The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and orders made thereon as follows:—

11th inst. Delia Downes took up duty as laundress & Mary Wynne as Wardsmaid, on appointment.

13th inst. Margaret Meyers an inmate, gave birth to an illegitimate child. She states that the putative father is William Duffey of Athlone, labourer.

15th inst. Mary Connamon, Wardsmaid in Hospital, gave birth to an illegitimate child. She states that the putative father is John Murray, Butter-milk haue, labourer. Her duties are being performed by an inmate.

Her dismissal was moved by Mr. Griffin, seconded by Mr. Dea & carried. The cost of maintenance of the woman & her infant to be deducted from the balance of salary coming due to her.

James Flaherty's wife & 3 children are still in the Workhouse. For failing to maintain them he was sentenced to 14 days imprisonment on 2nd of Aug. last, & a month's imprisonment on 21st March last.

Order. To be cautioned that unless he removes his family from the Workhouse, he shall be again prosecuted.

13th inst. By order of Dr. McDonogh I stopped Pat. Lydon, contractor, from supplying milk to the Workhouse, his premises being in an insanitary condition.

13th inst. Coroners inquest was held on the remains of Maria Flaherty who died ^{in Hospital} on the 11th inst. Verdict, Death due to heart failure accelerated by fracture of thigh accidentally received before entering

the Workhouse.

13th inst. An old man named Martin Cosgrave was admitted to Hospital & he handed me £4-5-5. He died last night.

I submit the Analyst's report on samples of milk sent from the Workhouse. Contractor Patrick Bodry's milk was deficient in fats. This is the third report against him in 12 months.

Order. To be cautioned that another report against his milk will lead to his contract being cancelled.

Patrick Maguire, a tramp, refused to break stones yesterday, I got him remanded to Petty Sessions on Monday next.

14th inst. Julia Burke from Carrumore with an illegitimate child was admitted, ~~on the 11th inst.~~ She states that the putative father is Constable John Carson of Moor Park.

17th May '10. Acknowledgment on behalf of His Majesty King George the Fifth, of the copy of the resolution of sympathy & condolence on the lamented death of His Most Gracious Majesty King Edward the Seventh, passed by the Guardians at meeting on the 11th inst., & tendering to the Guardians ^{thanks} for their message of sympathy & condolence.

17th May '10. From Mr. Murphy, Solicitor to the Guardians, in compliance with the request of the Guardians to explain the proceedings taken in the case of "Guardians v. Martin Costello", stating that the original proceedings commenced by the issue of a summons at Petty Sessions by the Clerk of Petty Sessions on the instructions of the Master of the Workhouse; he (Solicitor) had nothing to do with the issuing of this summons. On this he obtained an order at Petty Sessions & it was impossible for the authorities to levy the amount. He was then instructed to obtain an order by instalments; the Magistrate having no power to make such an order, he applied to the Recorder at Quarter Sessions & was granted an instalment order; the defendant failing to pay the instalments it was necessary to again apply to the Recorder for a committal order to enforce the previous order made by him. On the hearing of this application he said he entertained certain doubts as to his (Recorder's) powers of granting the order he had made the previous sessions in this matter &

refused to make the committal order & dismissed the case without prejudice to enable the Guardians to bring it up again. That in his (Solicitor's) opinion the Recorder has full power to make the order applied for, & would advise that the Guardians should again apply for a committal order & failing the Recorder granting same, to appeal at next Assizes & he believes the order which the Guardians want will be made.

The Guardians decided upon taking no further action in this case.

The Master of the Workhouse was warned to be more careful in future & not to institute such proceedings without consulting the Guardians' Solicitor.

Orders (1) Michael Quirk & family to be supplied with bedding to the value of £1, to enable them to leave the Workhouse as he has obtained employment outside.

(2) The issue of advertisement for a Wardmaid in the Female Hospital Wards in room of Mary Connamon who has been dismissed. Applications to be considered on the 1st prox.

