No application received in response to advertisement for a Wardsmaid for Workhouse Male Infirmary Wards at a salary of £8 a year. Consideration adjourned for a month.

Mr. Thomas Walsh, Relieving Officer, applied for a month's vacation, nominating his wife, Sarah Walsh, as substitute.

Granted 4 weeks unanimously, & the Guardians approved of his wife acting as substitute at a remuneration at the rate of his salary, namely, $\frac{1}{3}$ a week.

the latter on vacation for four weeks, at a remuneration at the rate of £3-3.0 a week.
