In answer to your communication re the death of Anne Laffey from the Galway Toard of Guardians, I beg to say :-1. Anne Laffey was admitted here a patient on April 5th, 1907, from Galway Union Workhouse. In all my long experience I have never seen a worse case of shameful, neglect and bad hursing as she presented. She was a mass of bedsores, elbows, shoulders, hips, and ankles with large and filthy ulcers in them, and a perforating wheer on the small of her back and inch and a half deep. Only prolonged and shameful negligence on the part of those responsible for her bodily condition before admittance will explain this. Also her legs were so neglected that the muscles were wasted and the sinews so shrunk that even when convalescent here she was unable to stand upright. She was for over four months in our Infirmary division, and only after the most unremitting attention from the Medical Officers and pur most skilled nurses were her bedsores caused to heal. She was apparently in good bodily health, but she was so refractory that it was impossible to thoroughly know the state of her health, but she was so refractory that it was impossible and at about 3 p'm. on Sunday 13th instant, she got an epileptiform fit, was attended by the Priest at 4 p'm. and died at 8 p'm.

It is a matter for regret and also for suprise that this document did not see the light some six months ago, when the patient - Anne Laffy - first went to Ballinasloe. It is difficult to understand why it was with-held until now, when a serious charge of mismanagement has been brought by your Board against the Asylum itself. I am prevented by the communication itself, from attributing this, to over sensitiveness or nice feeling.

Its tone is be unusually virulent, its language is so extravagant, and its statements are so palpably exaggerated, that it is evidently the result of some intense sudden excitement, and is a production that could have emanated only from a Lunitic Asylum.

With your permission I will state the facts of the case:—
Anne Laffy was admitted to the Workhouse for the first time on
18th February, 1907, having been sent back from America. On the
4th March, 1907, she became suddenly ill in the Infirm Ward,
and was admitted to the Hospital, suffering evidently from serious
brain trouble. She refused to take food, would not speak, and
was suffering from constipation and retention. She was at once
attended by the Nurse on duty - Nurse Corless - and from that
time to the day she went to Fallinasloe, she received the un-remitting attention, day and night, of one or other of our
excellent nurses. She was put on a water bed, she was fed by
nutritive enemata, and the most scrupulous care and attention
were paid to preventing skin trouble occurring, as the result

And it was a matter of congratulation amongst them, that the patient had passed through such a terrible time with but two slight superficial abrasions. And this result was entirely due to the unremitting care of the nurses in charge of the case.
