Auditor's Observations.

The stocktaking is unsatisfactory. From the action of the Guardians shown in the Minutes dated 8<sup>th</sup> June, 1910, when the Master's return is carried forward to the next account in lieu of the stocktaker's, it would appear that the stocktaker employed by the Guardians is incapable of performing his work. I would recommend the Guardians to withhold payment to the stocktaker for the September half-year, & appoint another stocktaker, otherwise they may render themselves liable to surcharge.

In reply to the Chairman's inquiry the Master of the Workhouse stated that the stocktaker had furnished a return of the stock in the Workhouse on the 30<sup>th</sup> Sept. & that so far as he could judge it was correct. The Clerk informed the Guardians that he has not yet completed his checking of the return of the stock.

Resolved - That we request the sanction of the L. S. Board to the payment of the fee of £5-5-0 to the Stocktaker for his services in taking the stock in the Workhouse on the 30<sup>th</sup> Sept.

Noting that the Board have had before them the Minutes of the 19<sup>th</sup> Oct. when the Guardians had under consideration the report of Mr. Cowlishaw, C. E., relative to the defective sewerage of the Workhouse with a plan, a brief specification & an approximate estimate of proposed improvements therein; the Board will be glad to receive the full plans, specification, & estimate of the proposed works, when prepared.

The Guardians beg to observe that at present they do not propose to overhaul the entire sewerage of

the Workhouse, but only so far as the sewerage of the new Fever Hospital approaches it.

Order. The issue of advertisement, inviting tenders for the supply & laying on a bed of concrete sewer pipes from the point where the sewer pipes from the new Fever Hospital meet the main sewer of the Workhouse & continue the sewer pipes to the town main sewer on Newcastle Road. Also for taking up the Workhouse main sewer pipes from the point before mentioned, & relaying them on a concrete bed, in a similar manner & alongside of the sewer pipes from the new Fever Hospital.

Also the issue of advertisements in the local newspapers only for the supply & fitting up of the necessary appliances in the laundry of the new Fever Hospital.

From Col. A. H. Courtenay, stating that owing to the fact of the notice of the surrender of the old Fever Hospital premises to him having been sent to an old address, he now only received it; that he declines to accept surrender on the 25<sup>th</sup> March next; that he

must obtain the consent of the Trustees of his Settlements to the surrender; that he shall not consent to the surrender before the 29<sup>th</sup> Sept. 1911, & then only on the conditions that the place is handed over in a thorough state of repair, cleaned & disinfected.

That he understood at the time he consented to break the lease that the Galway Granite & Marble Works, in which he is interested, would have had some recognition in the ordering of stones for the new Fever Hospital, but he believes that the Co. were entirely ignored in the matter.

Consideration of the question of surrender of the old Fever Hospital premises deferred.

Order. The Clerk to explain to Col. Courtenay that the contractor for the building of the new Fever Hospital had a granite quarry on the site from which he procured a supply of stone.

In pursuance of notice given for this date, Mr. N. Lydon moved - that the resolution adopted by the Guardians at meeting on the 12<sup>th</sup> inst. cancelling the contract entered into with Mathias Malley for the supply of milk to the Workhouse, be rescinded.

The motion having been seconded by Mr. Mark Moloney was carried unanimously, as on looking over the records, the Guardians find that Mr. Malley has been a contractor for nearly 40 years, & on the whole, gave satisfaction during that time.

Stating that the fosterparents of the boy Joseph Sullivan are willing to maintain & clothe him, but not to pay wages as the boy is almost useless although 15<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> years; that as they are very good people he recommends this arrangement for approval of the Guardians.

Miss Fitzgerald-Kemney got a better home for Francis Wynne than Martin Murphy's, but the boy refuses to leave, although at one time very anxious to do so; he suspects he was unduly if not unfairly induced to remain.

Order. To be informed that the Guardians are willing to allow the boy Joseph Sullivan to remain with his late foster parents on the terms specified for a time until his health improves. In regard to the boy Francis Wynne, the Guardians will be guided by Mr Conway as to the course to be adopted. Mr Conway's attention to be directed to the unsatisfactory reports of attendance at school of the children Michael Rush & Mary Joyce, with a request that warning be given to the foster parents that the children will be removed from them unless there is an improvement in future.
