- 5th inst. The temporary services ^{of Nurse Laffey} in the Fever Hospital were dispensed with.
- 6th " Purchased 9 young pigs for £6-13-6. Luck penny expenses on pigs sold 16/-, Master's allowance £1; total expenses £8-9-6, which being deducted from £33 received for 8 pigs sold, left a balance of £24-10-6 which has been lodged with the Union Treasurer.
- 8th " The case against Bridget Shaughnessy for assaulting another inmate was adjourned for 3 months on condition that she does not re enter the Workhouse.
- " " The case against Margaret Mannion was not dealt with as having left the Workhouse, the summons was not served.
- " " James Mulvoy from Moyculleen, admitted to Hospital suffering from a wound in his throat, died on the following morning.
- 10th " Inquest held, verdict, "committed suicide by cutting his throat with his own razor".
The Pension Officer has notified the stoppage of the Pension from Mary Kee, patient in Hospital since the 7th inst. pending the decision of the Committee.
