25th July. } Referring to the list of particulars on Form A
respecting the boarding out of Michael Rush,
aged 8 years, with Mr. Mich. Kilgannon, & the
Board desire to inform the Guardians that they
learn from their Inspector, Miss Fitzgerald-Kennedy,
that the proposed foster home is situated at a
considerable distance from the high road, the
way to which lies across a bog. The Inspector
points out that the child, who has been in deli-
cate health, would get wet while going to school
in winter if boarded out in this house, & that a
home should be selected for him at a shorter
distance from the school & situated on a
high road. In these circumstances the
Board are not prepared to sanction the pro-
posed arrangement in this case.

Referred to the ladies committee for observations.

In the report Form A in this case, the Rev. W. Conway
made observations as follows:— This house (Mich.^e
Kilgannon's) is a fairly good one; no fault except
the sleeping arrangements. None else will take
the child.

18th July 11. } From the Rev. W. Conway, P.P. Glunnamaddy,
forwarding Quarterly Reports re the children
boarded out & hired out in his Parish.
The Teacher's report in the case of Mr. Blakely
was not returned because the Teacher has been
dismissed, but if another form be forwarded

upon taking away the child Murphy from

James Whyte who was repeatedly warned against keeping the child from school but he disregarded the warnings.

Pat. Lynn (Mick) protests against the taking away of the boy John Corneely from him. Send an ultimatum if the Guardians insist on the boy being removed.

Order to be enforced that the Guardians insist upon the removal of the boy. *Left to the discretion of Bonway & his Committee.*

The charge made against this boy is doubtful because the person who made it appears not to be "all there".

That he (Bonway) is on the look out for a ^{more} suitable place for Francis Wynne, hired out ^{presently} temporarily with Martin Murphy.
