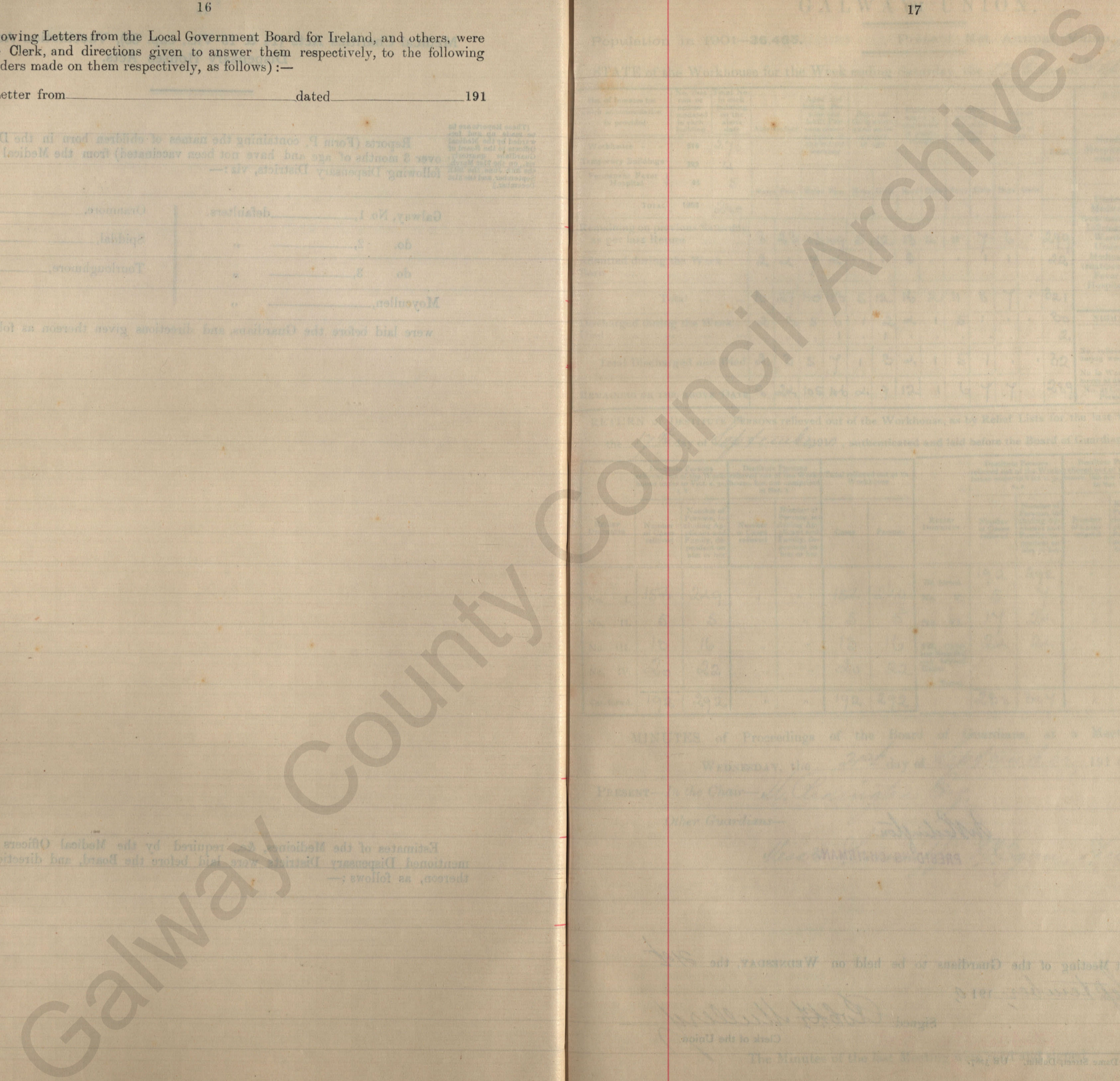

There were but two courses open to him, either to trust to the chance of not being called on a midwifery case during the month, or to order one. He adopted the latter course, as he could not conscientiously do otherwise. It would be a poor compensation for him to say to any family who might have lost their mother that he had no forceps. At the time he did not know Dr. Glynn's address so could not get any information regarding the forceps.

