26th Oct. Honor McManara transferred to Salway Hospital for special treatment.

" " John P. Garty entered on his duties as supt. of the heating arrangements & gardener in the new Fever Hospital.

30th " Delia Collins was sentenced to 2 months' imprisonment for assaulting another inmate of the Workhouse.

29th " Wardsmaids Kate Lorman & Delia Lydon were admitted as Hospital patients.

31st " M^{rs} Eason of Dangan House sent cake & fruit to the children. I thanked her on behalf of the Guardians.

4th inst. Nurse Carolan resumed duty after vacation & her substitute, Nurse Lee, left.

" " The storm blew down portion of the Workhouse boundary wall, blew off the lamp outside the new Fever Hospital, & broke glass in a fan light. The lamp & fanlight have been repaired. The timber in the domes & skylights in the Workhouse require repairs & painting.

Order. The Master to get the boundary wall repaired. The Engineer to be asked to examine the domes & skylights & report as to necessary repairs. Also to report as to cost of hosepipes for fire extinguishing purposes. The contractor having failed to supply Irish starch

Purchased in Town & charged him with extra cost. The contractor has delivered 3 chests of Tea & he states there are 15 chests bonded at Custom House. Order. Samples of the 18 chests to be sent to the Tea Taster. Please examine 400 yards of shirting calico, 150 yards of flannelette, & 334 yards of check delivered by contractors. Examined & ordered into stocks.

The Schoolmistress submitted a requisition for Copy Books, &c. cost of about $\frac{5}{6}$ s. Order.

Ordered. Two special trusses & 6 yards of elastic bandage for use in Workhouse Hospital.

56,310/11. } Referring to the resolution of the Guardians of the 25th inst. proposing to appoint M^r John P. Garty as attendant in charge of the boilers in the new Fever Hospital; & with reference thereto, the Board desire to state that the provisions of Article 28 of the General Regulations should be complied with in this case. The Board have at the same time to point out that it is desirable that the person appointed should be qualified to take charge of the boilers.

3rd Oct. } Order. The issue of advertisement for a qualified person

to take charge of the boilers in the new Fever Hospital, & to assist generally in keeping the grounds of that Hospital in order. Remuneration to be at the rate of 16/- a week. Applications to be considered at meeting on the 22nd inst.

23rd Oct. '11. From the Belfast Board of Guardians forwarding a copy of a resolution unanimously adopted by them in favour of the Bill "The Bastardy Law (Ireland) Act, 1911. The Guardians unanimously adopted this resolution.

Requesting the Guardians to bear in mind this requirement when making any future appointments to vacancies in the teaching staff of the Workhouse Schools. Guardians approve, & will bear the matter in mind.

3rd Nov. '11. From Mr. Murphy, Guardians' Solicitor, thanking them for their vote of condolence on the death of his

mother.

6th Nov. '11. From the Hibernian Insurance Co., enclosing a draft specification & rough plan in connection with the Insurance of the Workhouse Buildings pointing out that the buildings appear to be very much under-insured, & suggesting a re-valuation as was done in the case of Limerick Union which was increased from £40,000 to £96,000. Moved by Mr. P. Gallagher, seconded by Sir J. O'Donoghue, & Resolved - that the Workhouse Insurance be increased from £10,000 to £20,000.

8th Nov. '11. From Mr. Thomas Keane, Contractor, stating that the Workhouse Master returned to him some starch as not being Irish. Enclosing an Invoice to prove that it was from Silversmith, Clannure, Co. Cork. The Invoice was not enclosed. No order made.

8th Nov. '11. From John Cradley, Workhouse Tailor, applying for an increase in the weekly wages paid to him. Notice of Motion. I give notice that on this day fortnight I will move, or some Guardian on my behalf will move, that the Workhouse Tailor's wages be increased, & if the motion be carried, the amount to be fixed by the Guardians then in attendance. M. J. Crowley.

8-11-11. Notice of departure of James Sweeney from Liverpool to Salway Workhouse. The pauper has not yet arrived.

The Architect furnished a report re contract work on the new Fever Hospital.

If the Guardians are willing to remit all time penalty they should pass a resolution to that effect & obtain the sanction of the L. S. Board, & he will then certify for the amount due, & he has retained, for the time being, an amount sufficient to cover a six months' penalty, thus allowing the contractor an extension of time over the contract period of about ten months. There will be a retention amount of £750 for the maintenance period of six months during which time the contractor will be responsible for any defects which, in the opinion of the Architect, are due to faulty materials or workmanship.
