Inspector's Minute upon Result of Inspection. Twenty one Pupils, sixteen of whom were in the Junior Standards, were present on day of inspection. The proficiency generally is of a mediocre character and seems to have declined from last year's standard. This may be due to the fact that the teacher was absent for three months owing to Typhoid fever. The Teacher should show better method, and preparation on his

his work, and aim at more neatness and tidiness in the general working of the School. Eight or nine Panes of glass are broken.

Female School

General Condition of School, Good.

Inspector's Minute upon result of Inspection. Eleven pupils, all of tender years, were present on day of Inspection. They are well taught and trained and their physical needs seem amply provided for. The pupils and School room, are models of cleanliness - thanks to the Sisters of Mercy, who has charge of them.

Copy of report has been furnished to the Teachers, and the Schoolmaster's attention has been specially drawn to the Inspector's remarks on his School.

The Workhouse Master reported that he has had the broken panes of glass in the Male School, replaced with new ones.

Transmitting an extract from the Medical Officer's Return, Form L, relating to the Oranmore Dispensary District, for the half-year ended 31st March last, and requesting the Guardians will be so good as to take the requisite action in connection with the matter referred to therein.

Extract referred to.

"Dispensary far too small. No convenience for examining Patients. Drugs have to be compounded in public gaze, which is disagreeable. The dispensary is very damp, and a good many of the medicines have gone to waste during last Winter, especially the Solids. There are only two fires a week put down at present. There should be a constant fire during Winter."

The Guardians are not prepared to expend any more money in repairing this Dispensary, or Dispensary Residence, and the Medical Officer will have to be quite satisfied with it as it stands at present. A ton of coal is allowed every Winter for use of the Dispensary, and if the Medical Officer found medicines going to waste owing to dampness, the Guardians consider it was his duty to direct the Porter to have a fire lighted daily.
