The Master of the Workhouse applied for remuneration for the extra duties imposed upon him by the purchase & sale of pigs.

Also to be allowed the sum of £2-2-0 the fee paid by him to Mess<sup>rs</sup> Blake & Keeney, Solicitors, who appeared in his behalf at the sworn inquiry into charges preferred against the Workhouse Schoolmaster.

Moved by Mr. N. Lydon, seconded by Mr. W. J. Silke, and Resolved - That the Workhouse Master be allowed as remuneration for his services the sum of £1 for each set of pigs sold out of the Workhouse. Mr. W. Redington dissented on the grounds that notice of motion should be given.

Mr. N. Lydon gave notice that at meeting on the 28<sup>th</sup> inst. he would move that the Workhouse Master be allowed the sum of £2-2-0 the fee paid to the Solicitors.

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows):—

27<sup>th</sup> 29<sup>th</sup> 31<sup>st</sup> May 11. } Sanctioning the proposed payment of remuneration at the rate of  $1\frac{5}{4}$  a week to Mr. Owen J. Keene for his services while acting as temporary Relieving Officer in the Spiddal District, the date upon which he ceases to act is to be recorded on the Minutes.

29<sup>th</sup> 5<sup>th</sup> 11. } Forwarding a copy of a letter which the Board have received from Dr. W. A. Sandys, Port-Medical Officer, Galway, relative to the case of an inmate of Galway Intercepting Hospital, & requesting that the Board may be furnished with any observations which the Guardians may desire to offer on the subject of the letter.

At the same time requesting that the Relieving



Officer may be called on to give an explanation in regard to Dr. Sandys' statement that "the Relieving Officer was notified of the man's destitute position but he absolutely refused to look after him or give him any ticket for shelter in the Workhouse."

Copy of Dr. Sandys' complaint,

"The Intercepting Hospital here was opened about 3 1/2 months ago for the admission of four cases of Beri Beri, which the Union & Fever Hospitals here refused to admit. Three of these cases improved quickly & were discharged some time ago, but one (a negro) still remains; his progress has been very slow owing to his getting a severe attack of peripheral neuritis, which has left him in a very debilitated condition & I doubt if he will be able to earn his living for some months. The difficulty has arisen as to what is <sup>the</sup> best means of supporting & caring him until he is able to travel & work. At a meeting of the Salway Port Sanitary Authority on Saturday, we decided to discharge him & have him treated as a poor man unable to work. With this object in view, I discharged him about 3 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon & he came into Salway, but he found no one would give him lodgings. Several times that afternoon & evening Mr. P. Sullivan, the Relieving Officer, was notified of the man's destitute position but he absolutely refused to look after him or give him any ticket for shelter in the Workhouse. At 10 o'clock p.m., I was notified that the man would be left out all night & fearing he might die from exposure I ordered his removal again to the Isolation

"Hospital, the patient arriving there in the early hours of Wednesday morning. Mr. Curran, the Chairman of the Salway Board of Guardians, was asked by Mr. Leech (Secretary of Salway Port Sanitary Authority) for a ticket or to give some order to relieve the man but he absolutely refused. I respectfully submit that Mr. Curran & Mr. O'Sullivan have erred in their action. I ask you to advise if I will again discharge the patient & to point out to the Salway Board of Guardians their duties & responsibilities in such matters."

Relieving Officer O'Sullivan's Explanation. —

"I beg to state that Dr. Sandys' allegation that I absolutely refused to give a ticket for the admission of the Beri Beri patient is not true. The man never applied to me for a ticket, but another man applied to me for a ticket for his admission to the Workhouse Hospital. I told him to procure a medical certificate & I would do so. He also told me the man had money & therefore was not destitute."

The Guardians consider the Relieving Officer's explanation satisfactory.

The Relieving Officer has now taken charge of the Beri Beri patient, & under the direction of the Medical Officer of the Dispensary District, is having his wants attended to in the Isolation Hospital.
