By order of the Medical Officer I rejected 79 loaves of bread delivered by the Contractor on the 20<sup>th</sup> inst. It was sour and of inferior quality. I notified the Contractor but he has not taken it away. I purchased bread in town and charged the Contractor with the extra cost.

There is grating required for the Steam Boiler, and the Shower Bath in the Probation Ward needs repairs.

The father of the Bread Contractor came before the Board and submitted a certificate furnished by Sir C. A. Cameron after the analysis of two loaves of bread sent to him by the Contractor. It was alleged that one of them was exactly of the quality of the bread rejected by the Workhouse Medical Officer, and the other exactly the same as the bread purchased by the Workhouse Master in lieu of bread rejected.

the report on the former being more favourable than that on the latter.

It was proposed by Mr. W. Lydon, and seconded by Mr. M. Ryan, that the Contractor be paid for the 79 loaves of bread supplied by him to the Workhouse on the 20<sup>th</sup> inst. which were rejected by the Workhouse Master by direction of the Medical Officer as being sour and of inferior quality.

A negative amendment was proposed by Mr. R. J. Cooke, and seconded by Mr. M. Cunningham.

On a division the voting was three for, and three against the amendment.

The original motion was then put when no votes were recorded for, but three against it. It fell through.
