We while approving of the removal of the disqualification, protest in the strongest manner against the new proposal of the Chancellor of the Exchequer to make the local funds liable for the greater part of Pensions to persons who will be entitled thereto on the removal of the said disqualification"

#### Schoolmaster's Explanation.

"In reference to the two charges preferred against me by the Master, the first of which is that he allowed me to town on the 1<sup>st</sup> inst. at 10.10 & that I did not return until 3-20. I beg to state that having given the boys a few days' vacation with the permission of the Manager I spent more time than I should in town shopping & paying bills. Mr. Donnellan's assistants might remember that I called 3 times to his shop in connection with the supply of books for the school, some of which had not been forwarded & which would have been badly needed in case I had resumed school work during the week.

As regards the second charge that of being absent from the Workhouse on Saturday night. I beg to state that I left town on that night in time to reach the house at 10 o'clock, & as I was passing St. Joseph's Chapel, the Very Rev. Chaplain, <sup>Fr.</sup> Shaly, called me back & held me some minutes in conversation. When the conversation was finished I proceeded on my way to the Workhouse where I arrived at about 3 or 4 minutes past 10. I found the gate locked. I knocked but to no use. I returned to the Rev. Chaplain & told him I had been locked out.

I earnestly appeal to the leniency of the Board to overlook these breaches of discipline on my

part, particularly, in this year of grace & clemency,  
Humbly apologising for the trouble to which I am  
putting your Board & promising, for the future,  
to strictly <sup>carry</sup> out the rules of the Institution.

I beg to apply for 7 days' leave of absence, the  
children have no school, & M. Faly, who sleeps  
in their dormitory, will be able to keep them under  
due discipline,

*I beg to inform you that I gave my services as*

*Locum Tenens for Dr. O'Brien for the four weeks from May 21<sup>st</sup> to June 18<sup>th</sup> in the Aran Islands, & although two Finance Meetings have come off since the commencement of my duties there, I have not been paid yet; notwithstanding the fact that I wrote & wired to Mullery, Clerk of Union, Galway. I cannot see any cause for this delay except personal spite on the part of Mullery. He evidently desires to put me to inconvenience. I have to live by my profession & it is an urgent matter with me.*

*Clerk's Observations.*

*Dr. Moore's temporary employment terminated on the 18<sup>th</sup> inst. The June Finance Meeting was held on the 8<sup>th</sup> of that month. The practice is to issue a Paying Order to a temporary Medical Officer at the Finance Meeting next following the termination of his temporary employment. His employment terminated on the 18<sup>th</sup> inst. & the Finance Meeting next following was held on the 13<sup>th</sup> inst. when a Paying Order was issued to him & forwarded by post on the 14<sup>th</sup> inst. to an address mentioned in a telegram I received from him on the 13<sup>th</sup> inst. This statement proves conclusively that there has been no undue delay in discharging his claim for remuneration for his services.*

*An explanation of the amount of the Paying Order appears in the Minutes of this date later on. I never met Dr. Moore & have no cause whatsoever to bear him any ill feeling, nor do I. I refrain from comment on the grossly impertinent tone adopted by Dr. Moore in his reference to me in the communication which he addressed to the Board,*

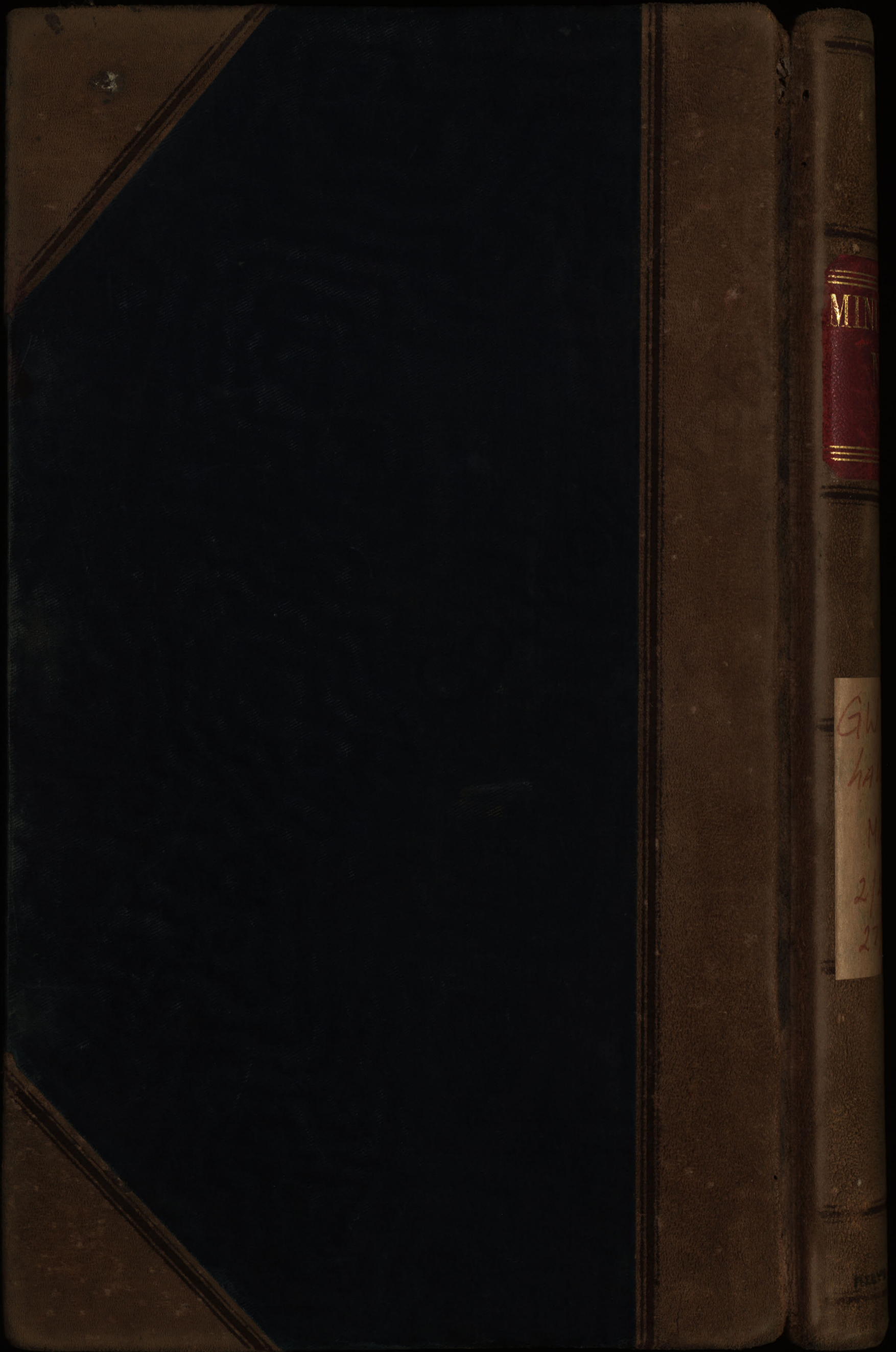
