6th " The Food Inspector took samples of milk for analysis. As directed by the Board on the 31st ult. I instructed the Solicitor to issue summonses against Honor Owens for insubordination & against Mary Anne O'Connor for vagrancy.

On several occasions I called on the contractor to execute some necessary repairs in connection with the Steam Boiler but he has not attended.

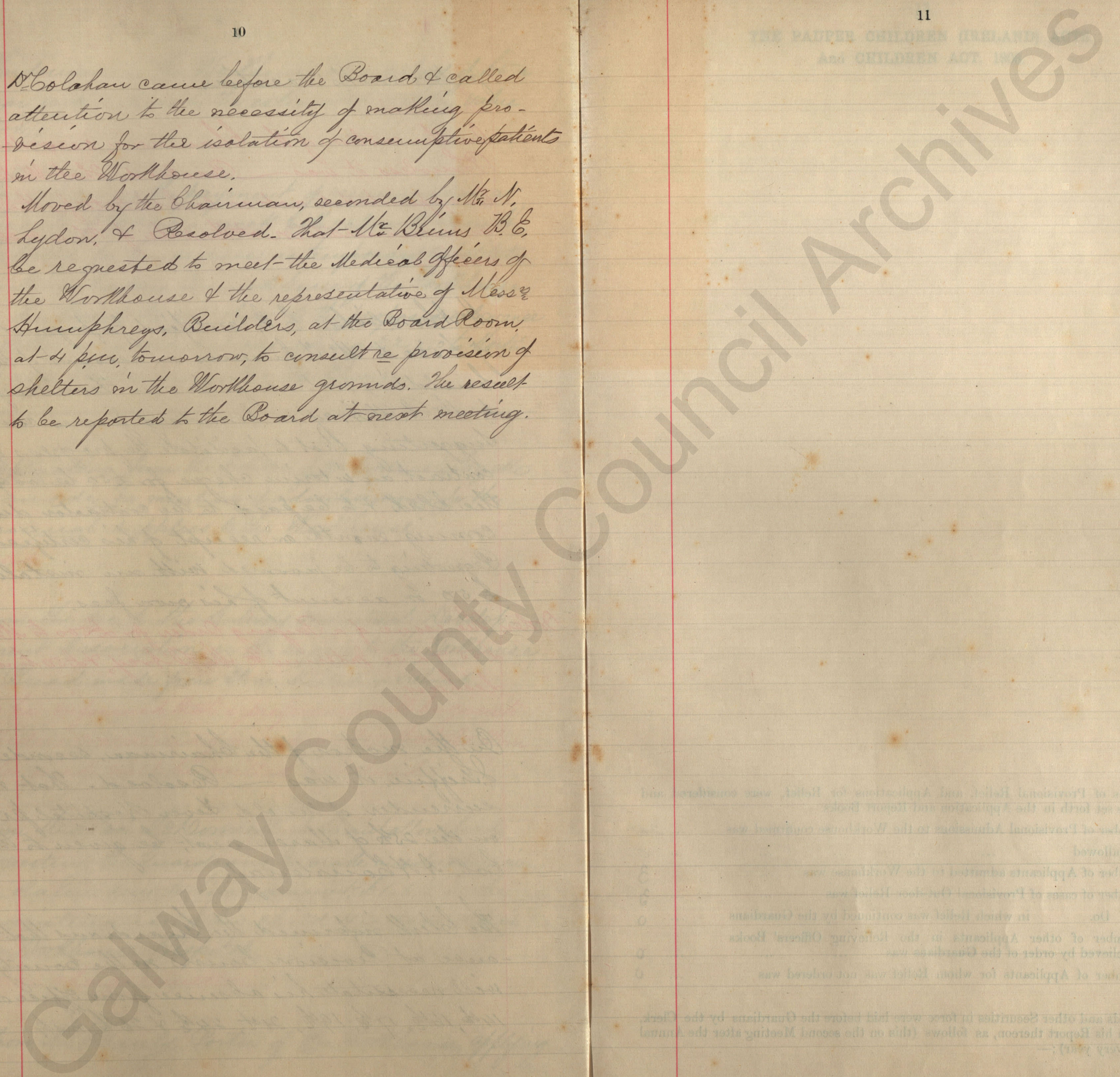
