1st Apr. '11. From Rev. W. Conway, P.P. Chairman of the Boarding out children at Glencumaddy, in reply to L.S. Board letter No. 14225/11, dated the 27th inst. stating "that Mrs Morris's house where it is proposed to board out the Lee children has more sleeping accommodation than was shown on the application form. Besides the one room they have an upper place & they use a folding bed in the Kitchen. The Lee children will have the room to themselves & the foster mother is an eligible one, so there would be no hesitation in sending the children. The child Michael Rush boarded out with Peter Keaveney has been ordered back to Galway by the Medical Officer. He will be sent back by the same car which brings the other children to Glencumaddy.

The attention of the L.S. Board is directed to the remarks re Mrs Morris's house.

1st Apr. '11. From Mr. M. Egan of Ballinacally, Meulough, Bellewasloe, enclosing a statement of wages for clothing, &c. he supplied to Thomas Forder, a boy hired out to him from Galway Workhouse, amounting to £9. 2. 2, during 4 1/2 years the boy was in his service. 2. That in view of the expenses to be incurred in the carrying out of this movement it is absolutely essential that all interested in the welfare of the Coerced Tenants would immediately provide the necessary funds to finance the movement for the reinstatement of the wounded soldiers of the Land War.

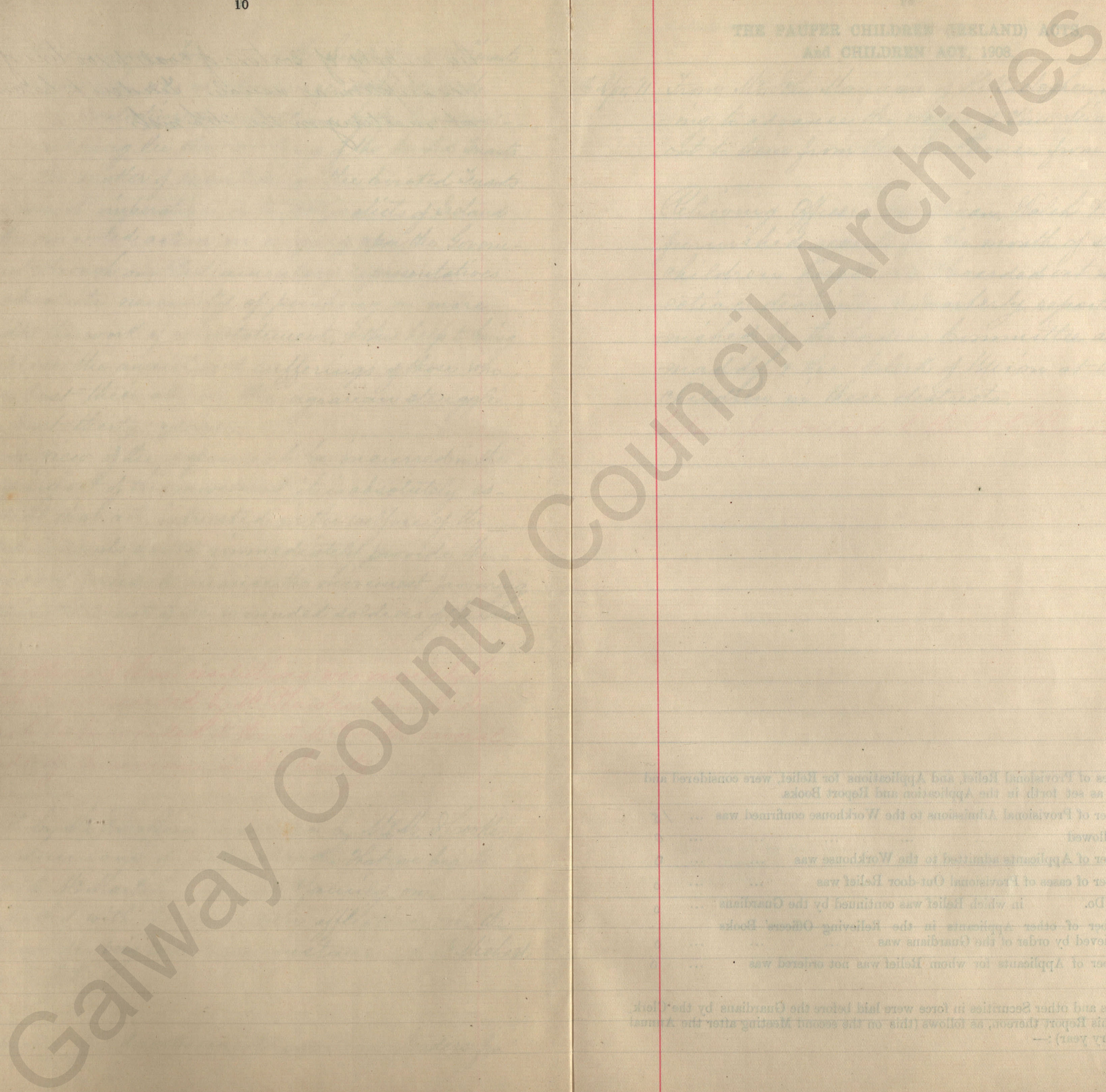

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows):—

13th April. 11. Order of the removal of Michael Lyden from the Poplar Workhouse, London, to the Railway Workhouse. *He has not yet arrived.*

13th April. 11. From the Irish Tobacco Growers' Association, calling attention to the fact that tobacco is now produced in Ireland in considerable quantities & equal to American. This crop being specially suited to small holdings it provides employment for whole families. Requesting the Guardians to encourage the extension of the industry by specifying Irish Crown Tobacco when advertising for tenders. Contractors can obtain supplies from Messrs J. P. & R. Woodbody or the Irish Tobacco Co. both of Dublin, who are the only firms at present holding a stock of Irish Crown Tobacco.

Moved by Mr. McNeill, seconded by Mr. W. Lydon, and Resolved. That we specify Irish Grown Tobacco when next advertising for tenders for the supply of Tobacco.

15th April. 11. From the Galway Port Sanitary Authority, stating that their Medical Officer, Dr. Sandys, reported that the patient at present in the Intercepting Hospital is not now suffering from Beri-Beri, but that he is not fit to be discharged from hospital treatment inasmuch as he is suffering from Peripheral Neuritis, but is now convalescent; & as the keeping of the patient in the Intercepting Hospital will mean considerable expense to the ratepayers, they ask the Board of Guardians to allow the patient to be removed to the Workhouse Hospital, copies of this communication have been sent to the Medical Officers of the Workhouse.

