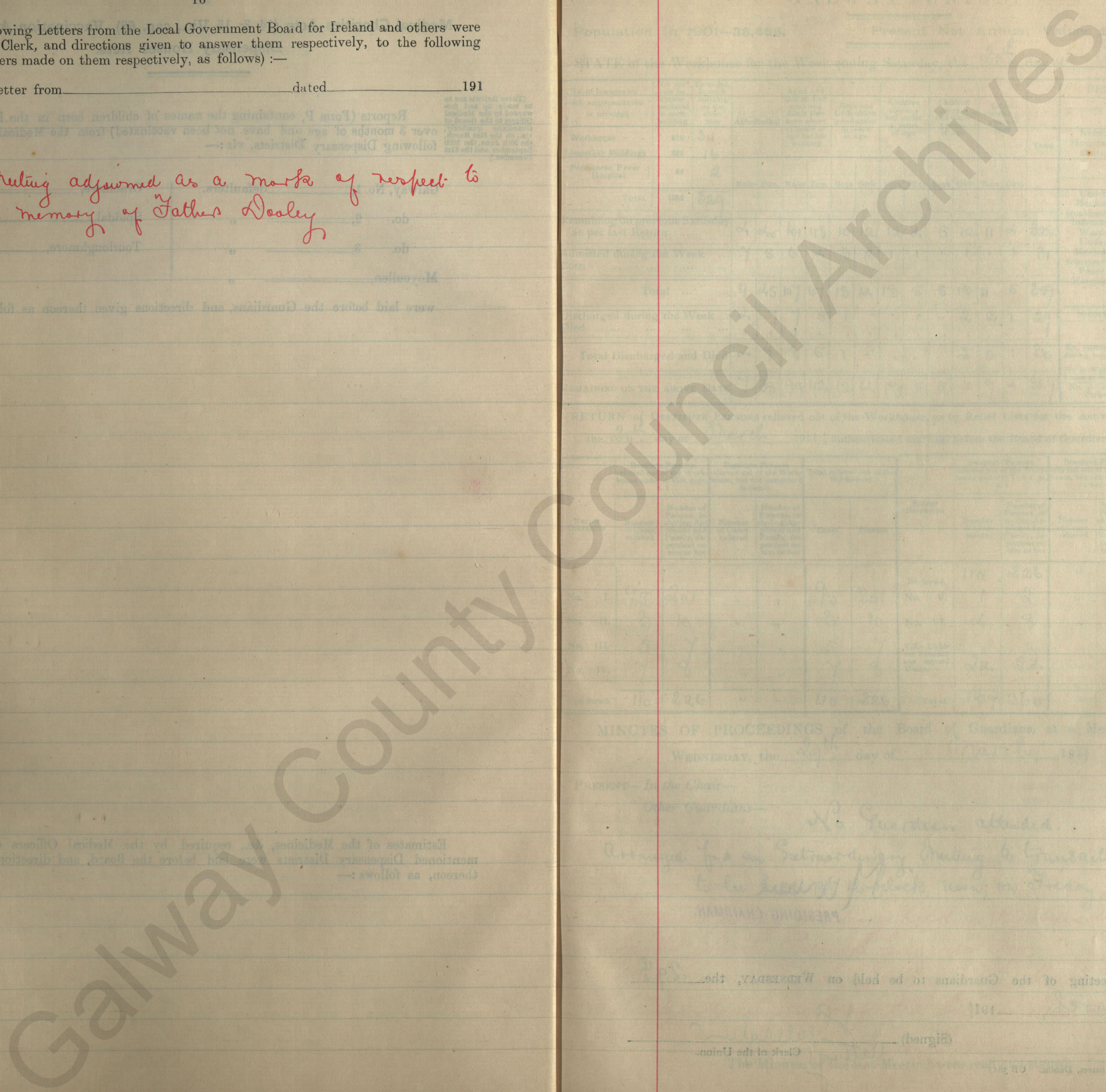

17th " Bridget Naughton, a patient in Hospital, was transferred to the Galway Hospital for special treatments.

