This she did not do. I was unable to remain up for the Doctor's visit to Hospital. Dr. Colahan came at 1-30 on the following day & prescribed for me.  
Hoping this explanation will satisfy the Board.

Dr. Colahan came before the Board to explain that he could not see his way on the 6<sup>th</sup> inst. to transfer one of the trained nurses from the Fever Hospital to the Workhouse Hospital to act as substitute for Nurse Corless during her illness. Although there was only one patient then in the Fever Hospital he was a very bad case.

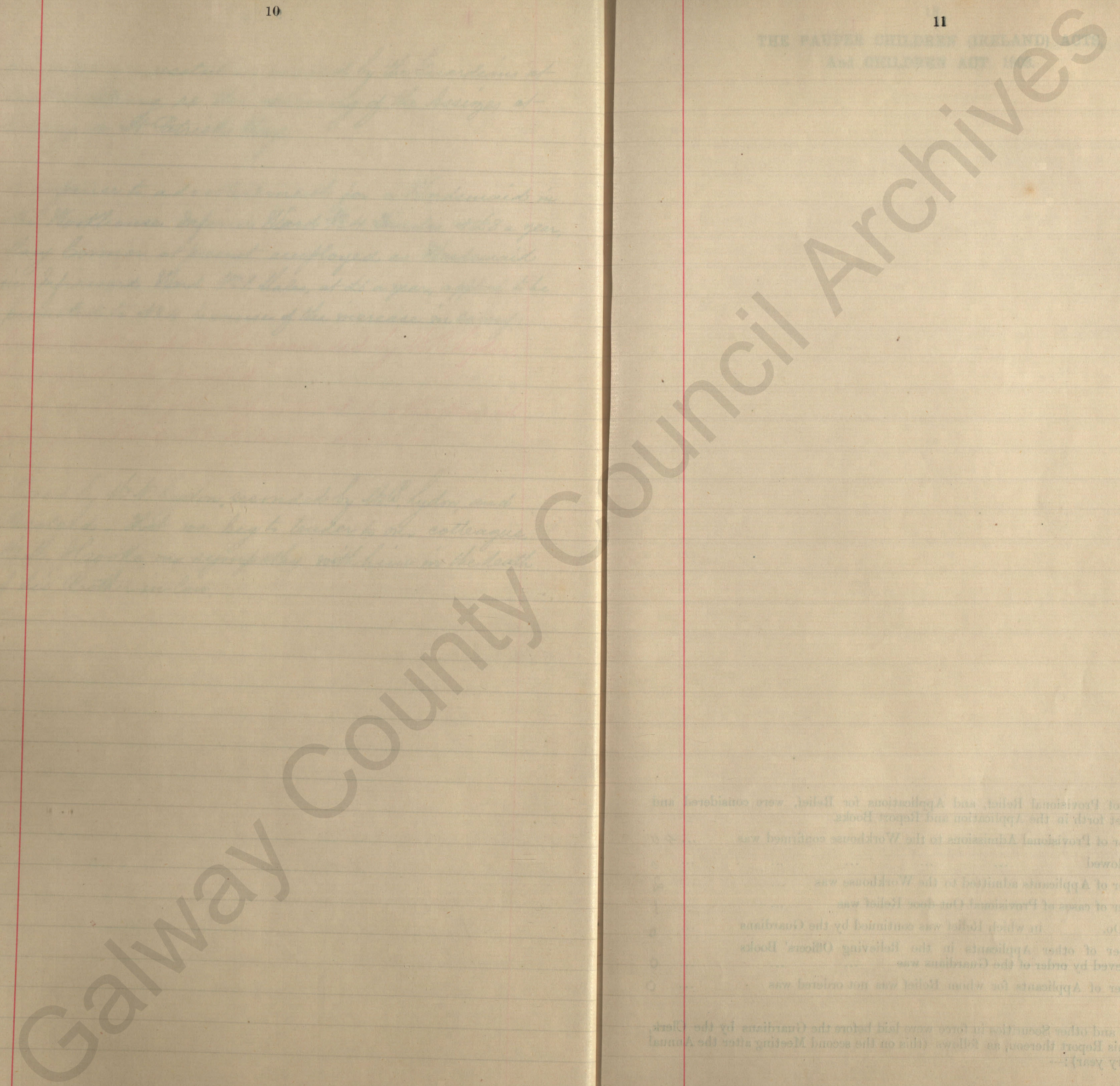

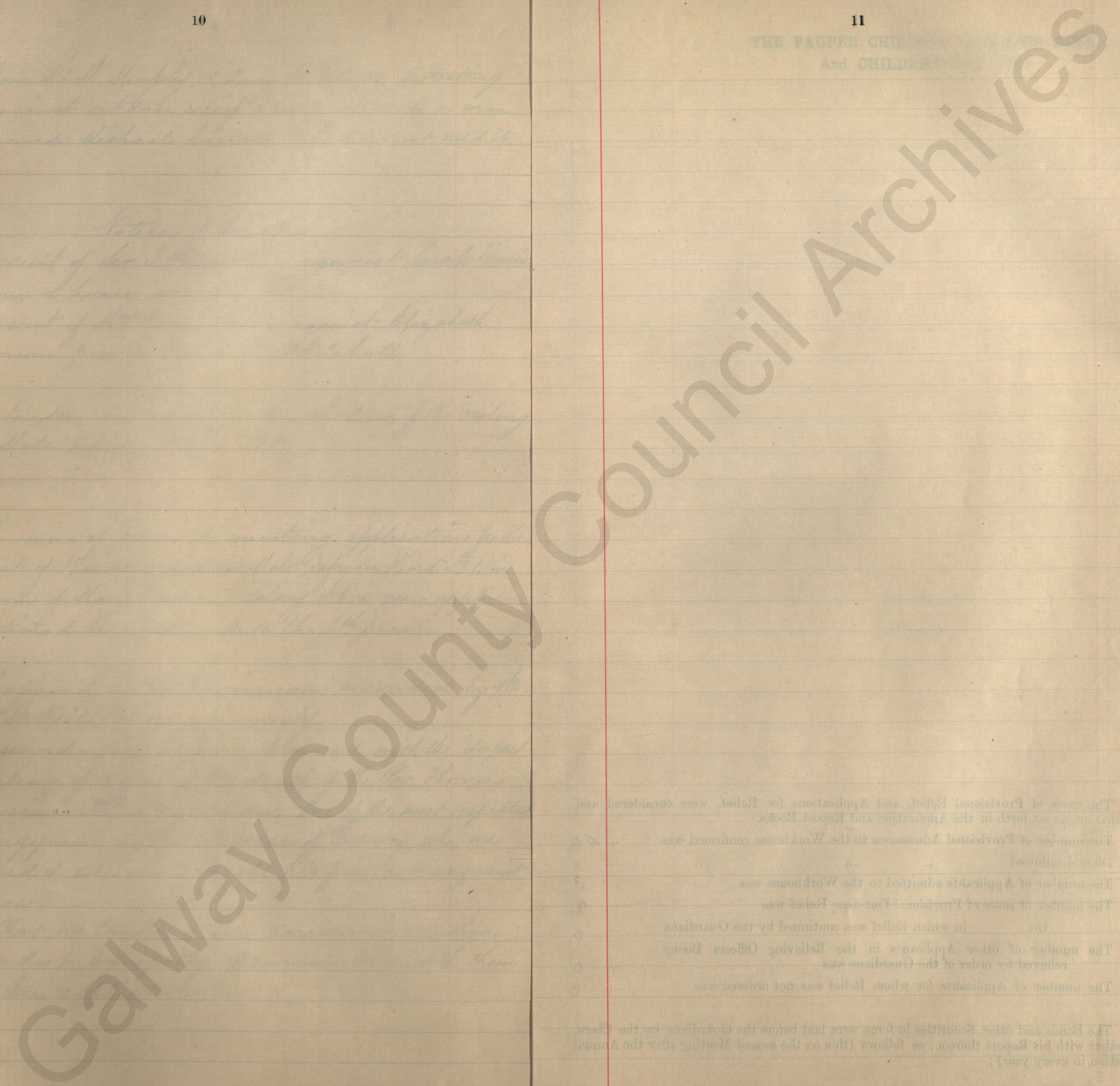

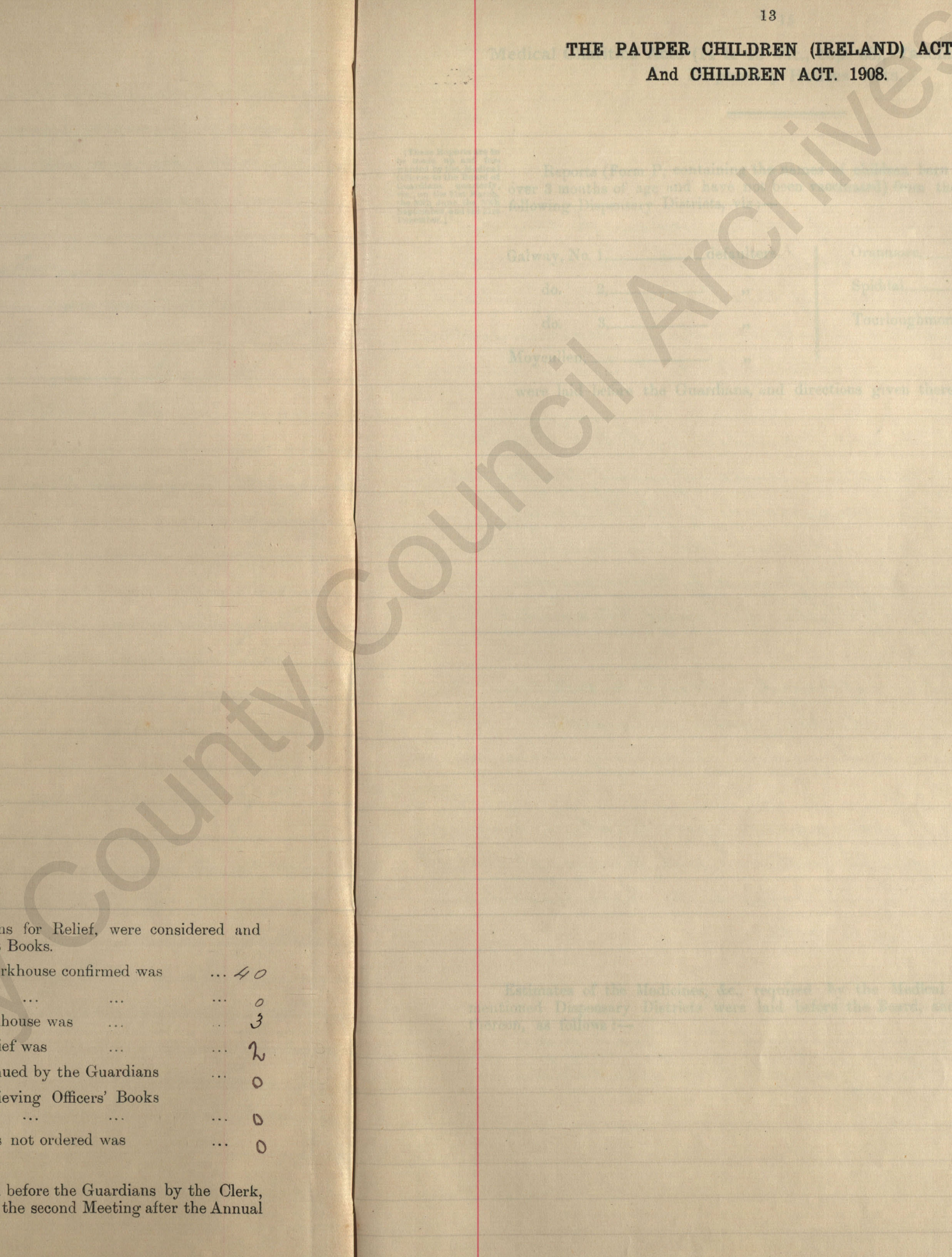
