67,788/09, 29th May. Approving of the appointment of Mrs. Margt. McWalter as Midwife of the Drummore Dispensary District at a salary of £30 a year.

69,807/09, 29th May. Forwarding an extract from the Medical Officers' Returns, Form L, relating to the Furlongmore Dispensary District for the half-year ended 31st March last; & requesting that the Guardians will furnish any observations they desire to make regarding the matter referred to therein.

Extract.
The Dispensary Buildings are suitable, in good order & kept clean, but the Board has refused to give coal. On 29th March last, the Medical Officer requisitioned a ton of coal for use in the Dispensary. The Guardians

did not see fit to supply it then.

8th May '09. From Mr. D. B. Dillon, owner of the Cartroulahan Dispensary in Spiddal District, stating that he has gone to considerable expense in the improvement of the Dispensary & Waiting Room, as can be testified by the Medical Officer Relieving Officer. Requesting that the Guardians will allow him the same rent as they pay the owner of the Spiddal Dispensary.

Several of the local Guardians who were in attendance bore testimony to the satisfactory condition of the Cartroulahan Dispensary, moved by Mr. M. Cunningham, seconded by Mr. J. Cooke, & unanimously — Resolved — that the rent allowed for this Dispensary be increased from £7 to £9 a year, the latter being the amount allowed for the adjoining Dispensary at Spiddal.

1st June '09. From Dr. Conolly, Medical Officer of the Hoycellen Dispensary District, applying for leave of absence on the 8th & 9th inst. neither being Dispensary Day. Granted. The Relieving Officer to procure the services of a substitute if necessary.

1st June '09. From Dr. Cannon, Medical Officer of the Drummore Dispensary District, applying for a month's vacation; nominating Dr. C. F. D. O'Sullivan to act as substitute. Granted 4 weeks' vacation. Moved by Mr. M. Cunningham, seconded by Mr. J. O'Donohoe, & unanimously — Resolved — that Dr. C. F. D. O'Sullivan be, thereby, is appointed to act as substitute at a remuneration at the rate of £44.0

Re your communication No. 59,333, I fail to see where I have shown any want of courtesy to the Guardians although outrageously slandered on several occasions by two or three members of the Board,

committed at by one of its officials & that no later than last Wednesday.

I asked the Board about two months ago to send coal to Lachagh Dispensary. None has arrived so far. I told the Clerk on several occasions to order the contractor to divide the medicine for Lachagh & Carrandulla, but all to no avail.

The Guardians do not desire to add anything to the observations previously made.

The Clerk submitted to the Guardians a copy of a memo he posted to Dr. Glynn on the 26th March 1907, pointing out that he (Dr. Glynn) must give the contractors special notice when he requires the medicines, made up in two parcels.

The Guardians consider it the duty of Dr. Glynn to give the contractors such special notice when the necessity arises.