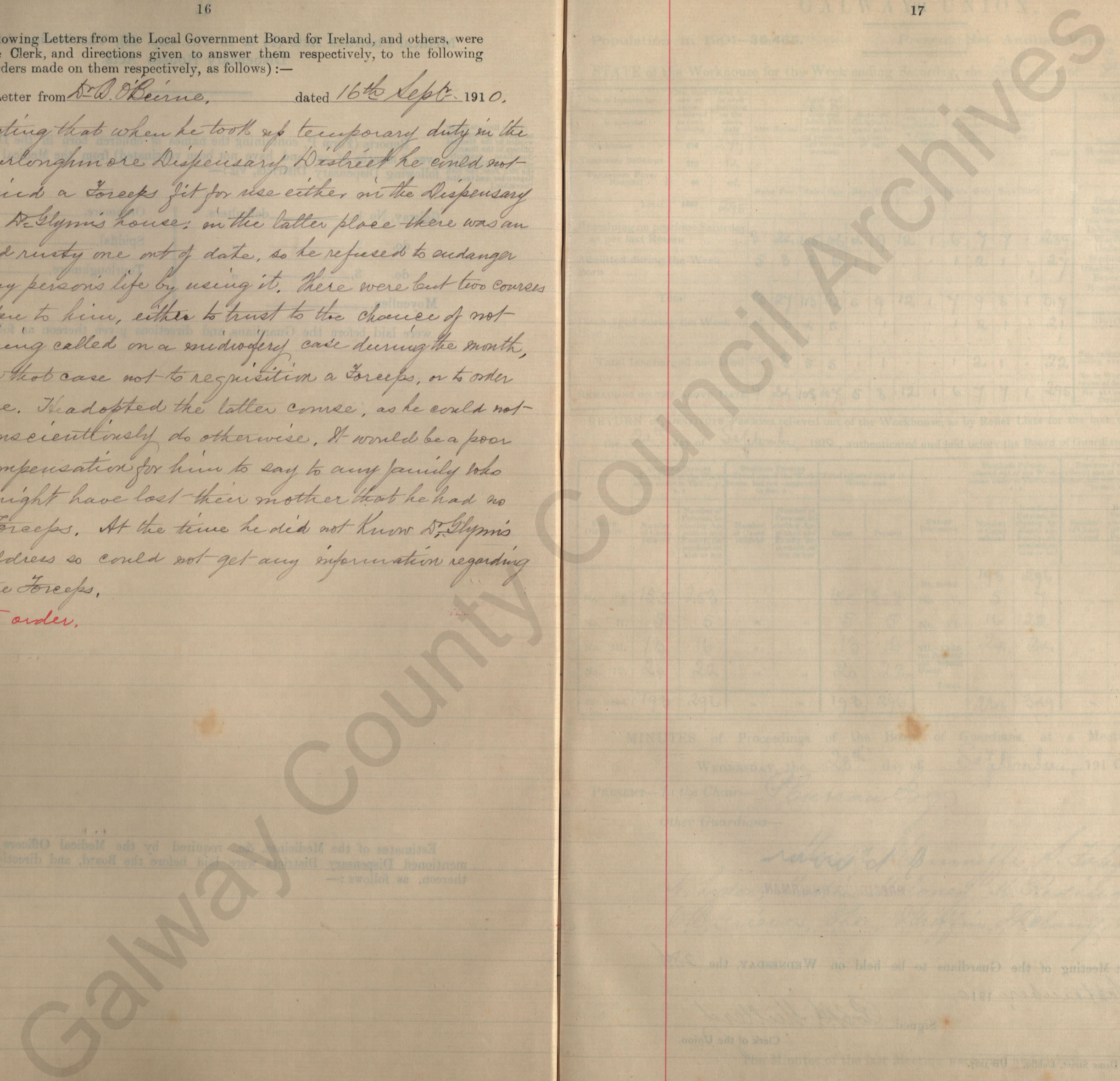
