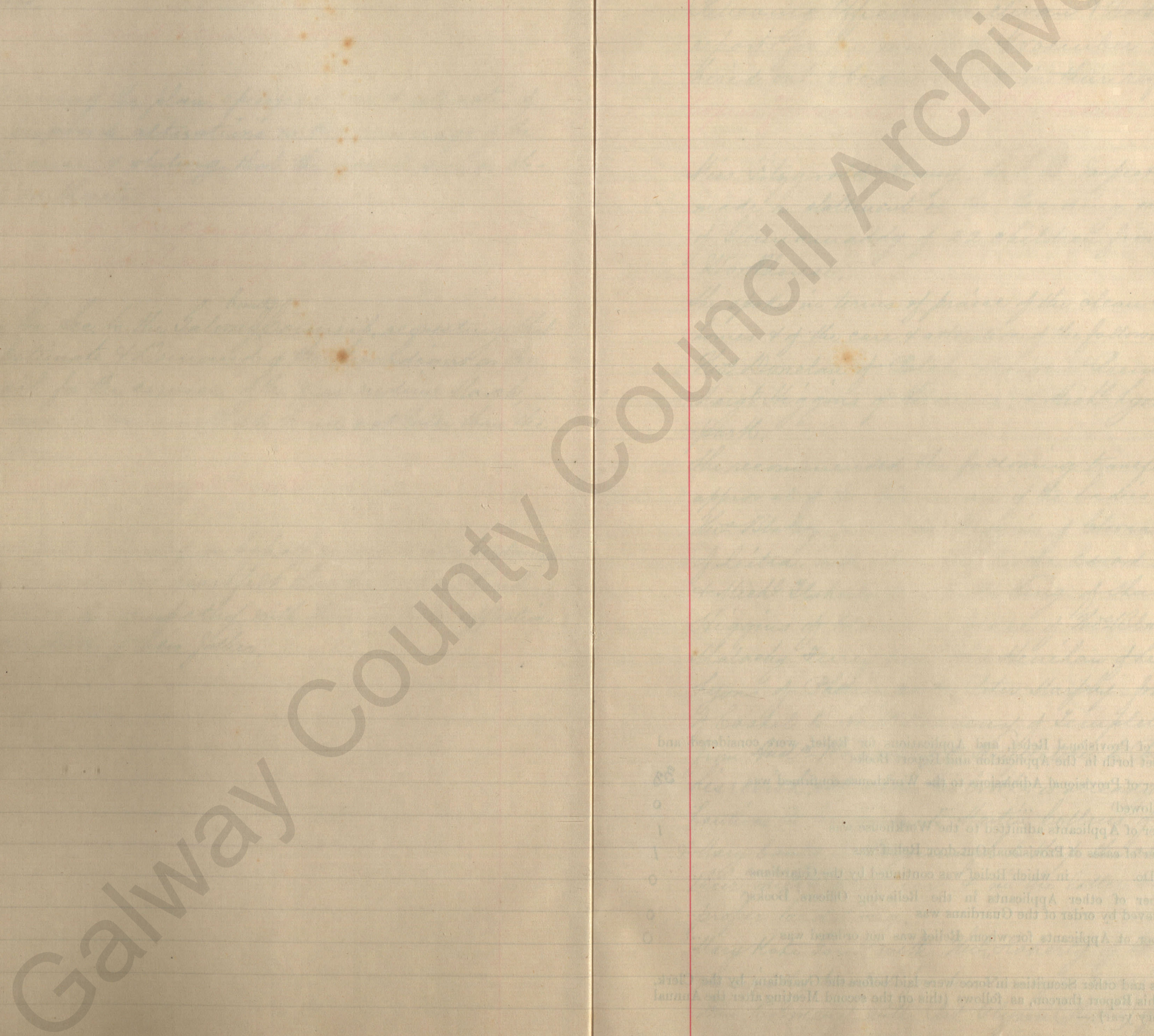

She spoke in terms of praise of the clean & comfortable homes & of the care & attention of the following foster parents: Mrs. Donelan of Patch; Margaret Brennan of Bachel; Margt. Higgins of Kilmore; & Michl. Lyons of Phelinuspark.

She recommended the following transfers, subject to the approval of the Chairman of the Ladies Committee; Mrs. Blakely from Mrs. Higgins of Cloona to Mrs. Keefe of Leitra, with whom his brother, Edward is already placed, & Michl. Flaherty from Duke King of Shaughmure to Mrs. Higgins of Cloona in place of Mrs. Blakely removed; Malachy Furey from Mrs. Kenihan of Leitra, to Michl. Lyons of Phelinuspark; Peter Murphy from James White of Bachel to And^{rs} Keaveny of Templetoher; John Rush from And^{rs} Keaveny of Templetoher to Pat. Hussey of Disrevish, with whom his brother is already placed, cautious to be given to Martin Collins of Shaughmure, & Mary Casby of Boyounagh to keep the children under their care cleaner, & in the latter case, to procure proper bedding.

Mary Kate Lore, with Mrs. Flaherty of Cortgarrow, to be medically treated for tender eyes & sore throat
John Cormeely with Pat. Glynn (Michl.) of Leitra is an

inevitable boy, & an effort should be made to have him committed to the Baltimore Industrial School.

Martin Haire, with Mrs. Dowd of Rushtown, is a fine strong boy & fit for hiring out.

Francis Wympe, hired out with Martin Murphy of Stonetown; employer not approved of; employment in Sligo can be got for him; removal to be insisted upon. The Inspector recommended allowance for clothing on the following scale; up to 5 years, £1; up to 10 years, £1.10.0; over 10 years, £2.

Consideration of scale of clothing allowance deferred.

Moved by Mr. French, seconded by Mr. Travers, & unanimously Resolved - That all the other recommendations of the Inspector be adopted, & we tender to her our very grateful thanks for her kindness in coming before us & making such an interesting statement.

Also that a cordial vote of thanks be conveyed to Father Conway, Chairman of the Ladies Committee, & the other members, for the very kindly interest in the welfare of the poor children taken by them. Praise also to be conveyed to the foster parents so favourably reported on by the Inspector.
