P.O. knows me well, his suffian can do as she  
likes in this place. She went to Galway on Friday  
night last a drunken pig by the nine train  
at night and the Lee girls that are her chums,  
with her glass and bottle both day and night, locut  
in for her on Saturday night last and marched  
our suffian of a nurse out in the dark on Sat-  
urday night. Tell me what steps I am to  
take and I wish you publish this letter in the press.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and orders made thereon as follows:—

On 28<sup>th</sup> ult. I rejected a quarter of Beef for being under the prescribed weight. One of proper weight was supplied. On the 1<sup>st</sup> inst. I asked Dr. McDonogh to examine the meat which was being delivered, and while writing for Dr. Colahan for the same purpose the contractor took away the meat without notifying me. I then purchased meat in town and charged him with the extra cost. On my return the contractor was in the yard again with meat. I asked him weigh a fore quarter of Beef and promised if it were proper weight and quality I would take it in. He would not allow me examine the meat until Dr. Colahan came. Later on both Medical Officers rejected the Beef as not of the best quality. On the 4<sup>th</sup> inst. both Medical Officers rejected, for a like reason, a fore quarter of Beef. The Food and Drugs Inspector took samples of milk on the 4<sup>th</sup> inst.

7<sup>th</sup> 185/06. } Referring to previous correspondence and to the entry  
4<sup>th</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup>. } in the Minutes of the 28<sup>th</sup> ult. relative to the proposal to permit an inmate of the Workhouse named Michael O'Doherty to go out to town to teach dancing on two evenings in the week, and stating that to relax the Workhouse Rules in favour of some particular inmate would have a bad effect on discipline in the Workhouse generally, and the Board cannot approve of the proposal as they have already intimated.

*Order. The Master to exercise his discretion in allowing O'Doherty out on pass.*

3<sup>rd</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup> '06. } From the Sec. to the Galway Central Teachers' Association,

enclosing a copy of a resolution submitted to Irish Representative Bodies for adoption, as follows:—

RESOLVED: That we demand for the children attending Irish National Schools educational rights and privileges equal to those enjoyed by the children attending similar schools in England and Scotland. That we consider it a monstrous injustice to Ireland that the Parliamentary Grant for Irish Primary Education for the current year should be £578,905 less than the Scottish Grant, while the number of pupils to be educated in Primary Schools in these two countries is practically the same, being in the ratio of 1 for Ireland and 1.09 for Scotland in 1905; while if the population be taken as basis—and this is the only basis which would be fair to this country—Scotland gets 101 pence per head this year, while Ireland receives only 76 pence per head from the ordinary estimates, and 3 pence per head from the Development Grant. That, in the interests of Irish Education, we urgently ask an all round increase in the salaries of Irish Teachers, as we believe the present starvation salaries are calculated to prevent the entrance of suitable candidates to the teaching profession, as well as to drive away those who are already in; and that we see no reason whatever for denying to Irish Teachers those civil rights which are freely conceded to the teachers of Great Britain.

*The adoption of this resolution was proposed by Mr. Cannon, seconded by Mr. Ryan, and carried unanimously.*

4<sup>th</sup> Decr '06. From Nurse K. Corless, stating that owing to the death of her mother she has been unable to return to duty at the termination of her vacation. Requesting an extra week and promising to pay her substitute for the extra time.

At suit of Michael Fallon against Barth<sup>o</sup> Ruane, Hugh Tully, and Mary McDonough from premises in Shop St. Galway.

In pursuance of notice given for this date, Mr. H. McDonogh moved—that the resolution passed on the 7<sup>th</sup> inst. giving the sole preparation of plans, &c. for the new Fever Hospital to Mr. Bums, be rescinded, and that the report of the Fever Hospital Committee recommending competition for plans be adopted.

The motion was seconded by Mr. W. Coen. A division being challenged the motion was carried by 21 votes against 10.

On the motion of Mr. H. McDonogh, seconded by Mr. Martin Moloney it was—Resolved—that advertisement be issued inviting plans, &c. as recommended in the report of the Fever Hospital Committee. <sup>to</sup> ~~be~~ <sup>be</sup> entered in the Minutes of the Guardians' Meeting on the 31<sup>st</sup> Oct last. Plans, &c. to be considered at Guardians' Meeting on the 6<sup>th</sup> Feby next.

An amendment proposed by Mr. J. D. Bailey, seconded by Mr. M. Ryan—that plans &c. be invited from Engineers and Architects resident in the County Galway only, was lost by 21 votes against 12.

Moved by Mr. D. MacDermell, seconded by Mr. J. Curran, and unanimously—Resolved, that we beg to tender to the families of the late Mr. James Perry, M. C., and Mr. James Shaine, our deep sympathy with them in their affliction.

Mr. P. Sullivan, Inspector under the Infant Life Protection Act, reported that since his last report there has been no violation of the law in Galway District.

The claim against Mrs Kelly of Salt Hill, amount £1-4-0, for the maintenance in Hospital of her servant Margaret Keely, was remitted.

Moved by Mr M. J. Cooke, seconded by Mr N. Lydon, and Resolved. That we request the sanction of the Local Government Board to cancel the contract entered into with Mr J. Sullivan for the supply of Beef and Mutton to the Workhouse, as the disputes over it are very frequent.

Order. The attention of Dr Colahan to be directed to the complaint made by the Meat contractor of the great delay in examining Beef supplied on the 12<sup>th</sup> inst. The Guardians desire that when called upon he will examine the meat or other supplies before 12 noon.

Order. The Fever Hospital Committee to be summoned to meet at the Board Room, at 11 o'clock, on the 12<sup>th</sup> inst.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and orders made thereon as follows:—

On the 13<sup>th</sup> inst. Martin Devaney was transferred to Salway Hospital for special treatment.

By direction of Dr. Colahan I wired to Dublin on the 14<sup>th</sup> inst. for a nurse for temporary duty for a tetanus patient. Nurse Mary Agnes Armstrong arrived same evening and took up duty. When this patient died Dr. Colahan ordered the following articles to be buried, namely: 1 mattress, 2 pillows, 3 blankets, 1 bolster, 2 rugs, and 2 sheets.

The case against Pat. McDonogh for failing to maintain his wife and children was again adjourned for a month on the 17<sup>th</sup> inst. to allow him make provision for them.

On the 17<sup>th</sup> inst. by direction of the Medical Officer I rejected two quarters of beef not being of the prescribed quality. Having a supply in I bought none. This morning the Medical Officers rejected a quarter of beef for being poor and bad meat. I purchased beef and charged the contractor with the extra cost.
