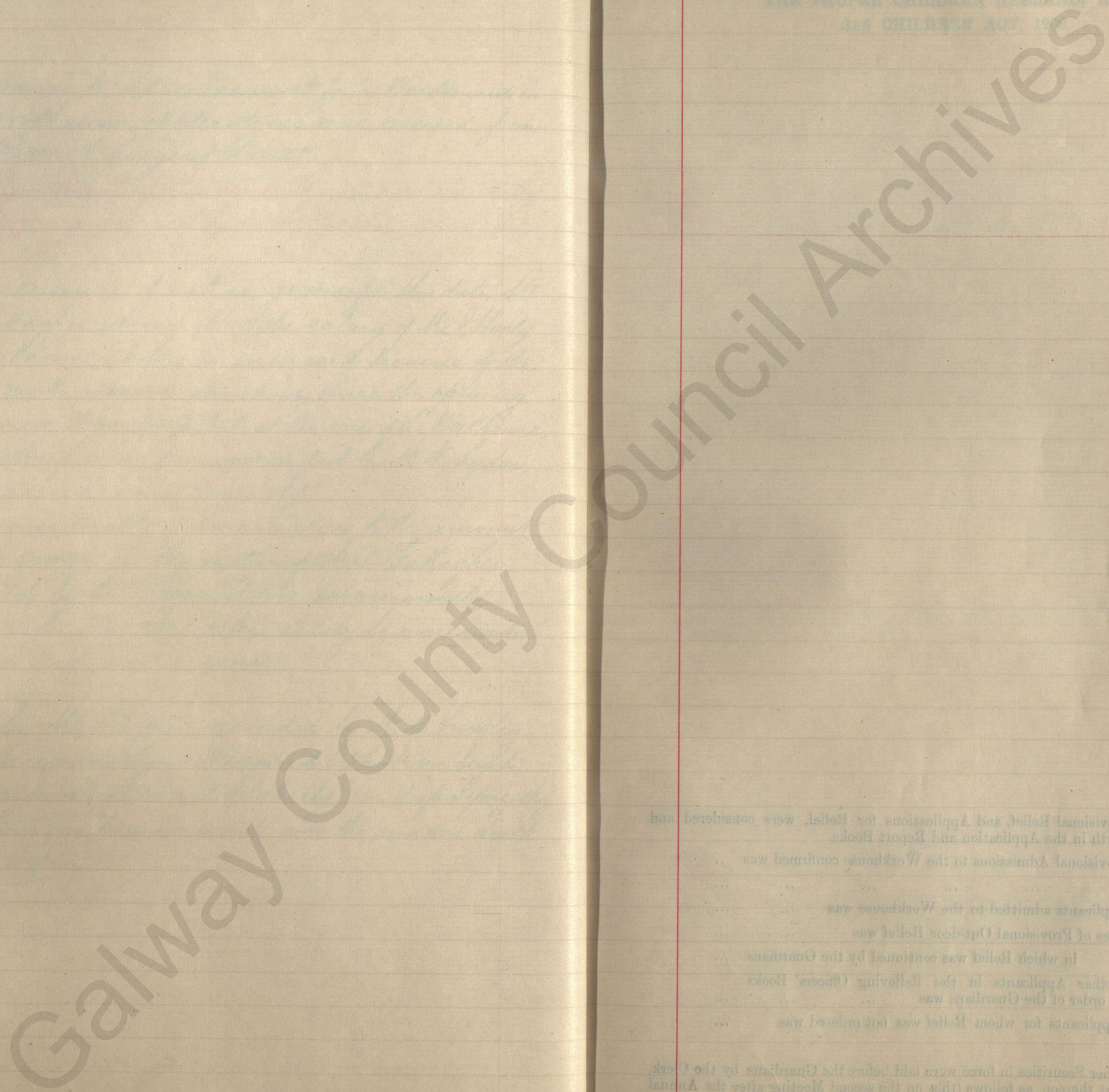

Read Letter from L.G.B. No 2247/12, dated 23<sup>rd</sup> Jan'y, 1912,

referring to an entry of a communication from the Medical Officer of the Turloughmore Disp. Dist. respecting the transmission of his Books to the Board Room for examination by the Guardians, in the Minutes of the 10<sup>th</sup> inst. & in reference to the Resolution thereon, the Board desire to state that the Guardians should arrange definitely with the Medical Officer to have his Books ready in future on the day preceding that fixed for the monthly meeting at which the dispensary records are to be examined, & should direct the Relieving Officer to call for them accordingly, & instruct her to return them to the Medical Officer without fail on the first or second day after the Guardians' meeting.

The Guardians beg to state in reply that the Relieving Officer has declined to continue bringing the Books to & from the Workhouse; that they have given the Medical Officer the alternative of sending his Books for the monthly examination by parcels post; that he failed to comply on the appointed day of this month; that we as Guardians now leave the matter in the hands of the Board to be dealt with.

The Guardians directed the Clerk to enter in full in the Minutes the following letter of complaint against Dr. Glynn, Med. Officer of the Turloughmore Disp. Dist.

