S. McDonough, Workhouse Medical Officer, requested that a battery in the Hospital be repaired.

Workhouse Schoolmaster,

With reference to reports brought against me at your meeting on the 16<sup>th</sup> inst. by Father Cliffin, C.C. and the Master, I beg to submit the following explanation. On the morning of the 14<sup>th</sup> inst. one of the little boys' suspenders was mislaid in their dormitory, and while I was making a search for them, the little boy to whom they belonged had on his trousers and shirt,

with his coat on his arm, he went down to the school to get on his boots and socks, as they are not allowed to wear their boots in the dormitory for the reason that the floor would get more or less soiled. On seeing me engaged looking for his suspenders he got as far as the door and then went down dressed in the way I have explained; he, however, instead of going into the school at once, ran out as far as the crossing 4 or 5 yards from the school door. Also another boy whose coat and vest were unbuttoned at the time. These boys while running to the crossing and back were seen by Father Cliffin, C.C. who was passing out of the house at the time, 7-30 am. — They were not under my observation for the short time I was looking for the suspenders in the dormitory, and it was natural to expect that the little boy would

not put his coat on until he had his suspenders. Hoping this will be to your satisfaction and it will not occur again.

As regards the Master stating in his Journal "that on the 14<sup>th</sup> inst. he drew the attention of the Schoolmaster to want of supervision of the boys while making up their dormitory". I have to state that I fail to understand how he could personally see or know that there was a want of supervision while they were making up their dormitory on that morning for he was not out of his bedroom at the time, he never sees them making up their dormitory as a matter of fact. I clearly recollect that he did not come down from his bedroom that particular morning until 8.40 o'clock. He came to the School door on passing to the hall

and told me in a friendly way that the boys were making noise in their dormitory and cautioned them. I know very well that the Master's "morning rest" has been much disturbed by the making up of the boys' dormitory, brushing the floor and settling the beds, and the walking of the boys would make a little noise. When the Master saw a report in the Chaplain's Book by Father Griffin, he then added his own, although I feel certain he would not report if there had not been one in the Chaplain's Book. The fact of the Master's report being against me would likely stop a Guardian from <sup>questioning</sup> asking the Master on the matter.

I beg to report for your information that David Reilly, an inmate of the house, is allowed the use of a pass key with the Master's knowledge and permission. The above-named inmate opens the doors every morning in the male side of the house to my own personal knowledge for nearly six months. Monaghan, another inmate, unlocks the doors in the male side of the house to let in some of the inmates who go out of the house after lock up, viz: 7.30 pm.

The Master has not been on duty in the mornings, the time his duties bind him to; he has been on duty very often as late as 8.30 am, sometimes 8.45.

The eight tubs in the male side of the house are emptied every morning near the middle of the mens' yard in the channel near the water tap, the place being partly covered with nuisance, the smell of which is most offensive.

The wardmaids and some of the female inmates have access to the male side of the

house without supervision on the Master's part. I am prepared on oath to substantiate all these charges.

22<sup>nd</sup> Oct '07 From Messrs Michael and John Laffy, Galway, complaining that about 6 months ago, the Guardians sent their sister, Annie Laffy, from the Workhouse to the District Asylum at Ballinasloe; that every month they were informed of her condition by the Medical Superintendent. On the 17<sup>th</sup> inst. they received notice from the Master of the Galway Workhouse of the death of this sister, and they wired to the Superintendent of the Asylum that they were going to Ballinasloe by the next train to attend the funeral. On arrival at the Asylum they were informed that their sister had been three days buried, and in reply to their inquiry why they were not informed of her death immediately after it occurred, were told that as there was a mission going on in Ballinasloe the Priest ordered the remains to be interred at once. Having inquired for the Medical Superintendent, were informed he was out; same reply about Assistants Nos 1 & 2. The notice received by the Master of the Workhouse states that the death occurred on the 13<sup>th</sup> inst. the notice is dated the 14<sup>th</sup> inst. the Ballinasloe post mark on envelope is the 16<sup>th</sup> inst. Galway postmark 17<sup>th</sup>. As the Guardians sent this girl to the Asylum, they should cause a searching inquiry to be made into the case.

*Order.* The Resident Medical Superintendent of the Asylum to be furnished with a copy of this complaint and an explanation requested.
