The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and orders made thereon as follows:—

- 18th instant. Edward Fulton, a patient in Hospital, was transferred to the Galway Hospital for special treatment.
- 21st instant. Miss B. Gore, Charge Nurse in the Fever Hospital, left on 4 weeks' vacation. Her duties are being attended to by the Assistant Nurse and Two Probationers.
- 22nd instant. Patrick Toole, Steam Boiler Attendant, left on 4 weeks' vacation. John Little, who acted in a similar capacity on previous occasions, has been employed as Substitute, at a remuneration at the rate of £1 per week. *Approved.*
- 23rd instant. The Food and Drugs Inspector took samples of the milk delivered at the Workhouse for analysis. The Police brought two boys named Madden from Kelly Lane, and a girl named Coocoran from Henry St., to the Workhouse. All three are charged with larceny and will be brought before the Petty Sessions Court on Monday next. Contractor Malley's milk was under the Standard once during the week, registering only 4 degrees of cream. He forfeits the quantity, 3 gallons. This is the 3rd report against him within 12 months.
- Order* The Food and Drugs Inspector to be asked to take samples of milk for analysis at least once a fortnight. The Minutes to bring this report, re Contractor Malley, before the Guardians, when new tenders for the supply of milk are being considered in a few weeks time. I resumed duty after 4 weeks' vacation, this morning, and the services of Mr. O'Donohoe who was acting

as Substitute, were discontinued.

18th August. Stating that they have had before them the resolution of the Guardians at Meeting on the 10th instant, relative to the Board's letter of the 2nd instant on the subject of the recent infractions of discipline on the part of the Schoolmaster of the Workhouse. With reference thereto, the Board desire to state that while they have considerable doubt as to the propriety of allowing Mr. Quyle to retain his position, still in deference to the Guardians' wishes, they will permit him to do so on the distinct understanding he will be called on to resign should he again act in a similar manner. The Acting Clerk reported that he gave the Schoolmaster an opportunity of reading this communication.

The work is more extensive and the inspections have taken a longer time than he calculated for, and the new Jews Hospital requires a great deal of personal attention. The question of the Drainage requires very careful consideration and should not be hurried, but the Plans and Report shall be completed and furnished at the earliest date possible.

With reference to the subject of Insurance of the Two Boilers installed at the New

Jews Hospital, in his opinion there is no real necessity for the Guardians to insure them further than will be covered by the ordinary Policy on the Building, Furniture & Fitting, as they are not Steam Boilers, and it would not be worth while to pay the premium demanded for them.
Further consideration adjourned until the Building is taken over from Contractors.

On the motion of Mr. N. Lydon, seconded by Mr. J. Cunniffe, Mr. James W. Butler was appointed to take & value the stock of provisions, clothing, &c. in the Workhouse on the 30th prox, remuneration for such services to be £5-5-0.

Resolved - that advertisements be issued inviting tenders for annual supplies to the Workhouse, except in the item of new milk, for which contracts will be entered into for three years, as on former occasions. A Special Meeting of the Board to be summoned for Friday the 16th prox. at 11 o'clock a.m. to consider tenders & examine samples. The Clerk submitted a Bond of the Sun Insurance Co. securing him on the sum of £200.

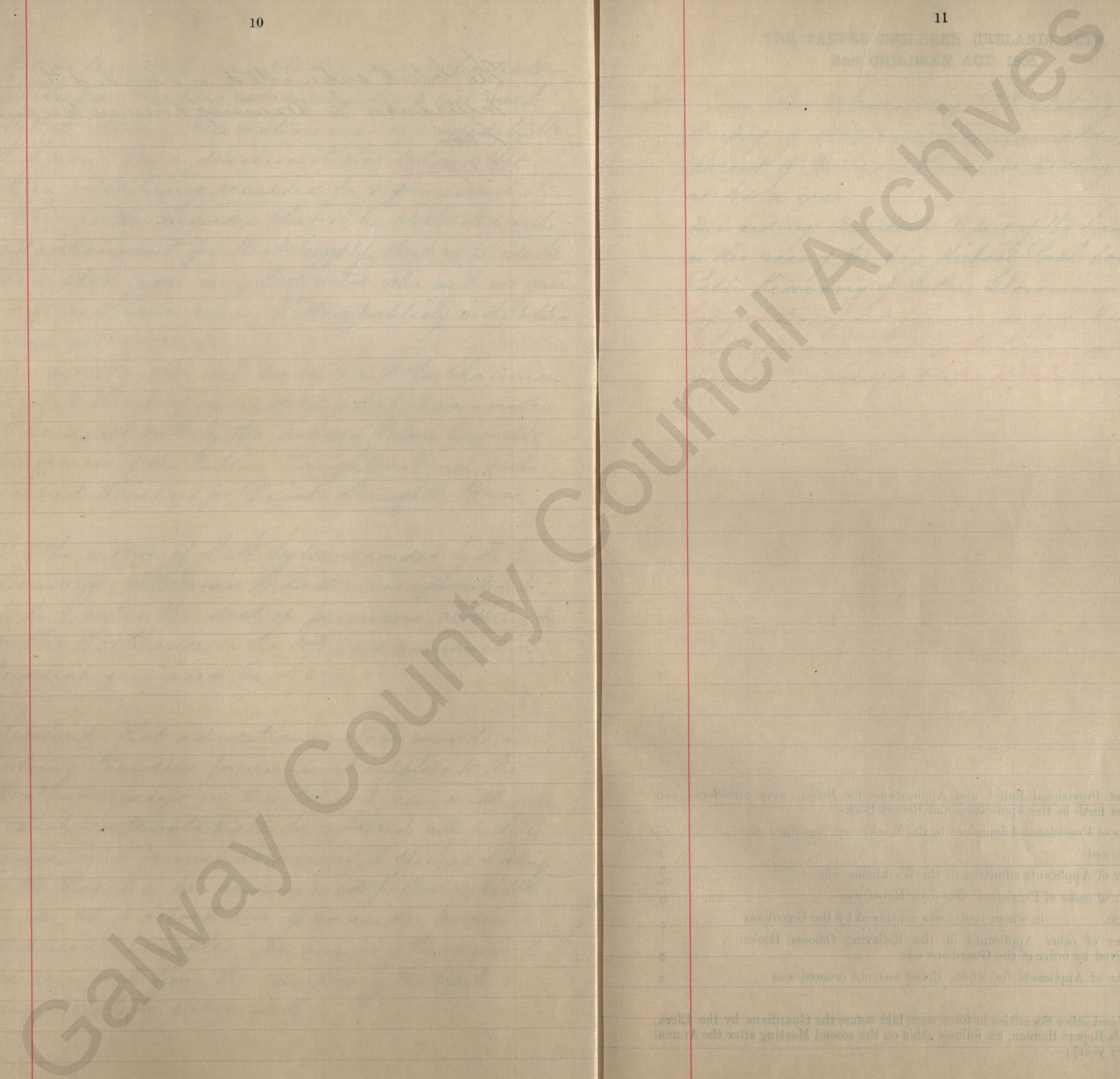
