaret O'Donnell on the 7th inst.

I had to hire a horse on several occasions during the past week, as the Workhouse ^{horse} was engaged in conveying patients to the Hospitals.

I returned to the contractor 34 eggs being small, together with 40 bad and broken. I rejected a quarter of beef on the 6th inst. and the contractor supplied

The following Orders of the Local Government Board for Ireland were laid before the Guardians, and directions given thereon as follows:—

36lb. of good beef which sufficed for the day. I purchased 90lb. of beef tea meat during the week at 9d per lb.

Kindly order rations for tradesmen who are inmates of the Workhouse and are working:

Daily, each, 1½ lb. Bread, 1 pint of milk, ½ lb. meat, 1oz. butter, 1 egg, 1 pint of porter.

Weekly, each, ¼ lb. Tea, and 1 lb. Sugar.

Proposed by Mr. M. Cunningham and seconded by Mr. A. Toole—that we approve of this dietary subject to the following alterations, the porter to be struck out and an extra pint of milk substituted therefor, Mr. A. Hoole proposed and Mr. F. J. Bailey seconded, that no change be made in the list.

On a division the amendment was lost 7 votes

My attention was called by the Master to a quarter of beef supplied on the 6th inst. I ordered him to reject it, being of inferior quality.

Correspondence.

2nd Nov. '05, From the Sec. to the Galway County Council, forwarding forms on which to furnish lists of the persons to whom Seed Rates are to be charged.

4th Nov. '05, From Mr. Hall of Knockraek, requesting permission to give a treat to the inmates of the Workhouse at James.
Permission granted with great pleasure.

8th Nov. '05, From the Gate Porter of the Fever Hospital, stating that his attention has been called to a report in the "Galway Express" in which it appears that the Master of the Workhouse stated, "So gart at the Fever Hospital did not report to me about the funeral on the 2nd ult." I beg to say that I did report it fully to the Master, and he remarked that he saw more of it than I did, as I was inside the Hospital Grounds, and it is a monstrous thing for the Master to tell such a falsehood to the Board of Guardians, of course assuming that he is correctly reported in the Newspaper named.

The newspaper report is correct.

In reply to enquiry as to his recreation hours, Requesting to be granted four hours; say 2 hours between 11 o'clock am. to 4 o'clock pm.; and 2 o'clock pm. to 10 o'clock pm. Any hours granted to him for recreation he would take at the time of the day when there is least to be done. Adding that when there would be anything unusual, such as a funeral or patients expected, he would forfeit the recreation time. That he is always on

duty from 6 am. to 9 pm., that is 15 hours, and he did not consider it too much to take from one hour to an hour and three quarters recreation from 9 o'clock pm.

On the motion of Mr. N. Hydon, seconded by Mr. J. B. McDonogh it was — Resolved — That the Porter of the Fever Hospital be allowed 3 hours recreation daily, provided the Master of the Workhouse can place a suitable person in charge of the gate: namely from 2-30 pm. to 4 pm., and from 7 pm., to 8-30 pm.

8th Nov. '05, From Mr. C. L. Toole, Workhouse Schoolmaster, requesting the remission of the charge for his maintenance ⁱⁿ the Fever Hospital for 49 days, at 1-0^d a day, total £2-9-0, as he contracted Fever in the discharge of his duties.

Proposed by Mr. M. Cooke and seconded by Mr. N. Hydon — That this charge be remitted. Also that the charge for the maintenance of his brother, Mr. Patrick Toole, Steam Bailer attendant, in the Fever Hospital for 55 days at 1-0^d a day, total £2-15-0, for a like reason be remitted.

The form of application from Mr. George Carter of Rahoon, for the hiring out to him from the Workhouse, of the boy, Patrick Byrne, was submitted & approved, and was signed by the Chairman. Copy of Report Form A, accompanies the copy of the Minutes to the L. G. Board.
Order, clothing to the amount of £1-7-6 to be supplied to Patrick Byrne.

Order, Mr. Bimus, B. C., to be informed that unless he completes, forthwith, his inspection of the drains of the Workhouse, &c. and closes in the drains he has caused to be opened, the Guardians will employ another person to do this work.

Order, Mr. N. Lydon to be added to the Workhouse Visiting Committee.
The Committee to be requested to procure a house in Calway for the accommodation of the nurses in the Fever Hospital, as the Ward used by them as a sleeping apartment is at present required for Fever Patients.
Carte blanche is given to the Committee to arrange for a house on the best terms.

Order, The Police to be asked to endeavour to trace Hannah Casey, mother of the illegitimate child Mary Casey, whom she has deserted and is an inmate of the Workhouse at present. The Guardians undertake to defray all expenses of the search.