" " Nurse Quinn, by permission of Dr. Colahan, absented herself from the Fever Hospital, from the evening of 16th to the evening of the 17th inst.

19th " William Belton's wife & 5 children were admitted to the Workhouse, and continue inmates. Belton is in town.

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or orders made on them respectively, as follows) :-

Read Letter from L.G.B. No. 14,312/11, dated 28th March, 1911,

referring to the Minutes of the 15th inst. & to the entry that the tender of Messrs Jammin & Co., Dublin, for the supply of medical & surgical appliances for the coming year at an abatement of 37% off the prescribed prices, was accepted, although the Guardians had before them a tender from Messrs Boileau & Boyd, Dublin, offering 38% discount. It would appear that the Guardians acted in this matter on the recommendation of Dr McDonogh, Medical Officer of the Workhouse, who stated that some of the surgical instruments & dressings supplied by Messrs Boileau & Boyd during the past year did not give satisfaction, & in reference thereto, the Board desire to point out that the Medical Officer did not make any official complaint during the year as to the quality of the instruments or dressings supplied by Messrs Boileau & Boyd, & in these circumstances the Board consider that the tender of that firm should not be ignored. Messrs Boileau & Boyd hold a large number of appliances contracts & carry them out with general satisfaction, & their tender should, the Board consider, be accepted in Salway Union.

A copy of this communication having been furnished to Dr McDonogh he replied as follows: -

31-3-'11.

Gentlemen,

In answer to copy of letter of Local Government Board of 28th inst. I beg to state that I have made several complaints of Medical and Surgical Appliances supplied to the Union Hospital by Messrs Boileau & Boyd during the past 12 months, to Mr. Mullery, Clerk of Union.

I made most of my complaints direct to the Contractor, by returning goods which were not up to the standard. Two items had to be returned twice, and it is only on yesterday I received them, being balance of order of Feb. the 8th, six weeks after order had been received.

Our whole order was never sent out at once, we had always to wait some weeks for some items. Calico which we urgently required for bandages on two occasions was not sent for some weeks after general order. I would at least expect to have the goods sent out a fortnight after ordering, and not a month, as has been the case for the past 12 months. To finish up this matter I enclose you copies of complaints made direct to the contractors, viz :-

" 21-2-'11. The Tourniquet is the worst I have ever seen, and I would not take it into stock under any consideration. The rubber plaster is too thin and its adhesive properties are not of the very best."

" 22-3-'11. I want a strong Tourniquet with far thicker rubber than the one you have sent. If you don't send down what will suit me, I shall reject again and again till I get a proper one."

" 24-3-'11. The rubber plaster we have received if anything is worse than the former supply, and I cannot see my way to take such rubbish into stock. I require an article as good as that put up by Messrs. Johnson & Johnson and has been supplied as good by other contractors."

" On the 11th November, 1910, splint padding was rejected as not being up to the standard."

Refused, as the Guardians consider this person is not in a position to pay a fee.

Mar. 11. From the Relieving Officer of the Spiddal Disp. Dist. reporting that Dr. Kirwan, Medical Officer, resumed duty on the 24th inst. after vacation.

Mar. 11. From the Relieving Officer of the Turloughmore Disp. Dist. reporting that as the Medical Officer, Dr. Glynn, was absent from the District on the 20th inst. attending the Salway Assizes as a witness, she arranged with Dr. Waters to attend at Loughagh Dispensary.

That on the 24th inst. Dr. Glynn ordered her to remove to the Fever Hospital a man named Murty McGrath; that she had the ambulance out for the removal but the man's friends would not allow him to be removed, until they would have the opinion of another Doctor. Dr. Cuddeys examined the patient & stated that he

was not suffering from fever, He was a private not a Dispensary patient.

The Guardians approved of the employment of Dr. J. Waters on the 20th inst. at a fee of £2-2-0.

In reply to a question asked by the Guardians the Relieving Officer stated that she saw Murty McCreath, the supposed fever patient within the past few days engaged at his ordinary work.

The Analyst reported on samples of drugs received from the Workhouse & the Salway Nos. 1, 2, & 3, & the Spiddal Disp. Lists.
