As directed on the 10<sup>th</sup> inst. I noticed Pat. McDonogh that he should be again prosecuted at the end of a fortnight if he did not take his wife and children out of the Workhouse. He has not done so.

*Allowed another fortnight.*

The Schoolmaster was absent without leave on the 20<sup>th</sup> inst. from 10-45 am. to 9-55 pm. I had a man in charge of the boys.

*Schoolmaster's Explanation.*

I was absent from the house on Saturday last from 10-45 am. to 9-55 pm. Having got your permission to absent myself on Saturdays from 11 am. to 1 pm. I attended a Teachers' Meeting in connection with the teaching bi-lingual programme in

National Schools. The business did not commence until near 2 pm. and was not over until near 4 pm. I was invited to a Teacher's house where, after being pressed waited unwillingly for dinner. The rest of the time was spent in shopping. Hoping that this will be to the sanction of the Board and it will never occur again. Of course I told the inmate to keep the boys under his supervision during my absence.

The Post-typerwriter Co. submitted an offer to supply a new machine in lieu of one that has been in use in the Clerk's Office for ten years, for the sum of £15-10-0, being an allowance of £5 for the old machine and 5% off cash price. The cost of repairs of old one would be £2-18-6.

Proposed by Mr. Griffin, seconded by Mr. Ryan, and unanimously - Resolved. That we accept the offer of the supply of the new typerwriter for £15-10-0.

Notifications of the adoption of the Guardians' resolution re Old Age Pensions were received from the Unions of Dinastea, Ballymena, Scariff, Kilmallock, and Castlereagh.

In pursuance of notice given for this date, Mr. M. Cunningham moved - that the Guardians do take into consideration the question of remunerating the Clerk, Workhouse Master, and the several Relieving Officers for their services in preparing to an Order of the House of Commons returns of Indoor and Outdoor Relief afforded in the Union during the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> March last.

The motion was seconded by Mr. J. Griffin. The following amendment was proposed by Mr. Blaney, and seconded by Mr. Ryan, ~~an amendment~~ - that no remuneration be allowed as we consider it to be the duty of these officials to prepare the returns; otherwise to apply to the House of Commons for remuneration.

On a division the amendment was lost by 11 votes to 6, one Guardian declined to vote.

It was proposed by Mr F. Bailey and seconded by Mr P. French - that the sum of £25 be allowed the Clerk, £10 to the Workhouse Master, and one shilling per case to each of the Relieving Officers.

An amendment - that the fixing of the amount of remuneration be postponed to a later date, was proposed by Mr M. King and seconded by Mr J. O'Brien.

This amendment was withdrawn and the motion was declared carried.

In the absence of Sir J. O'Donoghue, no action was taken on the notice to rescind the resolution appointing Sir C. A. Cameron as Analyst to the Union.

Mr A. Howlishaw, b. e. submitted drawings and specification for the new Fever Hospital to be forwarded to the L. S. Board for approval.

John Feeney, 5<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> years, illegitimate, mother in Workhouse and is partly imbecile.

Peter Murphy, 7<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> years, deserted by parents.

John Corneely, 7<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> years, illegitimate, mother dead.

Malachy Tierney, 6 years, father dead, mother not in the Workhouse, of vicious habits; child taken from her some years ago.

*In the three cases in which the mothers object to their children being boarded out, the Guardians are of opinion the children are likely to be left in the Workhouse for years. The sanction of the L. S. Board is requested to the Guardians assuming control of these children.*

The Magistrate sentenced John Ward to a month's imprisonment for insubordination in the Workhouse.

The flagged passages in the Workhouse require to be roughened about 2 ft. wide, in all about 386 square feet.

