1st inst. Bridget Sweeney & Lizzie Berkery entered on their duties as Wardsmaids in Workhouse.

3rd inst. John S. Duoye, Schoolmaster, resumed duty after illness.

7th inst. Julia O'Kea, employed temporarily as washwoman in the Fever Hospital, left as her services were no longer needed.

The van driver has not returned to work as yet, nor has he produced a medical certificate.

Order. The Master to see the man & report to the Guardians at next meeting.

Clerk's Report.

For week ended on the 4th inst. I find in the Provisions Consumption Account an item of 126 lbs. of fresh meat charged as having been consumed over & above the ordinary diets, with a note added by the Master that he was ordered by the Visiting Committee to give this coarse meat to the inmates.

I have to call attention to two cases where outdoor

& indoor relief overlap. Margaret Whelan of Newcastle, Galway, has been in receipt of $\frac{3}{4}$ weekly, as outdoor relief for some time past. She was admitted to the Workhouse on the 21st ult., notwithstanding the outdoor relief has been entered on the Relieving Officers' Outdoor relief list for the weeks ended ~~27th ult.~~ ^{28th ult.} & ~~29th ult.~~ ^{28th ult.}

Patrick Delany of Seeth St. Galway, also in receipt of outdoor relief for some time past, was admitted to the Workhouse on the 31st ult. & the outdoor relief was charged for week ended the 4th inst.

The Master of the Workhouse explained that the unusual demand for Beef Tea for fever patients caused this quantity, 126 lbs. of coarse meat to be on hands.

No order made by the Guardians re the cases of overlapping of indoor & outdoor relief.

6th Dec. } Informing the Guardians that they have received the half-yearly report of their Inspector, Major Rutledge-Fair, on the Union consequent on his recent inspection of the Workhouse. The report is of a satisfactory character as regards the financial condition of the Union, the general management of the Workhouse, & the discharge of their duties by the several Officers of the Guardians. A few slates require replacing, some gutters need overhauling, & some windows require repairs. These matters should have attention. The Inspector states that the Visiting Committee never meet unless specially summoned; the requirements of Article 59 of the Workhouse Rules should be complied with.

The Master of the Workhouse informed the Guardians that the repairs alluded to have since been carried out.

7th June } Referring to the Minutes of the 18th inst. & stating that they have sanctioned the proposal to increase the salary of Delia Walloran from £5 a year to £8 a year - the increase to date from July 1910, when she will have completed five years' service. They are unable to sanction the proposed increases in the salaries of Wardsmaid Julia Bowry & Wardsman Martin Keady as it is contrary to their practice, except in very special circumstances to sanction an increase of salary to an officer within five years of appointment or of a previous increase of salary.
Sanctioning the proposal to transfer Mary Connor from the position of Wardsmaid in 121 Ward (Male) at £6 a year to that of Wardsmaid in 124 Ward (Female) at £8 a year.

7th June '10 From Mr Martin Costello, further treating of the Guardians' claim for the maintenance of his son in the Workhouse Fever Hospital.

Granted.

In pursuance of notice given for this date, Sir J. O'Donohoe moved that the order made by the Guardians at meeting on the 18th ult. dropping the proceedings against Martin Costello for the recovery of the cost of maintenance of his son in Hospital, be rescinded, & that, instead, the Guardians will, as advised by their Solicitor, proceed for the recovery of the money. The motion having been seconded by Mr. J. Griffin was carried unanimously.

The Clerk read a copy of a notice sent to each Guardian that at meeting today, a report received from Mr. A. Cowlishaw, C. E., re defects in the main sewer drain on the North side of the Workhouse into which the drain from the new Fever Hospital is to empty, will be considered.

Mr. Cowlishaw having fully explained matters & answered all questions asked, was directed to make a thorough inspection of all the drains in connection with the Workhouse & to furnish a report to the Guardians at an early date.

Order. The new Fever Hospital Committee to be summoned to meet at the Board Room at 11 am, on the 15th inst, to examine drawings & specification for the boundary walls, &c.

The Clerk submitted a claim from Mr. Butler for £ 5-5-0 as fee for taking & valuing the stock of provisions, clothing, &c. in the Workhouse on the 31st March last.

The Matron & Schoolmaster took exception to the Stocktaker's return of clothing, &c. in their charge, showing deficiencies, but on a resort the stocks were shown as correct.

The Master has now submitted his return of the hardware, &c. goods ^{as counted by him} in the Inventory Book, the number of articles appearing on hands being in most cases in excess of the return submitted by the Stocktaker.

Moved by Mr. J. Griffin, seconded by Mr. W. Kelly, & Resolved - That Mr. Butler be paid the fee of £ 5-5-0.

2nd Decr. } a copy of a correspondence between the Department & Dr. Kinwan, Medical Officer of the Spiddal Disp. Dist., in regard to the Medical expenditure in that District during the half-year ended 31st March last, the expenditure amounted to £26-10-11, & the number of patients recorded as having been treated was 275.

In reply to the Board's request for his observations the Medical Officer wrote as follows:— The number of tickets, 275, does not represent the amount of medicine dispensed. Guardians don't use Dispensary tickets.

The Guardians beg to observe that they consider the cost of medicines, in the circumstances, excessive; if the Guardians do not issue tickets they can be obtained from the Relieving Officer who attends, for that purpose, at the Dispensaries on all Dispensary Days; that the Medical Officer should not, except under very exceptional circumstances, give medicines to any person until a Dispensary ticket is produced.

2nd Decr, 1910. Telegram from Dr. Moore, Acting Medical Officer of Galway No 3 Disp. Dist. (Aran Islands) stating that there were no drugs nor dressing in the Dispensary. The Clerk informed the Guardians that he wired to Messrs. Boyleau & Boyd, Medicines Contractors, & received a reply that the drugs, &c, were forwarded on the 18th inst. On enquiry at Railway Stores he learned that they had been lying there for some time, but, owing to the vague address, were not forwarded to Aran Islands, although the full address was given on the Requisition Form. Many complaints have been made by the Medical Officers since Messrs. Boyleau & Boyd's contract commenced on 1st April last.

I submit Report Form L, above referred to, & the Guardians will observe that Dr Glynn entered the date on the Return as 1st May, 1910, so much for the truth of his statement that it was forwarded to me before the 21st of April.

Dr Glynn also states that he is aware that I was not directed by the Guardians to send any communication to the Local Government Board. I sent no communication on this subject to that Board other than the Minutes Copy.

The Minute Books bear record of the repetition of many similar reckless statements made by this Officer, & of complaints by the Guardians of the manner in which he discharges his duties.

During his term of office, not quite 13 years, three sworn inquiries into charges preferred against

him had been held by an Inspector of the L.G. Board. His conduct on an occasion when he, as Registrar of Births, Deaths, & Marriages, attended on me for the purpose of having his Registers examined, was so bad that the Registrar General when informed of it, warned him that if such should occur again, serious action would be taken by him (Registrar General.) I refrained from making a report to the Guardians at the time as Dr Glynn was on Registration business, but perhaps I should have done so as a Medical Officer is supposed to be on duty at all times except when on leave of absence. The statement sent to the Registrar General was corroborated by a person who was in attendance.