Turloughmore, Jan. 19<sup>th</sup> 1912.  
Honourable Sir,

I am reporting & complaining of Dr. Glynn to you. I called on him on 26<sup>th</sup> Dec. last. my wife was in labour, the child was born & no trace of the after birth, during 3 hours 2 horses running for after another, he lived within an English mile of one, & he was told all that by the messengers & no heed until I had to run through the fields myself, the woman thrown on the ground all that time, in flowe of blood for 3 hours until she got her death of cold, I had to send to Galway for Dr. Sandys on 30 of Dec. I sent for him again & horses running for him & he had the same humbugging all through his drunkenness. It was then I sent for Dr. Sandys. Dr. Glynn knew how to charge me £2 as drunk as what he was. It is an act of charity for you & the Guardians to check & look after him, He is doing all wrong turns since he came to this district. I can prove all I have mentioned for you in any part of Ireland. I have my brother Mr. Hardner & the wife's brother Mr. Hughes witness to all, that they were at the house all the time,

The Guardians beg to state in reply that the old Fever Hospital was a considerable distance from the Workhouse; the new one is situate at the rear of the Workhouse; a roadway leads to the latter from the main thoroughfare, with special gates. Mr. Nauly has to attend to these gates as well as to the entrance gates to the Workhouse.

Mr. Fogarty, recently appointed Porter &c. at the new Fever Hospital has his work cut out for him in attending to the Boilers in that Institution, & in keeping the grounds in order. He does not sleep on the premises. There is telephonic communication between the Hospital & Mr. Nauly's lodge so that he may be communicated with at night in case of urgent necessity day & night.

Mr. Nauly has had extra work imposed upon him in recording the outgoing & incoming of the Officers of the new Hospital.

The Guardians are informed that his salary is the lowest paid to a Porter of any Workhouse bordering on the size of Galway.