The Medical Officers of the Workhouse, Dr. Colahan & McDonogh, who were in attendance, strongly protested against the admission to the Workhouse Hospital of the patient referred to.

Moved by Mr. Phawless & seconded by Mr. W. Lydon. That the patient be at once admitted to the Workhouse Hospital, but the Chairman, in the face of the protest of the Medical Officers, declined to accept the motion.

Moved by Mr. H. Cunningham, seconded by Mr. J. McDonogh & Resolved. That the consideration of this matter be deferred for a fortnight, awaiting further reports on the case.

15th April. 11. From the Galway Transatlantic Port Committee, forwarding a copy of a resolution for adoption by the Board of Guardians if approved by them, as follows:—
"That the interests of Ireland, as well as Great Britain

& the Colonies, demand the establishment of the best possible transit connection between the mother countries & Canada, Newfoundland, Australia & New Zealand, & that a suitable scheme for this purpose deserves such financial assistance as may be necessary from the Governments of all those countries. That the shortest & safest connection, & therefore the cheapest & best, lies through Ireland. That Galway is the most suitable Irish Port to connect with Halifax as terminus, & if so arranged, with a Newfoundland Port of Call, (a) being 230 miles nearer to London than is Blacksood by the proposed Blacksood route (via Larne & Stranraer) & only 71 miles farther from Halifax; (b) having a first class existing railway (except for a few miles) through the centre of Ireland to Dublin, in easy communication with the North & South of Ireland, & a shorter & more direct connection with Belfast & Scotland than the proposed Blacksood route (Galway being 194 miles from Belfast & Blacksood 216 miles), while in the other scheme a new Railway would have to be constructed from Blacksood to Collooney through a remote district, & the remaining part of the line to Larne, in great part, freed from curves & doubled; (c) having an existing city beside the Harbour; (d) & the promise at a reasonable cost of one of the finest Harbours in the world. That we approve of the project of a Fast Service from Galway to Halifax, to connect with London & the Continent by a Ferry Service from Kingstown to Holyhead."

The adoption of this resolution was moved by Mr. H. Cunningham, seconded by Mr. Driffin, carried
