25th Sept. '11. Magistrate's Order for the deportation of Bernard King from Cardiff Union to Galway Workhouse.
He pauper has not yet arrived.

25th Sept. '11. From Mr. Joseph Mannix of Dominick St., stating that since being declared contractor for the supply of hardware, &c., to the Workhouse, he has learned that he must be 21 years of age before he could hold a contract, & being under 21 years

he begs to withdraw from the contract with the permission of the Board.

Moved by the Chairman, seconded by Mr. M. Heaven, & unanimously - Resolved - that the contract entered into with Mr. Joseph Mannix, a minor, be annulled, & that fresh tenders be invited for the supply of the goods for which he was declared contractor.

29th Sept '11. From Messrs. Blake & Keene, Solicitors, on behalf of Mr. M. Claherty & Mr. J. Naughton, bringing under the notice of the Guardians that their clients, each on his own behalf tendered for the first 21 items of the Establishment-Requisites: that Mr. Thomas Mannix, Upper Dominick St., also tendered; that Mr. Mannix is not a merchant, but is engaged in the Establishment of Mr. W. J. Lillo whose step-son he is, & with whom he resides. Mr. Mannix is under 17 years of age. Mr. W. J. Lillo is a member of your Board, & as such took part in the consideration & acceptance of the various tenders. Asking on behalf of their clients that the contract entered into with a minor, virtually with a member of the Board, be annulled.

 That we feel a deep sense of responsibility to the Irish community in connection with the ruinous effect of the Railway Strike on the trade & business of the people. And now that the men have accepted all the conditions laid down by the Companies we are strongly of opinion that the Directors of the Irish Railways are bound by their duty to the country to bring the strike to an end by reinstating all the men who have been on strike, & if they do not adopt this course they will be held responsible for any further loss or trouble which may be inflicted upon the country.

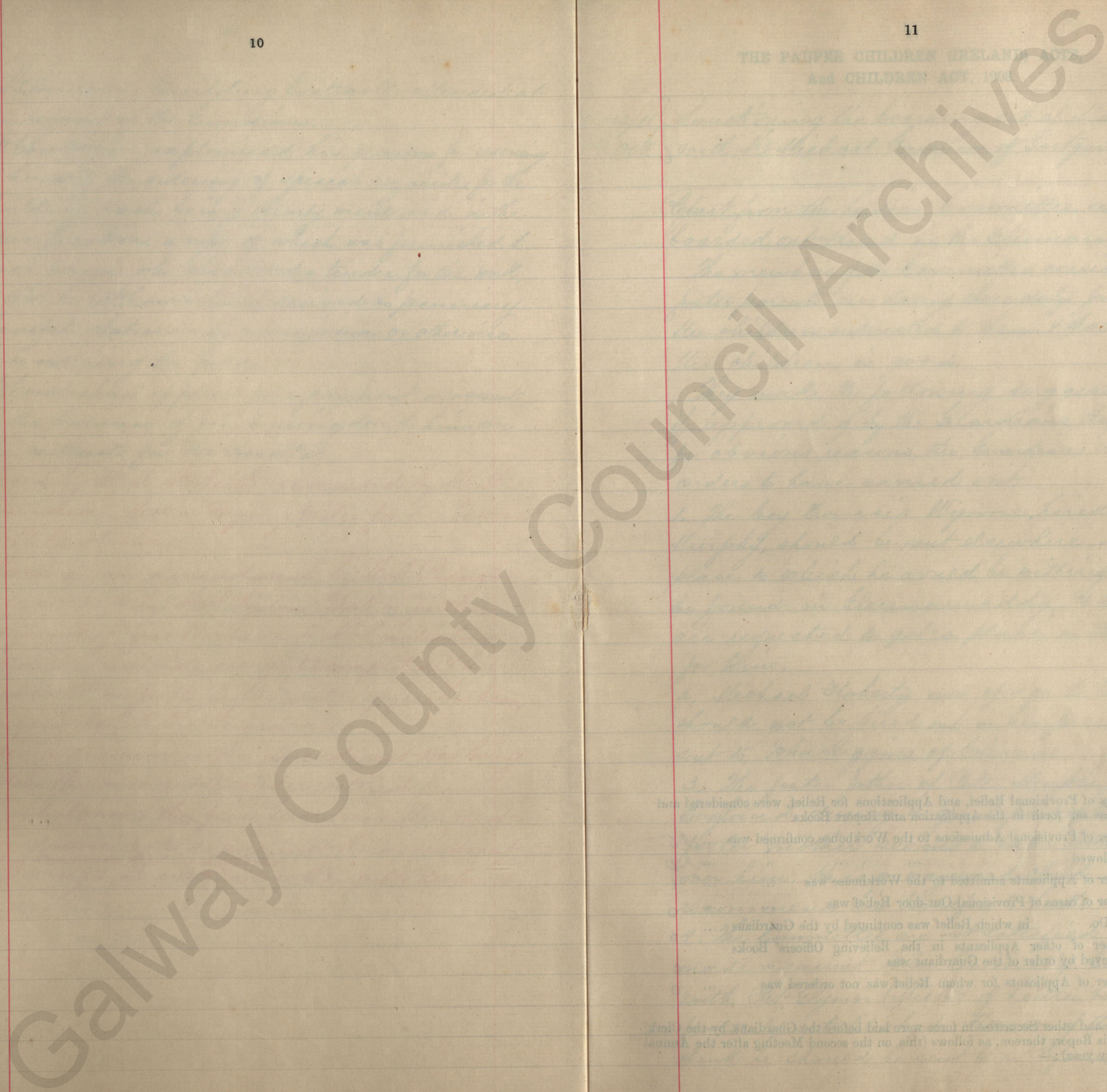

Report from the ladies Committee on the children boarded out & hired in the Cleenamaddy Union.

The members of the Committee consider that the foster parents are doing their duty faithfully towards the children entrusted to them & that the health of the children is good.

They make the following suggestions, which if approved of by the Guardians, they would wish, for obvious reasons, the Guardians would send orders to have carried out:

1. The boy Francis Wynne, hired out with Martin Murphy, should be sent elsewhere. A suitable place to which he would be willing to go cannot be found in Cleenamaddy. The Guardians are requested to get a place in the Galway Union for him.

2. Michael Flaherty now of age to be hired out, should not be hired out in his present home, but sent to John Higgins of Cloona.

3. The foster father of Peter Murphy is away in England during a great part of the year & the foster mother seems to have little or no control over him. He is a wayward child. The Committee recommend his transfer to Luke King.

4. The Committee are not satisfied that the charge made against John Connolly, boarded out with Pat Glynn (Micheal) of Leitrim, has been satisfactorily established. However if the Guardians think he should be sent to a Reformatory or other

suitable place the Committee do not object, as the Guardians are the proper authority to take steps to have him sent there.

5. William Dowd, foster parent of the boy Martin Haire, is quite willing to hire the boy now that he is of age to be hired out, & the Committee recommend it.