Workhouse Medical Officers' report on Fever Hospital Gentlemen,

We regret we are again obliged to bring under your notice the fact that the Fever Hospital is filling up with fever patients, and that it becomes necessary for your Board to make special arrangements for the accommodation of the patients and nursing staff. The temporary arrangements made some time ago, tided us over a period of great anxiety and difficulty, but

there were so many drawbacks to the arrangement, and so many abuses resulting from it, if we may say so, that we cannot recommend its repetition. We therefore urge upon you the necessity for making immediate provision for the difficulty in which we now find ourselves. May we beg permission to state here that these recurring difficulties regarding the deficient accommodation at the Fever Hospital, have been brought before successive Boards of Guardians by your Medical Officers for some years past. Some two years ago the matter was considered so urgent that plans were drawn out for remodelling the present hospital so that it might be able to fulfil the requirements of an epidemic hospital; but for one cause or another the matter has been allowed to lapse. We again urge upon your Board the necessity of taking this important matter into your immediate consideration. Your Board as Guardians of the sick poor, and we, as your Medical Officers, have a heavy trust placed upon us, we are bound to satisfy the community at large that the institutions under our charge are maintained in a proper and efficient manner. To pretend that a hospital where a patient with measles or scarlatina has to lie down side by side with a patient in typhus or typhoid fever, and when a nurse has no place to sleep, nor to disinfect herself when she goes off duty and mixes with the public outside - to pretend that such an institution is maintained in a proper and efficient manner would be to deceive

the public at large. Whether the present hospital should be improved to meet the requirements placed upon it, or whether entirely new conditions should be established, is a matter for the consideration of your Board, but we cannot too strongly urge upon you the fact that it is a matter of pressing public importance.

Nurse Cahill's explanation.

"Allow me to offer a few words in explanation of my conduct on 26th Sept. When I took over charge I was informed that a ticket had been sent to the Doctor. I was told that a girl by name Sarah Lyden, (whom Dr. Laudys had seen on the morning) had complained of a violent pain in side. I took up duty at 9 p.m., saw this patient and found her very quiet, the simple remedy applied by Day Nurse having given instant relief and freed her from pain. There has never been a recurrence of the pain since. I felt then that the Doctor's services were not necessary for that night. Seeing her free from pain I did not think I was acting very reprehensibly by going to my room for a few minutes,

telling the attendant, P. Kelly, to give me word when the Doctor arrived; knowing also that he would call me if anything unforeseen should occur. My excuse for going to room was, that owing to the very great noise and uproar made by the inmates outside my sleeping apartment, I had not been able to get any sleep till very late, and, in consequence, in my hurry to be on duty at the usual appointed time, I had forgotten things, which to do without during the night in hospital, would have inconvenienced me greatly. This noise has been my constant complaint to the Head Nurse and others since I came here, as not permitting me to take sufficient rest whilst on night duty. I regret having to delay you gentlemen by calling your attention to two mistakes which have been made in letter from L. S. Board, but for my justification I must ask you to have a little more patience with me. It has been reported that

for the Priest, and that it had been unnecessary to send for him. The second mistake in the report is where Major R. Fair asserts that Sr. Ursula is Head Nurse of the Workhouse, and as such my superior officer. If you please ask the Clerk to look up the Minutes of the meeting of 10th May, 1905, he will read for you that on that date Sr. M. A. McCarmack was elected Head Nurse of the Workhouse, and as such my superior officer (not Sr. Ursula). I have always followed the directions and instructions of the Head Nurse to the best of my ability. During my first month's residence here, Sr. Ursula herself told me that she had nothing whatever to do with the nursing, that Sr. M. Austin and Sr. M. Aguin were the nursing sisters, and that she was simply there as Superior over the Nuns. Hence any friction between Sr. Ursula and me is purely personal and most people will think that I had made sufficient amends for temper shown when I wrote from Dublin to ask a Priest to convey my apologies which to him were apparently accepted.

Engineer's Report

Referring to my former report relative to the Workhouse Drainage and the defects I had then discovered, I have since then had intercepting traps put in wherever I discovered that they were necessary. I regret any inconvenience that was caused by having the road opened but it was necessary as I required to make observations at intervals in order to see the effect of flow and for the purpose of taking levels. In the last 53 yards of the pipe between where I have opened and the manhole the fall is only $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches which is insufficient to keep the pipe clear of deposit, and in my opinion constant stoppages will recur in this pipe. I have made enquiry and find that for years this pipe has had to be opened and cleared; I therefore recommend that this sewer be relaid.

Generally speaking nearly all the drains in the Workhouse are laid with sharp bends which is quite inadmissible, all drains should be laid in straight lines from manhole to manhole. Having regard to the fact that some of the drains under the buildings proved to be defective I am of opinion that your Board would be best advised in having a new system of drains laid with proper Armstrong

inspecting junctions laid at all junctions and manholes at all bends so that a thorough inspection of all the drains can be made at any time without any cost. In the event of your Board not adopting this suggestion it will be necessary to open up the existing sewer and have it cleaned up and the broken pipes repaired.

I have to point out that a serious defect in the flushing arrangements. The flush pipes from the cisterns are in direct communication with the sewers so that if the tanks or cisterns become empty the flush pipes are liable to act as sewer ventilators into the tanks. Ventilating shafts will be required in the yards where I have provided the traps carried above the eaves of the buildings. Dis-connecting chambers are required on all the branch pipes.
