for the time, ^{1st Oct^r to 5th Dec^r} Haire was with him.
He has not absolutely refused to pay. Please send
me the agreement signed by Dowd. I have not
since visited Maurice Mitchell with whom
Thos^r Rush is boarded out, but hope to do so soon.
He lives 8 miles from Glennamaddy.
I was obliged to return some of the quarterly reports
to the ladies who filled them as there were inac-

curacies & omissions, they will be forwarded in a few days. I did not pay James Whyte for Peter Murphy, & two receipts have not yet reached me. Hence delay.

Read Letter from *Messrs Boyleau & Boyd* dated *1st Febry* 1912

furnishing a statement of empty packages due by the Workhouse & each Dispensary in the Union, totalling £10-17-8. Pointing out that these packages, under the terms of contract, are to be paid for if not returned within six months.

1st Febry 12. From the liquidators of Messrs Clarke & Co, lately contractors for the supply of medicines, &c, to the Union, giving the amounts due for empty packages by the Workhouse & each Dispensary in the Union.

Order, The Medical Officers to be again warned that the Guardians will hold them responsible for any loss sustained by reason of empties not being returned to the contractors in due time.

3rd Febry 12. From the Registrar of the General Council of Medical Education & Registration of the United Kingdom, 299, Oxford St, London, W, acknowledging the receipt of copies of correspondence re complaint against Mr P. D. Glynn, stating that if a complaint against a practitioner for "infamous conduct in a professional respect" is made in the prescribed form of a Statutory Declaration it shall be brought before the authorities of the Council. The Declaration must state the description & true place of abode of the Declarant, & where a fact stated is not within his personal knowledge, the source of the information & grounds of belief in its truth must be accurately & fully stated. In his opinion the complaint against Mr P. D. Glynn in regard to the letter written to the

Guardians, which is considered to be insulting, is not one which the Council will take up, but, if one in the prescribed form is received, it will be his duty to bring it before the Authorities of the Council.

Order, A copy of this communication to be furnished to Mr Denis Lardner, who made complaint of the conduct of Dr Glynn, in order that he may take such action in the matter as he may be advised.

5th Febry 12. From Mr Denis Lardner of Lackaghmore, Turloughmore, "In reply to yours of the 2nd inst. I beg to state for the information of the Guardians & L. G. Board the following facts: -

1. Dr Glynn attended & examined my wife on Dec^r 23rd three days before her confinement. She gave him £1 in the presence of a witness. On the 26th Dec^r after long delay he came with the second messenger. He was at his house & no where else. She was on the ground but was in the bed when the Priest & Dr came.
2. On the 30th Dec^r my wife got seriously ill. I sent Michael Hughes for Dr Glynn. He refused to come. Hughes went for him again, he refused. Michael Hughes went for him a third time & the Dr came with him. He was in his house & no where else. He was drunk in the presence of several witnesses. My wife gave him another £1 in the presence of a witness.
3. On 1st Jan^y, Dr Glynn came to my house at 11 or 12 o'clock at night & called for. He was stupidly drunk & slept on a chair in my room. On 2nd Jan^y Dr Glynn came again to my house. He was drunk. William Lardner was in the house & several others. Michael Hughes & Mr Arne Long, both of Clare-galway.

Galway, can prove to this statement several others.
 4. About 20 years ago, a woman named *Mc Dolly*, died in my house. *Dr. Deegan* attended her before she died. An Inquest was held & no blame attached to me. In a week after I was arrested owing to foul & wicked lies like his. I was brought to a Special Court at Traan in the Police Barrack, & discharged immediately, & where was *Dr. Lynn* at that time?

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and orders made thereon as follows:—

- 7th inst. John Hoone was deported from West Derby Union, Liverpool. He left on arrival.
- 8th " The Food Inspector took samples of milk for analysis.
- 11th " Bridget Byrne, hired out with McEasgrave, Rangan, was admitted to Hospital as a patient.
- 12th " The Fever Hospital was without a nurse from 8.20 pm. to 9 pm. the two nurses being out.
- Order.* The nurses to be cautioned against a recurrence.
- 13th " Nurse Gore, who left the Fever Hospital on the 6th inst. for a few days to attend the funeral of her brother, returned & resumed duty.
- " " Nurse Quinn reported at 6-30 pm. that Mr. Tushy, a patient in the Fever Hospital, was missing. I sent to his home in the town at once but he had left & returned to the Hospital at 7-30 pm. He stated to his wife that he got over the boundary wall to get his pipe & tobacco.
- There is a supply of water in the Workhouse at present but there is not a full supply in the Fever Hospital. The covering of one of the flues of the boilers in the Fever Hospital is coming off. The Septic Tank has been thoroughly cleaned out & the contents covered with earth as directed by Mr. Emerson the contractor. I succeeded this morning in turning the stopcock at the point but I do not know how good it is.

Order. The attention of the Town Steward to be called to the defective water supply in the Fever Hospital, & of Mr. Emerson, contractor, to the defective covering of the boiler flue.

Workhouse Medical Officer.

13th Feb. } Sanctioning the payment of remuneration at the rate of £1-50 a week with rations, to Nurse Laffey for her services as temporary nurse in the Workhouse,

13th Feb. From Mr. A. Howlishaw, Architect of the new Fever Hospital, stating that he is entirely at a loss to account for the attitude of the Guardians in the matter of his fees except by attributing it to the prejudiced action of a few individuals who, he believes, are leading the Board blindly on to a false position. He understood that his account submitted to the Board on the 8th Nov. last was accepted. There has been ample opportunity for submitting his claim for fees to a qualified expert. If the Board undertakes to pay

him the balance of his fee, as soon as the contracts are cleared off by final certificates, he will see to matters being attended to in due course. With regard to the "Septic Tanks", the evidence goes to show that the imperfect working of them at the present time is due to the want of attention. These installations require occasional clearing & cleansing according to the quantity of sewage they have to deal with. In any case they should receive an inspection at least once in 6 months & the Hospital has been in use now for more than that time; moreover for the first 6 months the drains are more liable to become blocked through 'foreign' matter having got into them, as shavings, chips, &c. before the drains were finally covered up. Of course if cloths & other improper articles get into them they are liable to become choked at any time, but as there are numerous manholes there should never be any difficulty as the drains are all laid to self-cleansing gradients. Of course the various traps require periodical cleaning. The flow from the "Septic Tanks" is designedly restricted in order that the action of purification may be the more complete. These outlets can easily be enlarged to allow the sewage to escape quickly & if that were done the drains so far would appear to be more satisfactory, perhaps, while as a matter of fact they would be less satisfactory. The more purified the sewage, the less danger by its entry into the town sewers.

Dr. Colahan, Medical Officer of the Workhouse, came

before the Board to complain that since the new Fever Hospital became occupied there has been a most offensive odour from the Septic Tank. The tank has recently been cleared out & the matter removed was spread over the surface of the ground, with some earth thrown over it. In his opinion this was a highly dangerous proceeding to adopt. Resolved - That we beg to direct the attention of the Local Government Board to this complaint & we respectfully request that they will direct that one of their Engineering Inspectors come & inspect this "Septic Tank" & see if it be of an approved pattern & likely to work satisfactorily.

14th Feb. '12 From Mr. J. M. Leech, Clerk to the Port Sanitary Authority, enquiring whether the Guardians will store for the Authority, the bedding, &c. used during the treatment of cases of Beri Beri in the Intercepting Hospital.