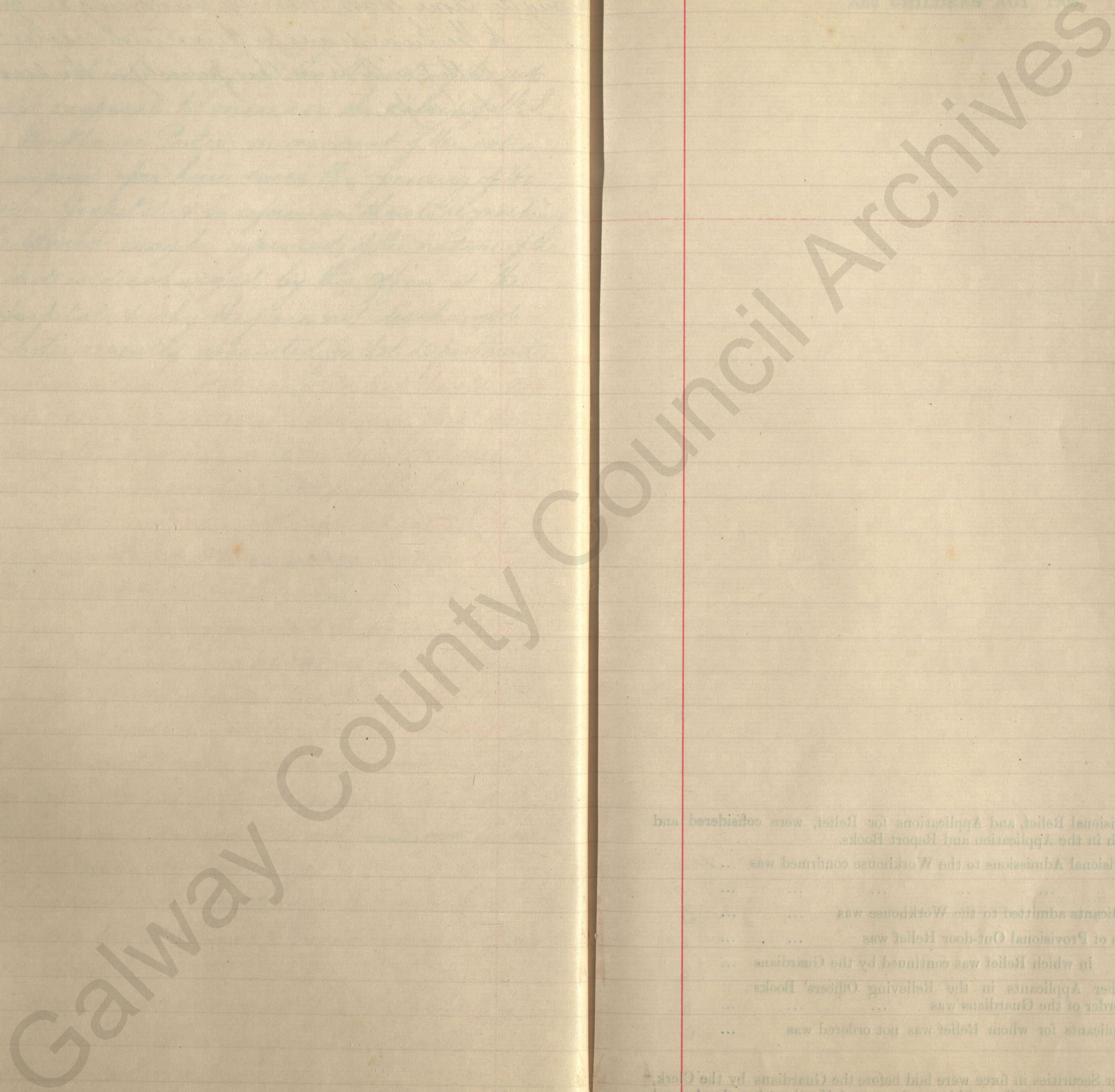

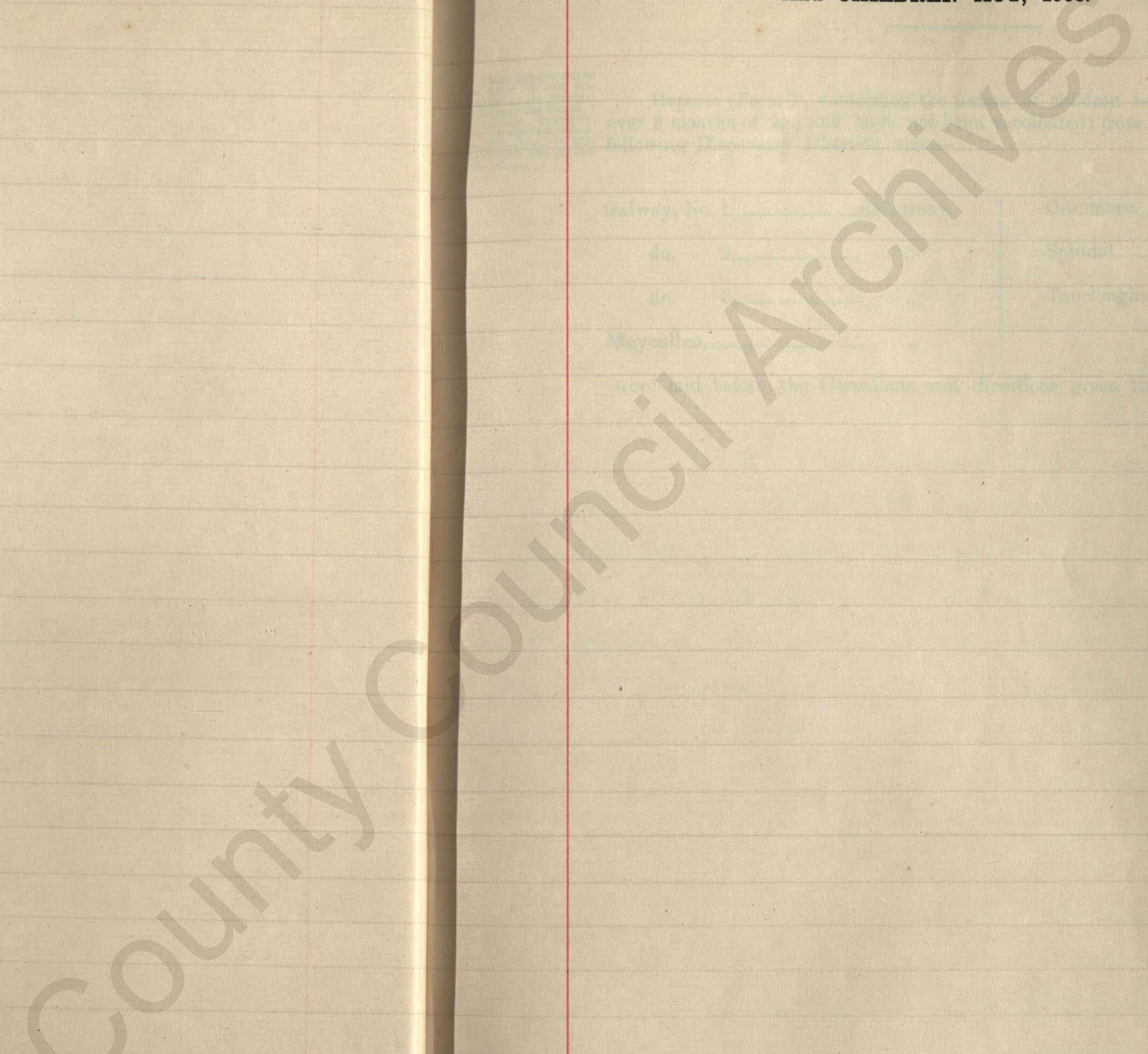

Whether the Architect is entitled to extra fees or not is no concern of his, but in justice is not entitled to them at his expense, as of these extra visits for which payment is claimed, not one in ten was made to his part of the work. These extra fees if paid at all should be paid by the contractor who was the chief cause of the delay.

As regards the rent of the old Fever Hospital, the same reasoning should absolve him from that responsibility, at the same time pointing out

1. The Guardians were in possession of the new Hospital in July last;
2. The 6 months in question were utilised in repairing the old Hospital, as required by the landlord, so that the Guardians were at no loss whatever.

If the L. S. Board would consider these matters, & also go into the causes of the delay, they would come to a different decision on the whole affair.
