The old inmate Honor Ferraker who absconded from the Workhouse on the 28<sup>th</sup> ult. was brought back on the following day.

James Behan, Coal Contractor, died on the 4<sup>th</sup> inst. but coal is being supplied as usual.

Contractor Duggan's milk was under the standard once during the week registering only 6 degrees of cream. He forfeits the quantity 3 gals. This is the first report against him in 12 months.

I got P. McLaughlin to examine the damp in Dr McDonogh's room in the Dispensary. He says it is rising out of the foundation & that the only remedy is to stich & plaster it.

*Order.* Milk contractor Duggan to be cautioned. The Master to get an estimate of the cost of stiching & plastering Dr McDonogh's room.

The Workhouse Schoolmaster requisitioned Books to the value of  $\frac{5}{3}$ .

From Margaret Devaney of Bohermore, stating that she has been nursing a baby, 10 months old now, during the past 9 months, for a friend, on the understanding that she would be paid for doing so; that up to the present she has not been paid; that the whereabouts of the mother of the child is not known; that being in poor circumstances she begs of the Guardians to take the child into the Workhouse.

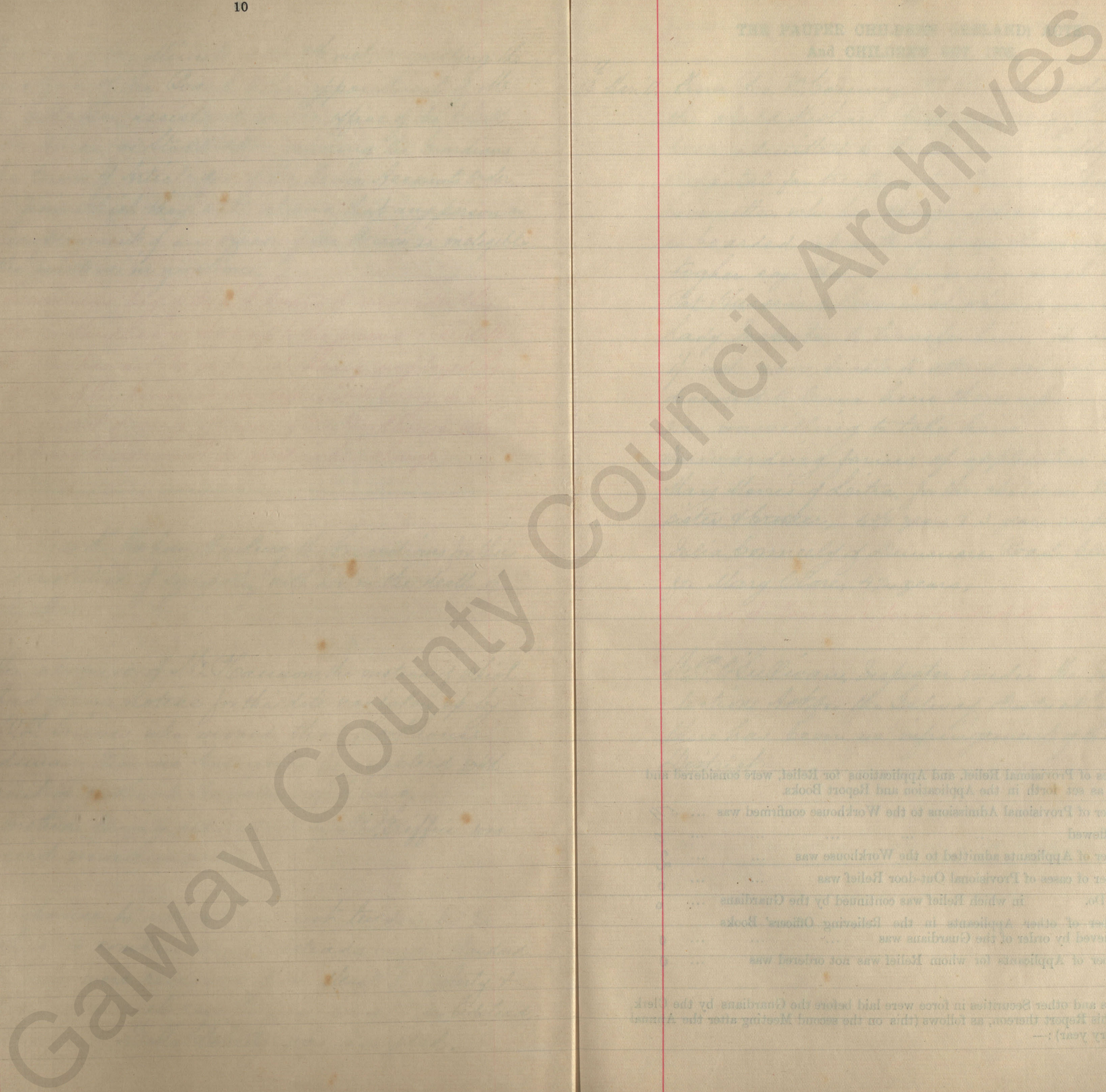
