After due consideration the members arrived at the following conclusions, namely:
 Sir Jas. O'Sullivan, that it would be advisable to refer Mr. Cowlishaw's claim to some eminent Architect or Engineer for his opinion, as was done in the matter of the award of the Prize for the best plan for the new Hospital.

Mr. Lydon; that Mr. Cowlishaw be allowed 5% on the loan of £10,000 obtained for the building of the Hospital, that is £500. in full settlement of his claim.

Mr. Redington; that the claim of 2% on the original plan, amount £9675, be disallowed, as the plan was not abandoned but reduced; that he would instead be in favour of allowing Mr. Cowlishaw 3½% on the £9675 original plan, in other words to allow 3½% on Mr. Emerson's contract & the same percentage on the difference between £9675 & £8530, namely, £1125.

To order made on this report.

Mr. Cowlishaw's Explanation,

As the subject of my fees will probably be brought before the Guardians tomorrow, by the Building Committee, & as I know that there is a great deal of misunderstanding about it, I think it will be well for me to make some explanatory statement thereon. The facts are briefly as follows:—

- (1) My quoted & accepted terms were 4½% upon the outlay for the preparation of drawings, specification, & for supervision, otherwise, for the documents & services usually required for the carrying out of a building contract, & these were clearly defined in my quotation. (2) These terms were accepted.
- (3) Plans, specifications & details, &c. necessary for

the obtaining of tenders were prepared & tenders procured & the Committee recommended the acceptance of one of the tenders. (4) The Board did not adopt the recommendation of the Committee, nor accept any tender, but referred the matter back to Committee with instructions to provide a building to cost £10000. (5) In order to provide for a reduction of £1000, the structural alterations & changes were such as to make it impossible to re-use the original plans (except one,) & new plans became absolutely necessary. (It is here that some misunderstanding exists, one or two members thinking that it was "only a matter of taking off a few beds," whereas alterations were made in all parts, particularly in the administration block, hence the opposition here is based upon a misapprehension.) (6) I prepared & submitted to Committee rough pencil plans embodying my proposals for reducing the cost of the work to the desired amount, & these plans were approved. (7) I then prepared new plans in accordance therewith & afterwards met the Committee, when fresh tenders were ordered to be obtained, & these were procured & submitted & one accepted (for which alone ½% is chargeable). Owing to the order of the Board that quantities were not to be supplied on the altered plans, it was necessary for me to furnish contractors with copies of the main plans for both the original & the new scheme for purposes of comparison & this could not be avoided. This involved seven drawings for each of the six contractors, or 42 drawings in all apart from Architects' copies. Similarly copies of specifications were required. (8) 2% is charged on the first scheme in accordance with quoted fees (the schedule fees charge-

able where tenders have been obtained after preparation of drawings, specifications, &c. being 3%) but (2) I have actually charged only 3 1/2% for the scheme carried out, this being 1% less than my quoted fees, therefore, (10) my total fees for the two schemes is practically only 1% higher than my quoted fees for one scheme, or 1/2% over the normal for one, as per schedule. It is this 1% that is latter exception to, (11) But I have further to draw attention to the fact that I have allowed this 1% to cover a large amount of extra services & drawings, &c. for which in the ordinary course, extra fees are chargeable. Among these may be mentioned the following:— specially prepared preliminary plans, specification & detailed estimate for the L. G. Board, involving between one & two months work of augmented staff, duplicate plans, specification & estimate, &c. for first scheme, & second scheme for L. G. Board; duplicate plans, specification & estimates for detail works from time to time, including subsequent contracts (which I have only charged 4 1/2% for,) as boundary fences & road contracts, laundry machinery, lighting, drainage, &c.