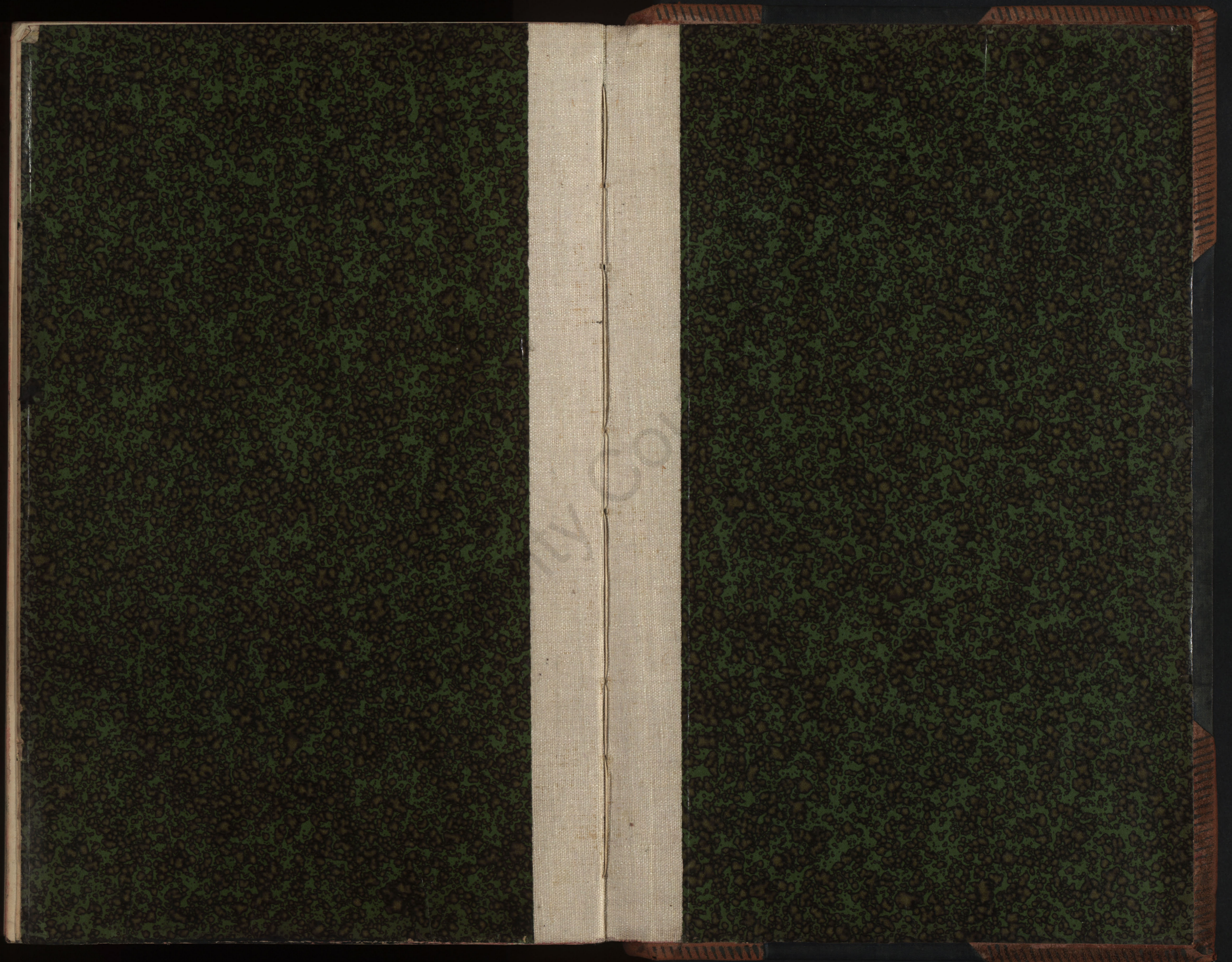

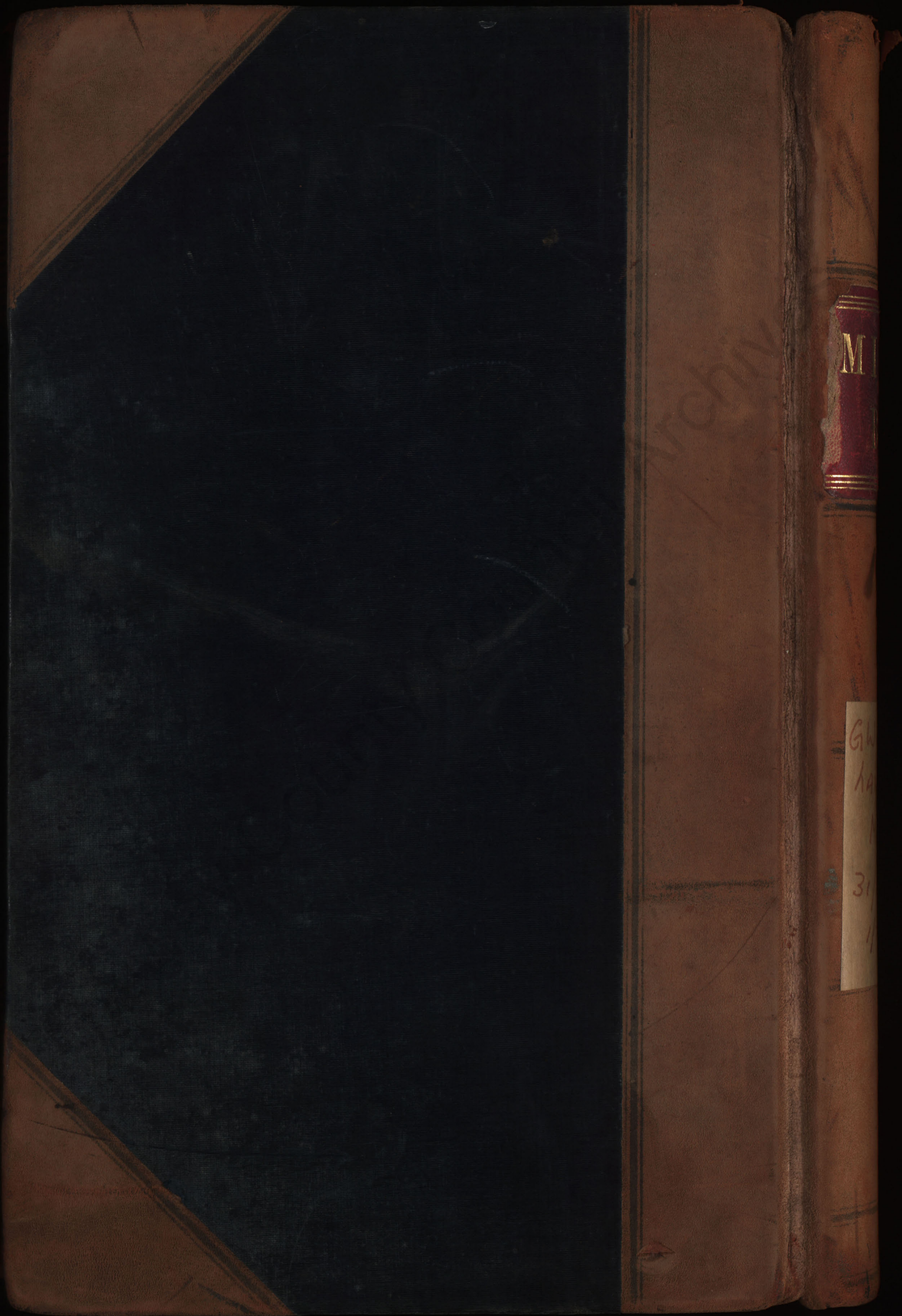
