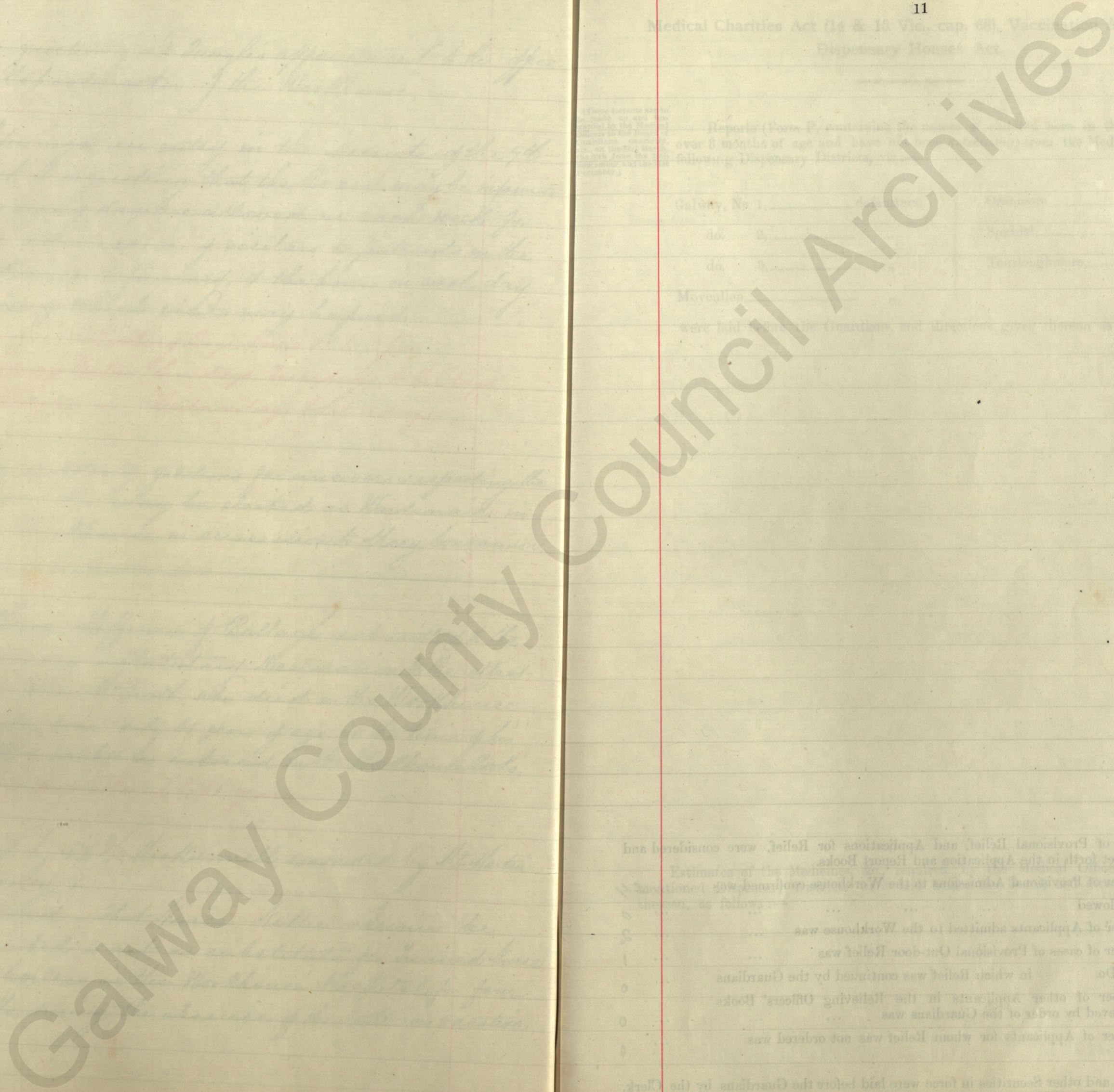

Medical Officer of Galway No. 2 Disp. Dist. & Workhouse stating that on the 16th inst. Mr. Larkin, D. Crealys Manager, reported to him that the Tincture of Orange was disappearing from the Workhouse Hospital. On the 15th inst. Patrick Griffin, Porter of the Galway Dispensary, was seen in the Workhouse Hospital yard between 5 & 6 pm. by two inmates named Patrick Kelly & Martin Moloney. Griffin asked Moloney what nurse was on day duty in the Hospital & was informed Nurse Molloy. Griffin then said "I want to go over to the Hospital & can get in as I have a Pass Key." The same Key opens the doors of the rooms in the Workhouse & Dispensary where drugs are kept & Griffin holds one of the Keys.

On the 16th inst. the Tincture of Orange at the Dispensary was measured by Mr. Larkin in the presence of Griffin & the writer & it measured about 2 oz. more than on the 10th inst. & this would about correspond with the quantity missing from the Workhouse Hospital.

The time Griffin was in the Workhouse Hospital yard is the time where there are very few people about in the Hospital as the Day Nurse is off duty between 3 pm. & 6 pm. & the Nuns are at prayers.

In compliance with the order of the Guardians at last meeting, Patrick Griffin, Porter of the Galway Dispensary, submitted an explan-

ation as follows of a charge preferred against him. I, Patrick Griffin, admit the charges preferred against me & regret that I should have taken any Tincture of Orange, & also the further charge against me today, & promise in the future I shall not interfere with any article placed in my charge.

I further state I am now 19 years in your employment & this is the first ^{charge} brought against me. I cannot assign any reason for taking same.

Moved by *W. H. Cooke*, seconded by *Sir J. McDonogh*, & Resolved. That Patrick Griffin be allowed another chance to redeem his character, but that he be warned that any further complaint against him will lead to his dismissal.
