THE PAUPER CHILDREN (IRELAND) ACTS,
And CHILDREN ACT. 1908.

28th Jan'y '10. From the Clerk of Union, Gleumamaddy, stating that a child named Kathleen Redmond, boarded out from the Galway Union, was admitted to their Hospital with her foster parent on the 28th inst. the latter being ill. Requesting the Galway Guardians to defray the cost of the child's maintenance in the Workhouse.
Order. To be paid at the rate of 3/- a week, the boarding out allowance.

31st Jan'y '10. From Rev. W. Conway, P.P. Gleumamaddy, forwarding reports for the quarter ended 31-12-09, on the children boarded out from Galway Workhouse in his Parish. Pointing out that the school attendance reports show that the absences from school are numerous. One or two foster parents were already warned. & to make an example the children should be taken from them & placed elsewhere. In the case of some of the children who are very young, or delicate, or a distance from school, an excuse can be found as the weather for some time has been exceptionally severe. The foster parent of Kathleen Redmond died on the 28th inst. The child was taken to the Gleumamaddy Workhouse Hospital with the foster parent for the latter lived alone. He has got another foster parent for the child. Requesting a form of application, which will be duly filled up.
He believes a visit from the Lady Inspector, Miss Fitzgerald-Kennedy would be very desirable.
Order. To be informed of the claim made by the Gleumamaddy Board of Guardians re Kathleen Redmond's maintenance in the Workhouse, that the Guardians approve of changing some of the children as suggested.
