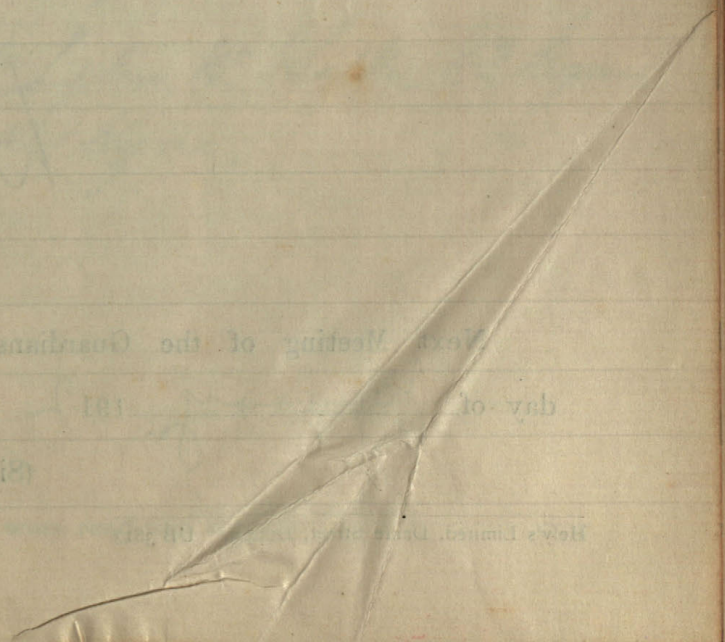

24th " Mary Hardner was transferred to Selway Hospital for special treatment.

1st inst. Kate Delany entered on her duties as Wardsmaid in the Workhouse.

2nd " The Schoolmaster resumed duty after 10 days' leave of absence.

Maria Coone, appointed as Wardsmaid in the Workhouse on the 20th Oct. has not since taken up her duties. Allowed another week to do so.

The inmates were supplied with the usual extra fare on Quas & New Year's day.

Order. Margaret Mannion, an inmate, to be prosecuted for refusing to work. A solicitor to be employed.

McColahan, Workhouse Medical Officer, applied for, & was granted a few days' leave of absence. His colleague will do duty for him during his absence.

McColahan certified that Mr. Athy, Workhouse Master, has been laid up suffering from a chill with cough & Bronchitis, & that he will not be fit to resume duty for a week or ten days.

Mr. Hugh J. Donohoe, Master's Assistant, reported

that on the 30th Oct. Mr. Athy was taken ill & has since been confined to his bed; that he has since been discharging the duties of Master. Moved by Mr. W. Lydon, seconded by Mr. W. Lillie, & unanimously resolved - that Mr. Donohoe continue to act as Master during the illness of Mr. Athy, & that he be remunerated for his services at the rate of £1-10-0 a week with rations from the 30th Oct.

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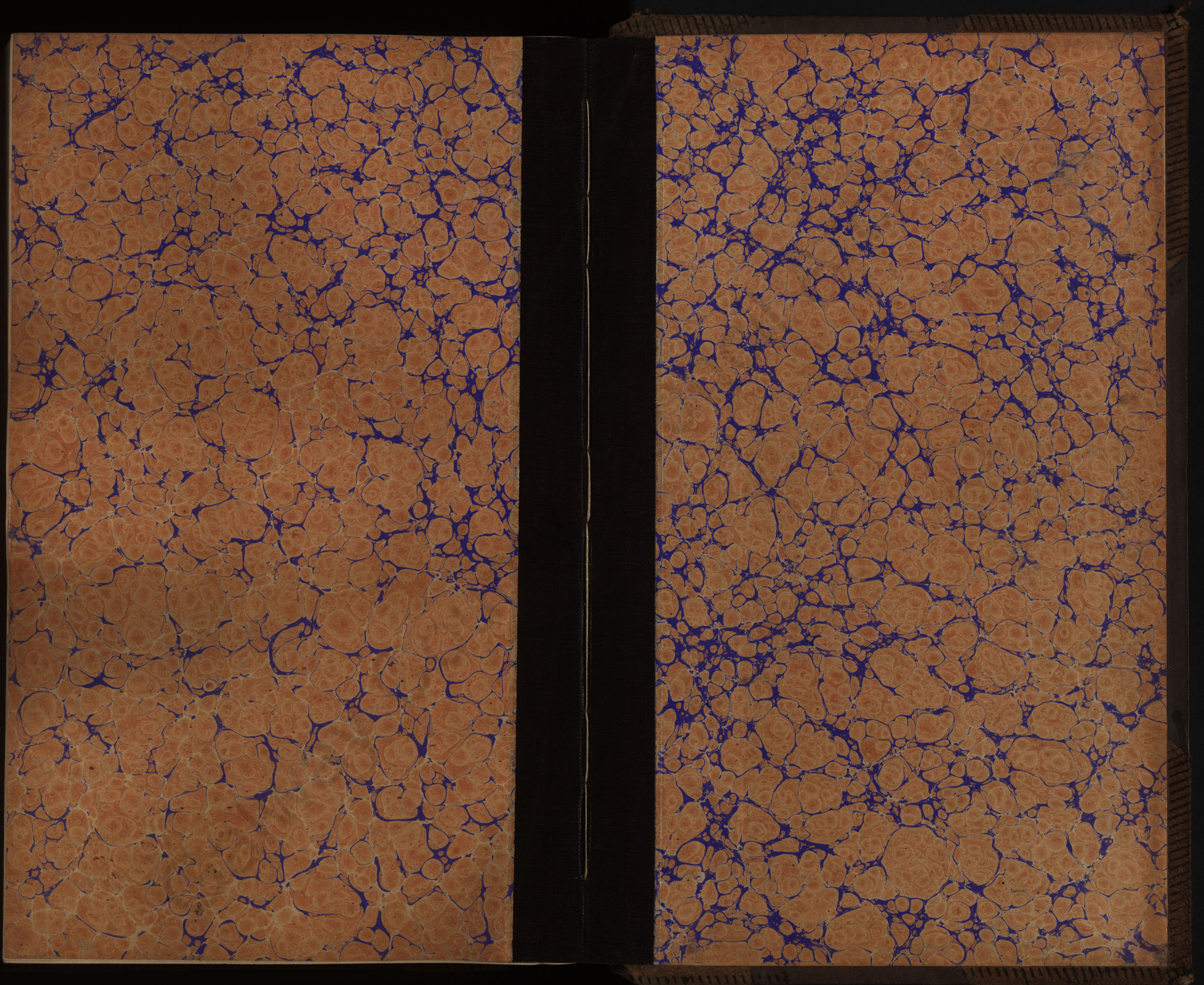

