He now finds that the materials alone cost him £21-13-9. In the circumstances he trusts the Guardians will make a reasonable allowance for his labour.

Read Letter from D. W. A. Sandys, dated 1st May, 1907,

certifying that Dr. Kirwan, Medical Officer of the Spiddal Dispensary District, is still unable to walk and therefore not fit for Dispensary duty.

5th May '07. From Dr. P. Cusack, acting Medical Officer of the same district, notifying that he has been appointed to a permanent post in County Meath, and that he must leave Spiddal on the morning of the 8th inst.; that he has so informed Dr. Kirwan.

It was proposed by Mr. M. Cooke, seconded by Sir J. O'Donoghue, and unanimously Resolved — That we beg to tender to Dr. P. Cusack our best thanks for the very satisfactory manner in which he discharged the duties of Medical Officer of the Spiddal Dispensary District of this Union during the illness of Dr. Kirwan from the 13th March last, up to this date.

That the sick poor of the district appreciated his kind attention to them has been proved in many cases by the fact that they refrained from applying for Red tickets and voluntarily offered fees that he declined to accept, feeling that the poor people could not afford to pay them.

We wish Dr. Cusack success in his professional career.

1st May '07. From Messrs J. Clarke & Co, late Medicines contractors, acknowledging the receipt of a copy of the Analyst's report on a sample of Arsenical Solution from the Curloughmore Dispensary District, stating

that they are at a loss to understand how there can be a deficiency of arsenic in the sample sent for analysis, as they estimated what they have in stock, which was made up at the same time, and found it to be quite up to strength, in fact 25 C.C. discharged the colour of 50.95 C.C. of the solution of Iodine, therefore it is just a fraction above strength. They are under the impression that probably the sample was sent forward in a wet bottle, which would make a slight difference in such a small quantity. That they forwarded a fresh supply.

The Clerk informed the Guardians that on the 25th inst. he wrote to Dr. Glynn requesting him to return any quantity of this drug in stock at his Dispensaries, and to report when the defective drug has been replaced. No report since received.

Order. Dr. Glynn to be called upon to explain why he has not reported.

8th May '07. From Relieving Officer O'Keefe, reporting that Dr. Cusack left the Spiddal Dispensary District this morning, having had a promise from Dr. Kirwan to take up duty today.

Nurse Corless left on a week's vacation on the 11th inst. leaving Nurse Delia Davis as her substitute. She did not notify the Medical Officer or myself that she was leaving, or of the arrangements which she had made.

Order. Nurse Corless to be informed that the Guardians disapprove of her conduct in leaving the Workhouse without giving due notice to the Medical Officer and Master of the Workhouse.

A quarter of beef was rejected by the Medical Officers on the 11th inst., being inferior in quality, and I rejected a quarter on the 12th inst., being cow beef. On both occasions the contractor supplied good beef instead of that rejected.

Please appoint a Committee to inspect the condemned clothing.
