The Master resumed duty today. 28th inst.

21st Decr. 11. From Dr. J. S. McDonagh, reporting that in compliance with the directions of the Guardians, he called to see the Beri Beri patient at the Isolation Hospital. The man is suffering from a partial paralysis of both legs owing to the Beri Beri. He is able to make his way about the Hospital with some difficulty with the assistance of a stick. In his opinion this paralysis will last for years, most-

probably, for the rest of his life, during which time he must be an expense to the Union. At present he (Dr. McDonagh) could not recommend his removal to the Workhouse Hospital owing to the risk of infection, but he would recommend that the Guardians, if it be in their power, to defray the expenses of his conveyance to his own country. The patient is anxious that this course be adopted. *The Clerk was deputed to ascertain whether there is a Consul for the man's country in Liverpool; if so to communicate with him with a view to the patient's return to his native place.*

forwarding an extract from a communication which the Board have received from Dr. Glynn, Medical Officer of the Furlongmore Disp. Dist. relative to a charge preferred against him in the case of a man named Michael Brown, & also as to his failure to attend at the Sunaghdown Dispensary Depot at the prescribed time on the 12th ult.

Extract.

Re yours No 29,086. I never committed an assault on a man named Browne at Furlongmore Dispensary. The motion made by Mr. Melia was unanimously passed by the whole Board, even the conduct of the Clerk was condemned.

Concerning No 28451. I arrived at the dispensary at 1.50 after attending a poor girl named Ann in a village called Clooninagh. She was in great agony & required immediate assistance.

Clerk's observations,
Gentlemen,

Refuting Dr. Glynn's reckless statements has become to me a monotonous duty. The official record of such cases is a long one. I leave it with you to reply to his statement that my conduct was condemned. My official conduct during a service of 30 1/2 years was never condemned either by the L.S. Board or the Board of Guardians.

Having been through the ordeal of three sworn inquiries into charges preferred against him should have made Dr. Glynn act cautiously for the remainder of his life time.

His conduct in the Board Room on an occasion not very long ago was so bad that it led me to form an opinion as to the condition he was in at the time. A third person was present & I learned from him that he shared my opinion. I prepared a statement of the occurrence & the grossly abusive language used towards me, & the witness certified the statement to be correct. This statement can be produced & verified on oath at any time required. At the time, in mercy to Dr. Glynn, I refrained from laying the statement before you, & through you before the L.S. Board. It is questionable whether, in the circumstances, he deserved such leniency from me.