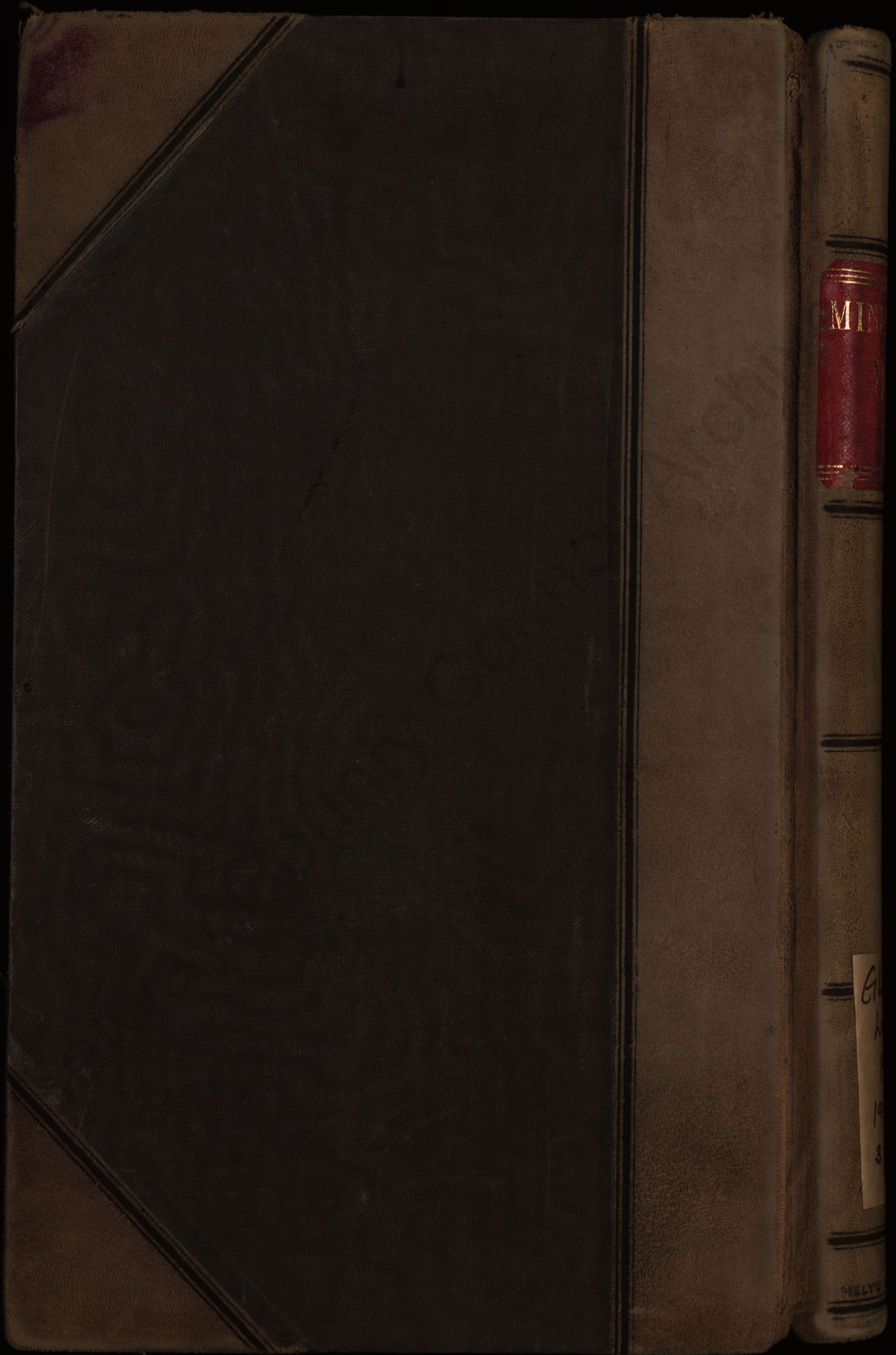
