The meeting was summoned to consider a report furnished by Sir A. Macbullaigh and Dr Colahan and McDonogh as to the accommodation that will be required for patients, nurses, &c. in the new Fever Hospital.

The report was duly considered and the Committee begt submit for the approval of the Board of Guardians suggestions as follow, namely.

Male Wing.

To contain two wards with ten beds in each, and an infection ward for cases of scarlatina, measles, &c. with six beds. A bath room and W.C. for each of the large

wards.

Female Wing.

Accommodation exactly similar to that in the Male Wing.

Observation Wards.

A ward in the male and female wings respectively, to contain four beds in each, a W.C. and a roller bath for each.

Nurses Apartments.

Two sleeping apartments, one for the day and the other for the night nurses; three beds in each; one sitting and one dining room; a bath room and W.C.

Wardmaids.

One apartment with four beds. W.C. accommodation for them to be created in a yard.

Kitchen, &c.

One of good size, with a scullery off it, and a pantry in a convenient place; stores for clothing and provisions.

Out-offices.

A coal house, laundry, drying closet, coach house, mortuary, disinfecting chamber, store for holding clothing, &c. awaiting disinfection, and same for clothing which has been disinfected and awaiting removal.

The Committee recommend advertising for plans, &c. for a new Hospital, offering a prize of £25 for the best, with a proviso that if the person whose ^{plans} is considered the best be appointed to supervise the work, the prize is to be merged in his commission fees. The plans, &c. when furnished, to be submitted to an independent

Dublin architect for the selection of the best.
 The advertisement to be inserted in the following

Referring to previous correspondence respecting the appointment of John P. Fogarty as Gate Porter at the Workhouse Fever Hospital, and stating that they have received a report from their Inspector, Major Rutledge Fair, in which he states that he has several times visited Galway during the past twelve months with a view to ascertaining how Mr. Fogarty has been discharging his duties, and he thinks that on the whole the employment of this man may now be sanctioned. The Board have accordingly sanctioned the appointment on the terms specified in the replies to queries, namely, at a salary of £20 a year, with rations to the value of $2\frac{1}{2}$ weekly.

The Irish County Councils' General Council, forwarded for the approval of the Guardians resolutions as follow, namely:

No. 1.

- RESOLVED:—1st. "That we are of opinion that the present system of managing the Irish Railways is detrimental to the interests of Ireland.
- 2nd. "That the placing their management in the hands of the British Government would be also detrimental to Ireland.
- 3rd. "That, on the other hand, it would be of great advantage to Ireland if all the Irish Railways were put under one management, subject to the control of some body representing the people of Ireland; and that the General Council of County Councils could be made use of as such a representative body, if no other representative body were formed.
- 4th. "That the necessary legal powers should be given to the General Council, or other representative body, to purchase all the Irish Railways, and to borrow money for that purpose on the security of the rates of the whole of Ireland, which, added to that of the Railways themselves, would make the security so perfectly safe, that the necessary money could be borrowed at a reasonable rate of interest."

The adoption of this resolution was proposed by Mr. P. Baunon, seconded by Mr. M. Redington, and carried.

No. 2.

"That in the event of the establishment of an independent Irish Insurance Company on a sound financial basis, we, the Guardians of Galway Union would be in favour of placing our insurance business with it."

The adoption of this resolution was proposed by Mr. Baunon, seconded by Sir J. O'Rourke and carried.

Resolved. That Mr. H. MacDonnell be requested to attend as a delegate from this Board at the Conference proposed to be held at the Mansion House, Dublin, on the 13th prox.