In response to advertisements for a Wardmaid in the Male Infirmary Ward applications were received from Bridget Sweeney & Mary Conneely.

On the motion of Mr. Griffin, seconded by Mr. Shee, Bridget Sweeney was appointed.

In pursuance of notice given, Mr. J. Lee moved that the salaries of Wardsmaids Julia Doherty & Selia Halloran be increased from £6 & £5 respectively, to £8 each, as recommended by the Visiting Committee.

The motion was seconded by Mr. B. Lydon, & carried unanimously.

Mr. J. Griffin also moved on notice, that the application of Wardsman Martin Keady for an increase of salary be considered; that his salary be increased from £5 to £8 a year, that the allowance of £2 a year for clothes be discontinued.

The motion was seconded by Mr. M. J. Cooke, & carried unanimously.

The L. S. Board are referred to the Minutes of the 16th March last, containing an entry of the transfer of Wardsmaid Mary Connor from No. 1 Ward at £6 a year, to No. 4 Ward at £8 a year.

The Board have not up to the present sanctioned the increase of salary.

On the recommendation of Dr. Colahan, Workhouse Medical Officer, the Guardians made an order that Shu Burke be sent to the R. V. Eye & Ear Hospital, Dublin for special treatment.

11th May '10. From Dr. W. McDonogh, Medical Officer of Salway No. 2 Dispensary District, stating that the Porter of the Dispensary can have access to the Dispensary for cleaning purposes at any time on application to the Workhouse Master; that he was supplied with a watering can recently to sprinkle before dusting, but this has not been done; that it is dangerous to have dust flying about where tubercular patients are treated; the works & the yard are not kept in order; some time ago when the Porter was spoken to about mopping the floors he said it was time enough till summer or words to that effect; latterly he pays no attention to what he is told; it would not be safe to give him a key to the front door as the same key opens the door of the Surgery.

On the motion of Mr. R. Lydon, seconded by Mr. M. Hooke, an order was made that a new lock be placed on the entrance door to the Dispensary, different to the one on the door of the Surgery, & that keys for the former be supplied to the Medical Officers & the Dispensary Porter, to avoid this bickering.

14th May '10. From Dr. Conolly, Medical Officer of Moycullen Dispensary District, requesting to be allowed the sum of 5/- expended on official correspondence with the Clerk of Union during the past 18 months.
Payment ordered.

15th May '10. From Mrs. A. Moylan, Midwife of the Salway No. 2 Dispensary District, on sick leave of absence, enclosing a medical certificate that she is still suffering from dyspepsia & will require another week's rest before taking up duty.

18th inst. On a requisition Jim De Colahan employed Julia O'Kea to assist in washing in the Fever Hospital, at 7-1/2 p.m. with rations.
 22nd inst. Michael Kenny, Van driver was discharged from Hospital.

22nd inst. John S. Doyle, Schoolmaster, left the Workhouse at 7 p.m. & did not return until 7.55 am on 23rd inst. I understand he came in over the front gate after lock up & went out again. He sprained his foot & is a patient in Hospital. I appointed his brother Francis Doyle to look after the boys until Board meeting today, allowing him rations.

Approved of Francis Doyle looking after the boys during the Schoolmaster's illness. No salary to be paid for such temporary services.

23rd inst. Patrick Maguire, a tramp, who refused to break stones, was sentenced to imprisonment for a month with hard labour.

25th inst. A side of mutton & a quarter of beef were rejected, the mutton for being of inferior quality, & the beef for not being of the required weight. He supplied a good side of mutton instead but the beef has not been supplied up to 12 o'clock noon.

Order. If not supplied timely, beef to be got elsewhere.

