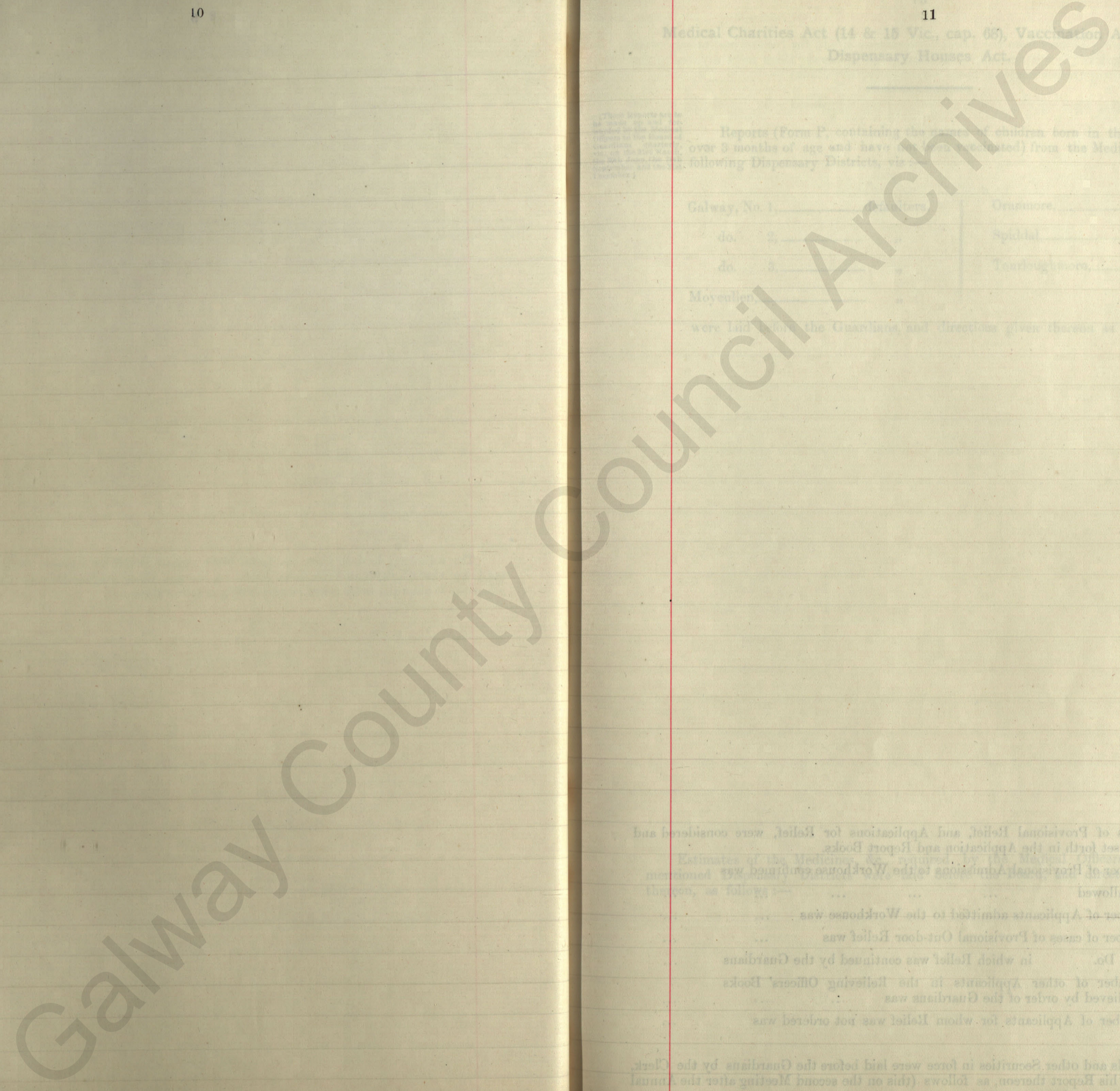

Ellen Higgins entered on her duties as Wardmaid in the Workhouse Hospital on 28th ult.

Nurse Corless resumed duty after six weeks' vacation on 31st ult., and her substitute, Nurse Irwin, left on same date.

Nurse Garrick resumed duty in the Fever Hospital after 4 weeks' vacation on 2nd inst.

James Flaherty, who was reported at last Meeting for refusing to maintain his wife & children, was sentenced to 14 days' imprisonment at Petty Sessions on 2nd inst.

Sent samples of milk delivered by the Contractors on the 6th inst. for analysis.

The milk delivered by Contractors Martin & John Cadyre on 21st ult., turned Sour. They forfeit the quantity, 1 gal. each. Contractor Pat^o Glynn's milk was under the Standard on 7th inst., registering only 6 degrees of cream. He forfeits the quantity, 2 gallons. This is the first report within 12 months against either of the Cadyres, and second against Glynn.
