transmitting an extract from a letter which the Board received from the Medical Officer of the Kurloughmore Disp. Dist, reporting that the lock of the bag used for the transit of the Dispensary records to & from the Board Room is in need of repairs, & that the books are delayed too long when sent in for examination by the Guardians.

Extract,

There is another matter to which I wish to refer, i.e., that there is no lock on the bag of the Dispensary Books. I sent it to Cloherstys, Salway, to be fixed at my ^{own} expense as the Board refused, but it could not be done. Now, this bag is brought from the Dispensary on a Monday by the Relieving Officer to the Board, & is not brought back till the following Monday, although I have a Dispensary at Conindella on Friday. That is not fair, either, to the poor or to me, as their ailments & my reports can be read over by every Tom, Dick & Harry. I consider the books should not leave my possession until Wednesday morning.

The Guardians beg to observe, (1) that they at one time procured from the makers of the bag referred to, a second key for the Medical Officer's use, notwithstanding, within a very short time, & ever since, the books have been brought to the Board Room in the bag unlocked; in the circumstances they consider it would be useless to provide another key or lock. (2) In order

to have the Books returned within as short a time as possible, the Medical Officer could deliver to the Relieving Officer early on each Wednesday morning, at her dwelling, the bag containing the Books, & call for it again at 6 o'clock the same evening. If such arrangement should not suit, the Medical Officer can arrange to send his Books by parcel post.