On the recommendation of the Medical Officers, an order was made for the supply of new clothing for three children on discharge from the Fever Hospital. The sewer pipes at the north side of the Workhouse being stopped were opened. They were sagged in some places & I called on the Plumbing contractor to help in clearing them. 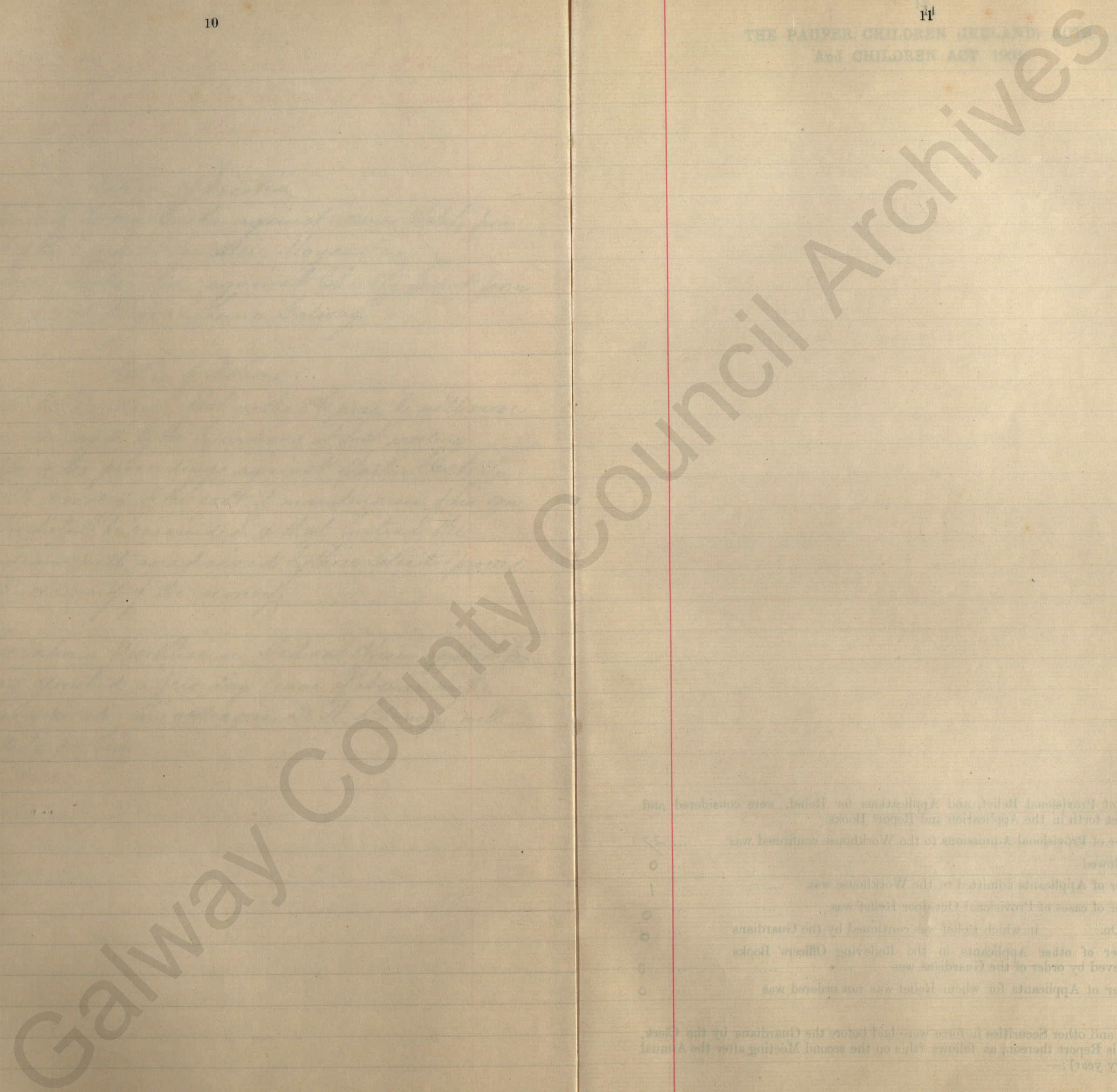
